



THE PROBLEM

A very small number of high-risk people in any community are involved in the majority of violent activity.





Focused Attention on Highest Risk Groups

Identify in real time small numbers of the highest risk people and groups


Open lines of direct and respectful communication with them

Establish clear standards against violence and for safety and success from people influential with those at highest risk Offer meaningful support to keep people safe, alive, and out of prison

Reserve strategic consequences as a last resort for if/when groups continue to shoot and kill

Project PEACE and Operation ASPIRE

158 Referrals to Project PEACE from ASPIRE

- 103 referrals requested from parent or family member for services
- 33 victims of gun violence
- 26 individuals involved in group violence
- 27 individuals involved in youth violence
- 14 individuals involved in other forms of behaviors

Outcomes:

- 44 referrals remained with ONS to receive direct services
- 72 interventions completed by ASPIRE Officers
- 18 families relocated to new housing options
- 60 referrals to other City or County agencies
- 35 referrals to Community-based Organizations
- 119 guns seizures

Referral #1 After being shot currently relocated (own apartment), graduated HS and working internship with MNDOT

Referral #2 After being shot working in trades programming, still participating with Healing streets community navigator

Referral #3 currently engaged with Healing Streets, Community Navigators, ONS and JK movement with completion of 1st term of summer school and job with Right Track

Referral #4 Connection with ASPIRE Officer, housing and employment secured and starting college in the fall on athletic scholarship

ONS/SPPS Violence Intervention/Prevention Pilot

ONS partnered with Saint Paul Public Schools Office of Security and Emergency Management (OSEM) and Office of Family Engagement and Community Partnerships (OFECP) to develop a Pilot School Violence Intervention and Prevention (VIP) Program to support violence reduction in SPPS high schools.

This program utilizes community-based violence intervention strategies on school campuses and is a strong collaboration between city government, SPPS, and community-based organizations to address youth violence.

- Responded and provided on-campus safety presence
- Partnership conversations and school safety collaboration
- Innovative Solutions, TRUCE Center 8518 and Healing Streets worked with affected family members
- Ongoing safety support and engagement
- Designing community support and adaptable liaison for schools



NSCC Update

April 5, 2023- Neighborhood Safety Community Council welcomed 8 new members in addition to the Chair and Vice Chair.

As a collective NSCC plans to conduct /host six community conversation/year in order to hear the concerns for community safety. Establishing public safety goals, researching organizations, and partnering with community programs to address current and preventative public safety measures.

Currently:

- NSCC has conducted 4 out of 6 conversations
 - 1. Dec 6, Educational Professionals
 - 2. Dec 13, Community Organizations
 - 3. Dec 20, Public Safety Professionals
 - 4. Jan 10, Business Professional
- The conversations have started regarding plans to host community conversations
 with additional educational professionals to discuss partnerships within district 45,
 and St. Paul's Alternative school district.



NSCC- Community and City Participation

In addition to monthly meetings, each NSCC member will participate in 3 community outreach events a year assisting ONS in community outreach. Members also have opportunities to become involved in various departments within the City of St. Paul involving community or department safety planning. Since December 2023, many of the members have already participated in 6 or more events.

Recently members have volunteered, or are actively participating in the following:

- What's Going On Night- Griggs Recreation Center
- SPPD Police Interviews (2 rounds)
- SPPL Safety & Incident Management Planning Team (monthly 4hour workshops)
- Safe Summer Night Events (9 events)
- SP Parks & Rec Audit- Staff Safety Conversations (3 days, 2hour sessions)



NSCC- ARPA Community Grants Planning

February-May 2023 ONS Director and Neighborhood Safety Community Council Manager work extensively with ARP Team building RFP and grant application database before application launch. Once application closes applications are screened for eligibility according to RFP guidelines and ARP Federal requirements pre NSCC 50% capacity establishment.











NSCC- ARPA Funding Awards

Once the NSCC was staffed to 50% capacity, their first, priority action item is to make final recommendations for ARP funding awards. The program goals must assist in the reduction of gun violence.

 NSCC were granted additional council members April of 2023 and the grant work begun at meeting 2 (June 6, 2023). Council members are on schedule according to the timeline to achieve the goal of making final recommendations to ONS by mid August, with distribution of funds in October 2023.

ARPA Camera Update

The Project PEACE Technology and Equipment Initiative is a response to violence which provides resources for security cameras and other physical security enhancements to small businesses and nonprofit social service and community centers (including religious institutions and health clinics) that are at high risk of violence. The intent is to enhance private security systems at local business and community centers located within low-income neighborhoods disproportionately impacted by an increase in violence since the pandemic.

- The City will purchase technology and equipment, and distribute it to eligible recipients
- The Office of Neighborhood Safety (ONS) and Saint Paul Police Department (SPPD) will identify eligible recipients via CPTED assessments and community data
- Cameras purchased and delivered (7/28/23)
- Installation has begun (8/1/23)
