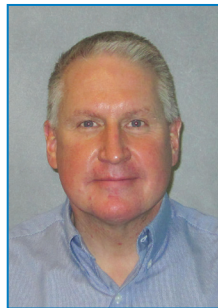

Use vacation hours over 120 or risk losing them

If you have quite a few vacation hours still on the books, you might want to start planning when you are going to use those hours before it gets too late in the year. Don't wait until the last minute to try to use your vacation hours.

You can carry over 120 hours of vacation into the next year, but anything over that amount will go back to the city. You will effectively lose that time off.

You can apply for vacation carry over if you have extreme circumstances. However, those requests have to be approved by the department director and the city human resources director. Requests for such carry over

can be made to Sandy Kimbrough by Oct. 31.

The carry over must be used by March 31, 2023, if granted. The carry over does not have to be allowed, so please take that into account when applying.

Without carry over, any hours left above 120 will be lost on Jan. 1, 2023, if they aren't used by Dec. 31, 2022.
