Resolution Language:

now, therefore, be it RESOLVED, that the Saint Paul City Council hereby commits to a goal of zero traffic deaths and serious injuries on all surface streets in Saint Paul by 2045, with an interim goal of 50 percent reduction in fatal and serious injury crashes within ten years; and


2040 Comprehensive Plan

 - Reduce the number of pedestrian crashes and eliminate traffic-related fatalities and injuries








Fatalities and Serious Injuries, 2018-2022

Vulnerable Road Users, 2018-2022



What Does This Mean?


- This is a significant commitment that will need to be supported all of our departments and city leadership on an ongoing basis
- Staff needs to be more intentional in our safety work and needs to update our standards, practices, and programming to assure the best safety outcomes
- Need to improve funding for basic operational services. This is both an existing need as well as a need that will grow as we continue to implement more safety focused designs.
- Additional capital funding for safety work.





What's Next

- Complete Phase 1 of our Transportation Safety Action Plan work
- Submit application for Safe Streets for All Implementation Funding (Eastside Systematic Transportation Safety Improvement Project)
- Start work on Phase 2 of our Transportation Safety Action Plan work
- Update our standards, practices, and programming to assure the best safety outcomes
- Continue policy discussions on funding needs and priorities.
