		Council President Lantry said the matter would be laid over to March 6 because Public Works had filed an appeal to a Heritage Preservation Commission (HPC) decision on the sidewalk expansion, and the public hearing for that appeal would be held on March 6.
		John Maczko, Public Works, gave a staff report. He said they had taken another look since the previous Council meeting and were now proposing an 18-foot sidewalk, a bus/bike line, and two traffic lanes, with 16 parking spaces added back in during all hours except the morning rush hour. He said the HPC had denied the request, and Public Works was appealing the decision.
		In opposition: John Mannillo (1335 Beechwood Place) read from a statement of opposition. He said the plan was an unneeded, permanent change to the Lowertown Historic District, and there were less costly ways for the City to revitalize Lowertown. He displayed photographs demonstrating current sidewalk use and parking demand, and challenges faced by buses and trucks maneuvering in current traffic lanes. He suggested alternatives for creating space for outdoor dining.
		Bill Hosko (400 N. Robert Street) noted the recent trend of a net loss of businesses on street level and skyway level in downtown and the increase in housing, and said there was a need for on-street parking. He said the proposal was filled with good intentions, but the benefits of a wider sidewalk on 6th street were outweighed by the losses.
		Steve Wojta (584 Marshall) appeared with his son Jacob. He said they used the handicapped spots at the downtown YMCA, and he expressed concern about the difficulties and dangers of getting his son in and out of their van if the street were made a one-way. He said the swimming at the Y was a very important part of his son's life, and the Council should consider the effect of their decision on people like his son.
		Matt Hill (361 Summit Avenue) said he was on the HPC but was speaking as a citizen. He said citizens were engaged against the project, the only public hearing was in front of the HPC recently, and incomplete details were provided at that time. He asked why established guidelines were not being adhered to and why the City was unwilling to wait for results of an ongoing parking study. He suggested looking to Minneapolis and their embrace of historic preservation around the new ball park, and he asked that the Council wait for a compromise that had the support of citizens and business owners.
		Mark Baynk (198 6th Street E) spoke about the potential effects of the proposal on

Mark Baynk (198 6th Street E.), spoke about the potential effects of the proposal on traffic and parking for residents of the building in which he resided. He said he supported the entertainment district and the use of pop-up sidewalks in the summer, but objected to permanent concrete sidewalks through the winter.

Bob Rysette, downtown condominium association board member, said the members of the association were very opposed to the proposal for the reasons already expressed. He questioned making a change when the impacts of the ball park and light rail weren't known yet. Jack Gerten, manager of the St. Paul Farmers Market, spoke about the negative economic impact the loss of the parking spaces would have on the Market and vendors. He asked that the project be re-evaluated after the Saints stadium was complete.

#### In support:

Chuck Repke appeared representing the two building owners requesting the sidewalk extension. He distributed background information on community meetings held on the issue in May 2010, and said the large majority of downtown residents were in support of the project. He said current opposition was related to the loss of parking, but most of the parking had been restored. He said the building owners benefited from on-street parking and had no interest in changing it, and the real issue was the desire to put in sidewalk cafes. He said there was currently no space for walking because of light posts and other obstructions, and it was ludicrous for the HPC to set a 10-foot-wide unobstructed sidewalk as a standard.

Annie Kopplin (214 4th Street E.) said outdoor dining options in Lowertown were limited. She said only six parking spots were being taken, and parking ramp capacity had increased.

After consulting with Deputy City Attorney Jerry Hendrickson, Council President Lantry suggested closing the public hearing since the next item coming forward on the issue would be the Public Works appeal.

Councilmember Thune moved to close the public hearing and lay the matter over to March 6.

Assistant Chief Bill Martinez and Sergeant Trish Englund gave a staff report on the investigation, closing, and review of the Crime Lab, and steps being taken to bring the lab into accreditation and re-open it under a new management plan. Assistant Chief Martinez said the contingency funds would allow them to finalize and move forward with the plans.

Councilmember Tolbert noted the significant amount of the contingency fund and asked how the operations of the re-opened lab would differ from the one closed by Chief Smith. Sergeant Englund said the primary difference would be the addition of certified scientists, an additional officer, a crime lab director with certification in either drug chemistry or latent examinations and crime scene processing. She said changes to the infrastructure of the lab itself and additional training for personnel would also be required for accreditation. She confirmed that the final plan included a partnership with the State Bureau of Criminal Apprehension (BCA) to conduct final drug testing. She said the Police Department would fund two scientists at the lab to give their cases priority.

In response to questions from Councilmember Stark, Assistant Chief Martinez said the outside experts brought in to review crime lab processes recommended keeping fingerprint analysis onsite for faster turnaround times, and sending drug testing to the BCA because they had better equipment.

Councilmember Thune said given the nature of the situation, he thought the recommendations would have come out at a public meeting rather than along with the request for funds, and he felt there should have been public discussion rather than just private briefings. He said it seemed like a lot of money was being spent on fingerprinting. He said drug testing was used in the prosecution of felonies, which was done by the County but not by the City. He asked about the potential for sharing with the County. Assistant Chief Martinez said that had been discussed but not finalized. Council President Lantry clarified that the City would be sending two scientists to the BCA and the County would be sending one. She said the City used to do the County's testing.

Councilmember Thune asked what the cost increase would be from the previous year. Todd Hurley, Office of Financial Services, said outside of the one-time costs for the accreditation and build-out, there would be an increase in operating costs of \$700,000 over the budgeted base of \$800,000. Councilmember Thune expressed concern about the amount of money being spent to do fingerprints when other departments were being asked to cut back. Assistant Chief Martinez said the \$700,000 was for crime scene processing in addition to latent fingerprint analysis. Councilmember Thune said the police department was great but he wished there had been a broader discussion.

In response to a question from Councilmember Bostrom, Mr. Hurley said the one time costs for equipment, build-out and accreditation was about \$451,000.

Councilmember Bostrom stressed the importance of stability, consistency, and competence in the lab leadership, especially with regards to the ability to provide expert testimony in court. Assistant Chief Martinez said the civilian lab manager would be a certified forensic scientist specializing in the analysis of latent prints. He said there would also be permanent civilian staff working along with officers doing crime scene analysis. Sergeant Englund reviewed the training program and process for officers assigned to the crime lab. She said the goal was for the lab to be accredited by this time next year in crime scene response, processing, and latent comparisons.

There was further discussion of the process of lab accreditation and personnel certification, and the role and capabilities of the crime lab.

Councilmember Stark said the additional \$700,000 per year is more palatable when it is made clear that the alternative is unacceptable, and that was not discussed as it should have been.

Councilmember Tolbert reviewed with Sergeant Englund the details of the crime lab capabilities and staffing. He expressed disappointment in the public process and reiterated Councilmember Thune's concerns about the amount of money being spent. He stressed the importance of the work of the crime lab and said he hoped the Council would see justification for the extra funds.

Councilmember Carter stressed the importance of communication and trust between the police department and the community.

Councilmember Thune said the City was done a disservice by the consultant because there were no options given. He said the money would be coming out of other departments.

Council President Lantry said the police department had a \$100 million budget and the additional money might not have to come from other departments. She reiterated Councilmember Stark's point that the situation was not perfect but the alternatives were worse.

No one appeared in opposition; Councilmember Bostrom moved to close the public hearing and approve the resolution.

Steve Semple, Hoovers Pub, 755 Jackson, said he supported the project but wanted to be put at the end of the project. He said the bar wasn't making it now, and closing

the street street would close the bar.

Larry Lund (160 E. Acker Street) said he had spoken with someone in Councilmember Carter's office earlier in the day, and had a petition of opposition signed by over 75% of his neighbors. He said the street had been repaved ten years before and there were new sidewalks and trees. He questioned why new curbs and other improvements weren't done at that time. He said Jackson Street pavement and curbs were done more recently and were in worse shape, and he questioned being assessed for improvements that lasted for such a short time. He said the proposed lighting did not provide adequate illumination and was not an improvement.

Gary Schriefer, owner of a commercial property at 150 East Acker Street, said he was opposed because the new sidewalks were done in 1989 or 1990. He said property taxes had increased astronomically since 2005, and commercial taxes were outrageous.

John Douville (757 L'Orient Street ) said he had signed a petition to opt out of cobblestone pavers on the street and get it changed to pavement. He said there was a lot of semi truck traffic on Acker from Jackson to L'Orient and he was concerned about wear on the street and the potential need to redo the street and be assessed again. He said he was in favor of the proposed lighting, rain gardens, and artwork.

Janine Benoit (111 York), with husband Brad Benoit, said a petition had gone around the neighborhood, and they were opposed to the project. She said they'd lived there for 25 years and the streets seemed fine. Mr. Benoit noted the amount of truck traffic on York and said he was opposed to the project.

Tong Yang, owner of four properties on York and one on Agate, said the cost for him would be \$15,000 and he couldn't afford it.

Helen Bond, representative of D.W. Jones trucking on Acker Street, said they had a beautiful street on Acker Street but Jackson was atrocious. She said commercial assessments were astronomical, and the increase was going to drive commercial businesses out.

Jim Davis, owner of seven light industrial lots on Acker Street, said the streets were in good shape, and residential lighting would not be sufficient for the industrial side of the street.

Kay Phernetton (174 Acker) said he was opposed to the project. He said the lighting was adequate and the streets were in good shape. He said he didn't see a reason for beautification of a street that was going to cut off when the highway was moved.

Gene Tschida, property owner at 168 Acker Street, said he didn't support the petition initially, but after hearing testimony he was against the project.

*Terry Jasinski (11 East Acker Street) said the streets were fine and the lighting was sufficient.* 

In opposition on Madison-Benson project:

Richard Wiggin (1808 Benson Avenue) said the street could only be widened by taking from his property and from the property behind his; he spoke about how that would affect the properties. He said he lived on Social Security and a small pension, and didn't need the improvements. He said the street was in good shape.

Richard Anderson (2211 Benson Avenue) said he was happy with the street the way

it was. He said the water main was put in in 1965. He said he was retired and he suggested trying to find grant money for the project.

Councilmember Tolbert read the names of a couple who had come to testify in support of the Glen Terrace opt-out but hadn't been able to stay.

Councilmember Brendmoen moved to close the public hearing. Yeas - 6 Nays - 0 (Bostrom not present for vote)

Council President Lantry noted that state law required that at least 20% of the payment for a project has to come from the benefiting property owners and the rest is paid by the rest of the city.

Councilmember Brendmoen said she got the sense there was the desire to discuss the opt-out process, but for the sake of honoring the process she would offer an amendment for those property owners who had signed petitions, even though she felt the investment should be made. Councilmember Carter said he recognized the financial constraints faced by residents and he respected the efforts of those who came to testify, but he stressed that the roads were a network for everyone and also a reflection of the neighborhood aesthitically. He said he was glad for opt-out program because it called out a street to be looked at from a public perspective, and he asked for time to allow staff to evaluate the current condition of possible opt-out streets and the cost to do them later.

Council President Lantry said it wasn't just maintenance of what was visible, but infrastructure too. She said she liked the opt-out provision.

Councilmember Stark said the program was misunderstood and was primarily for replacing essential infrastructure that was mostly below the street. He said he didn't like the opt-out option but felt the Council should honor it since they had it. He noted that it was the second year in a row with row with significant opt-out petitions, and said there should be a policy discussion. He said it would be good to have more information, given the testimony about streets being back on the list after having been done in 1989.

Councilmember Carter said he didn't mind the opt-out provision but felt it should be made clear that the petition from residents was not the only criteria used to make a decision.

Council President Lantry confirmed with Dan Haak from Public Works that the item could be laid over for a week. She said the Council approved the RSVP projects every year and there already was the opportunity to get additional information. She also noted that the assessments were getting too expensive for a lot of people in the City, and that affected some areas of the City more than others.

In response to questions from Councilmember Tolbert, Council President Lantry clarified the procedure and timing for adding opt-outs to the project. Councilmember Tolbert said he didn't like the opt-out provision, in part because it wasn't clear that the opt-outs required Council approval as well as the petition. He acknowledged hardships being faced by residents but said the projects needed to be done and setting them aside could result in greater expense later and was not a good policy decision for the city as a whole.

Council President Lantry said when projects in her ward were done her experience was that property owners were aware that opting out was subject to Council approval. Ms. Falk-Thompson said they made that very clear to property owners.

Councilmember Carter moved a one week layover so he could get information from staff about his opt out.
