Councilmember Noecker said this was laid over for 2 weeks for staff to give staff time to give a description of why Keystone was chosen and verification process.

John McCarthy, Office of Financial Services Director, said he wanted to give a timeline and process. Back in mid 2020, the City was awarded federal funding for COVID: CARES funding and CDBG. In July, City staff created an application process for departments to submit proposals for the funding. The CDBG projects had to go through a second round of eligibility review. This spot of funding had to be clearly tied to the COVID pandemic. The CARES funding had to be fully spent by November 15, 2020. The CDBG dollars had to be approved by HUD by November 20. The staff team presented a resolution on how to allocate CDBG funding on January 27, 2021. The Council suggested we strike the funding in one. Then there were additional funds. They had to be in the HUD category. In February 2021, PED staff began working with Keystone with their community food site proposal. Staff determined it would be a good fit for the remaining CDBF funding. Keystone went through the same application and review. City staff determined it was a strong fit for the remaining balance: it met the eligibility rules, response to COVID, public facilities project, so they wouldn't have to amend the plan approved by HUD. Keystone is in front of the Council for review. City staff subjected this proposal with the same scrutiny as the rest of the proposals. The City does not put these funds out for RFP. They work with a few organizations that can meet the requirements. The process and screening were robust. Based on the questions they had, ideally, they would have had ongoing updates that staff was working with Keystone. They felt it was a good fit for the funding that they plowed straight ahead with the work. They could have ideally done some additional check-ins with the Council.

Noecker thanked McCarthy, too. She is planning to vote in support.

Councilmember Jalali said she speaks in support of Keystone.

Councilmember Thao said he is in favor of it. From 2000 to 2007, he served as Keystone's Director. It is a solid organization with good integrity. They are intentional about serving the needs in our community. They continue to do the hard work. He will be supporting them.

Councilmember Prince said her concern has been the lack of communication from the Administration and on any number of issues related to the availability of federal money. She appreciates the report. She had the opportunity to speak to McCarthy. The Council passed on a recommendation in November. She will vote in support of this today.

Councilmember Jalali said she appreciates the colleagues point on this. Keystone will be moving. It is a part of the community that has seen challenges during the pandemic. There has been some pandemic crime. This will serve many people outside the City. It is part of the context and bigger picture values.

Council President Brendmoen said she will be voting in support of this. She wanted to lift up Mary McKeown.

Councilmember Tolbert said he will be supporting this. Keystone relies on volunteers

in a lot of ways.

Some of the writers claim that by raising the minimum price to \$10 a pack, the price of cigarettes and chewing tobacco would be \$15. That is not correct. The tobacco tax collected by the State is collected by the wholesaler. There is a sales tax, so it may go up a few pennies. The average price of cigarettes is close the \$10 right now. She thanked people who contacted them on both sides of this issue. It is time for retailers to find another way to bring customers in the door. Cigarettes kill people.

Councilmember Tolbert said that they have seen any public health successes like we have had with smoking. Back in the day, everyone smoked. Smoking is dangerous. We know how dangerous it is and how addictive. One of the best things we have done as a society and because of these laws, public health has changed. If people are not smoking early, they probably will not start.

Councilmember Prince thanked her colleagues. A business model that is based on selling controlled substances is subjecting itself to all manners of regulations. When the State settled with tobacco companies over their practices of hurting the public, it should have been clear that it is a risky business. The Association for Nonsmokers is bringing forward important regulation and building a coalition for this work.
