Council President Brendmoen said Travis Bistodeau is here. During COVID, they adjusted their ordinance to a 3-reading vote. First reading is a staff report, second reading is a public hearing, and they vote on the last reading.

Travis Bistodeau, Deputy Director of DSI (Department of Safety and Inspections), said he is one of 2 deputy directors in DSI. This amendment is to remove some confusing and conflicting language in the legislative code in regards to heat exchangers. Municipalities are prohibited from creating and enforcing building code requirements that are more restrictive than the code itself. Since the state adopted the 2015 building code and plumbing code, some of the language in the legislative code conflict with double walled heat exchangers. This amendment removes some language and minimizes confusion and complaints. Neither DSI nor Saint Paul Regional Water District have reservations about removing this provision.

# **COMMUNITY INPUT**

## 40 <u>PH 21-4</u> Community input on the 2022 City Budget.

Council President Brendmoen said they are holding annually a community input session on the budget far in advance of their vote in December. They are here to hear input on the budget proposed by Mayor Carter and input on ARP (American Rescue Plan) funds, which is \$166 Million. It is one time funding. There are other items that are affecting the budget. They will hear from Holly Huston. She has handed some of us information about the budget. Then, they will go to a public event format and take people's comments.

Holly Huston, City Council Chief Budget Officer, said she will briefly go over the City's budget. It consists of the general fund expenses that flows through this fund to support annual services. The property taxes support these services. The total budget is \$332 Million. They have special funds supported by fees or grants, some of these are multi-year programs. They represent \$328 Million. Finally, there are debt funds that ensure the maintenance of the City's infrastructure. That is \$52.2 million. Total budget is \$772 Million.

The property tax portion is 27.5% of the total. Looking at the handout, the first page focuses on property taxes. The property tax levy this year is \$176.6 Million. That is half of the City's total general fund. The change this year is 6.9% proposed. The City Council is evaluating the total and has the opportunity to make adjustments before final adoption. Within that \$11.4 Million, there is \$6.1 Million of new investments the Mayor proposed. This includes restoring some budget reductions resulting from the pandemic last year and cut from the budget this year. It also includes establishing an Office of Neighborhood Safety for \$1.25 Million, service changes, housing and economic development, support the law enforcement career path academy and each year the City's budget expenses grow. The revenue side does not grow unless the City Council makes agreements to fees or property taxes.

When you receive your property tax bill, a portion of that goes to the City, not the total amount: Ramsey County, school district, etc. About 29% of last year's tax bill went to the City. The City received ARP allocation from the federal government allocation of \$176.6 Million. The Mayor's proposed budget sectioned off investment for safety, housing, and job readiness of \$40 Million each. Modernization of City services of \$18 Million. Modernization would be to do some of the application work online. Vaccination and health investment of \$3.6 Million. Grant administration of \$10 Million.

There are some other items there on how the total budget is sectioned off by department. The City Council has a budget survey that they want people to take. There were over 180 responses so far. That information will be summarized for the Council. The Council adopts the budget on December 8. There is another public hearing once you receive your property tax bill on December 1 at 6:00 p.m.

Brendmoen thanked Huston. They are going to move into the public input session. This is by no means the only way to reach out to the councilmembers. The councilmembers are accessible and their information is available on the internet. The legislative aides are here. They welcome the back and forth. There will be a 2-minute limit to the comments. We want to be as tuned in to the last person as to the first person. Please sign in and tell your address, then we will start the timer.
