I am writing in regards to the two variances being considered for the Linwood Campus of Linwood Monroe Arts Plus (1023 Osceola). I fully support the proposed upgrades to Linwood Monroe Arts Plus facilities on both campuses and hope that you will, too.

I am a 20 year veteran teacher at the school teaching across both campuses. My husband and I also send our two children to Linwood Monroe Arts Plus. We have one child at each campus. Due to my unique role as a teacher and parent in the school, I fully understand the needs of the community.

We are an arts infused program supporting supporting all students. Our population includes a Language Academy Program for new arrivals to our country, as well as a large Developmental and Cognitive Delay Program. With unique programming comes unique need. As a privileged parent in this community, I need to speak up for members of my community who do not have a voice: Those learning English and those with developmental delays. Linwood Monroe Arts Plus students deserve a 21st century facility. The school community needs:

- Right size classrooms to meet the standards of MDE guidelines.
- Breakout rooms to meet the needs of our many special learners.
- Separate cafeteria so that student work in and through the arts can be shared and students have available physical education space in a separate gym/auditorium.
- Updated HVAC: students currently suffer from extreme heat and cold due to insufficient mechanicals in the buildings.
- Developmentally appropriate separation of students by grade level: Ideally Linwood Campus would be PreK-5 and Monroe Campus 6-8. I understand that compromise is needed due to space constraints, so I am willing to accept PreK-4 together at Linwood even though I do not believe this is best for elementary students in grade 5.
- Updated use of existing footprint at Monroe Campus: A centrally located elevator will increase accessibility for our community.
- Handicap accessible bathrooms, gym and performance spaces. It is negligible that these are not already in place.
- Increased and improved play space: Indoor recess in a gym during lunchtimes is a necessity during inclement and extreme weather in Minnesota. The larger community will also benefit from improved outdoor play space.

It is beyond comprehension that anyone could argue against the needed renovation. I happily invite you to our school to see for yourself how the renovations are needed. I reiterate my support for the renovation across both campuses of Linwood Monroe Arts Plus.

I am a member of the Linwood Monroe community as both a parent and teacher. This letter is being written in full support of the proposed upgrades to Linwood Monroe Arts Plus facilities on both campuses.

Linwood Monroe Arts Plus is a school where all students learn in and through the arts. We support arts residencies in every grade K - 8. We have a language academy program for students new to the country, and a large Developmental and Cognitive Delay program. Our school population and programs present unique and varied needs.

There are many needs around the proposed expansion at Linwood Monroe Arts Plus:

- Increased size of classrooms that are large enough to meet MN Dept. of Education standards



My son Henry and I are writing letters together because we agree the expansion for Linwood Monroe Arts Plus (LMAP) is important to our family and to all of the children to attend our school.

The children deserve to have dedicated gym, cafeteria, and stage space. This is critical for a school with an arts infused education. Sharing one space becomes difficult, particularly when the kids are rehearsing for a special performance during an arts residency such as the third graders' Taiko drumming residency. The coordination of lunch times is such that some children eat really early or late, making it difficult for hungry children to pay attention. This situation is unacceptable in any school, but particularly so in a Title I school Last but not least, the children do not have a place to play at recess during inclement weather, which is of course the overwhelming majority of the time in Minnesota.

Ideally, the lower campus would house ECFE, pre-K, K-5, and the upper school would house 6-8 grades. The planned compromise is that pre-K and K-4 will be at Linwood and ECFE and 5<sup>th</sup> grade remain at Monroe. This plan provides more continuity for pre-K-4 and thus more stability. This improvement in stability is an equity issue. As LMAP is a Title I school, this initiative addresses the educational gap across races and ethnicities, which is obviously a tragic embarrassment for the capital city in a state that has such diversity and a reputation for inclusion and opportunity for all.

Numerous aspects of the FMP plans for both schools will render them more accessible, including the performance space. This improvement is doubly critical for the only school in area F1 with DCD M/M/S/P programming that is dedicated to an arts infused education.

Teachers and staff have contributed to the plans for LMAP so that the changes will improve conditions for all teachers and students: the classrooms will no longer be uncomfortably hot or cold. Furthermore, the teaching space will be up to modern standards. Several changes and compromises have been made to these plans in order to appease the critics. Many of these changes have been improvements through constructive interaction. Nevertheless, some critics continue to oppose the plan in its current form. These critics demand that the school offerings be broken up or compromised—move title I somewhere else, move DCD M/M/S/P somewhere else, move ECFE and pre-K somewhere else. They don't seem to understand that the preservation of these programs under one school is an equity issue—the disruption for these children is unnecessary and harmful to their learning and development.

I want to bring up a final point: the combination of programming at LMAP is what makes the school so special. As a transracial family, we chose LMAP for its diversity. Since our son has attended LMAP, we have been amazed at the degree of diversity and inclusion, across so many domains: race, ethnicity, religion, family structure, sexual identity, country of origin, primary language spoken at home, physical abilities, and cognitive abilities. This "melting pot" school, with its combination of responsive classroom, language academy, title I, DCD M/M/S/P, arts infused education, is an amazing place for our son and all children to learn, play, learn how to get along with all sorts of people, work collaboratively, and express themselves through the arts. I ask you to please support the FMP changes for LMAP. Our children, teachers, and staff deserve the improvements outlined in this plan.

Dear Sean,

I am writing in support of the school district's plans to renovate both Linwood and Monroe schools. I am a parent of two children in the Linwood Monroe Arts Plus program: a Kindergartener & a 6th grader who has been part of the program since Kindergarten.

I attended the community meeting in April and heard the neighbors' concerns about the Linwood project in particular. I feel that many of these have been addressed in revised plans, which have improved the project overall. I want to express my support of moving these projects ahead.

A few notes on our particular perspective:

- This is a wonderful, thriving public school program. We chose Linwood Monroe through open enrollment when we were living in West Saint Paul. We moved to the Merriam Park neighborhood 18 months ago specifically to stay within the Linwood/Monroe busing area. The teachers and school leadership are dedicated, creative and care deeply about our children. The student body is highly diverse, which has been a strong positive for our family. My children are challenged, cared for and are thriving.
- The only difficult year we have had in this program has been 4th grade. My 4th grader was ready academically but not socially for the reality of essentially being in a middle school. We went from 'crossing under the rainbow' -- an annual ceremony to celebrate the end of 3rd grade to a middle school sports pep fest to start the 4th grade year. Now that she is in 6th grade, I love this middle school energy. It was just not the right fit for her as a 4th grader. I strongly support the parents and teachers who are citing research and best practice to move both Pre-K and 4th grade to the Linwood location.
- The changes to the Linwood plan would significantly increase the amount of space -- both indoors and out -- for active play. This is incredibly important for young children, and the current facility does not support the kind of outdoor or indoor activity that the renovation would.

We are proud members of the Saint Paul and the Linwood / Monroe community. These renovations would bring these schools into the modern era, ensuring they will continue to be strong, thriving programs for ALL of our community's kids for years to come.

Dear Mr. Diatta and the City of St. Paul,

I will be out of town when you hold the public hearing on the Linwood Elementary variance on September 12, so I would like to submit my thoughts in writing.

I live across the street from Linwood Elementary so I will be directly impacted by any changes made. My husband and I have lived in this apartment for 8 years, and the one next door for 3 years. In other words, I am a long-term resident who cares about this community and, more directly, about this neighborhood. I am also a graduate of St. Paul Public Schools, so I want the best for the kids that are being educated by them today as well.

I am in favor of upgrading the facilities so that they are comfortable, modern, and accessible. I am NOT in favor of SPPS's current plan, however, which is to drastically expand the student population (by some 50%) and then magically "right-size" the building on SPPS's smallest property. I am sure other attendees of the meeting will have facts and statistics showing the amount of children and playspace per square foot so I won't get into that in this letter. Suffice it to say, while they are pretending this will be good for the students, in fact it will not. If they really wanted what was best for the students, they would find a facility large enough to accommodate them as well as offering large outdoor spaces, which are vital to kids' development – yes, even here in Minnesota where supporters of this plan say "the kids don't play that much outside anyway, it's too cold." (That is simply ridiculous. Kids play outside every single day except the few each year when it's dangerously cold.)

I am sure that the proponents of the plan will tell you how much they have already "negotiated," "sacrificed," "listened," and "accommodated" the neighbors' needs. This is a lie. I have been to several meetings and seen several iterations of the plans, and while they have changed a few details, they have refused to back down on the main problems the plan poses: the enlarged school population, the towering addition (in the back of the lot it will feel much taller than 47 feet because of the grade – from soil to top at the back of the school it will be more like 60 feet), the fact that the west side of the building will be practically on top of the sidewalk, and so on. They have moved some classrooms around and tried to preserve more of the back play lot, but these differences are insignificant in the big picture. Nor have they ever explained satisfactorily why they don't move the entire school to a different building that would give the kids the space they need.

The truth is, throughout this process SPPS has been unconcerned with the character of the neighborhood. They have shown their disrespect to the neighbors repeatedly. As I type this, I can hear a bell ringing over and over again. In the midst of a tense situation, the school allowed a playground to be built (by Ka-Boom, Toro, MN Vikings) in early June that includes a loud bell as part of its "play" equipment. The playground is meant for toddlers and pre-K children, and believe me, once they figure out how to ring that bell, they ring it incessantly. We have been woken up by that bell as early as 7:30am and as late as 1am; there are no signs posted with playground hours or a reminder to be considerate of neighbors. The school simply doesn't care to acknowledge that it's not a suburban school, but a school that is shoulder-to-shoulder with people who actually live and work in the city. (Note: I have sent a complaint to the city about the bell via its web form, but I have not yet received any response. My husband and I often work from our home offices.)

In addition, their "no parking during school" signs are always out of date. I have had teachers yell at me for parking on their side of the street even though, per the hours posted on the signs, I was clearly within my rights to do so. If they have the busses coming later than what is currently posted on the signs, it is their responsibility to request new signs showing accurate hours. I have also had parents blocking our driveway, and parking on our side of the street before it's been plowed during snow emergencies, leading to our only parking spaces being lumpy and icy all winter, the street narrower, etc. I could go on, but my point is simply that the school has never accommodated its neighbors, nor shown us the least bit of respect.

The way I see it, Linwood-Monroe has become a very successful school, thanks to the dedication of the wonderful staff and the involvement of parents. If they are so successful, they should be allowed to expand and take on greater numbers of students. But a wildly successful, popular, and sought-after school should not be housed on the smallest school site in the city. The school tells us they are making our community better. That would be true if it were a good neighborhood school, but it's a magnet school, so actually very few of the people living here are able to get the benefits of enrolling their children there.

In closing, I would say I'm lucky. I'm lucky that my husband and I rent our home here because we will be able to move without taking a loss on selling a house if and when the school impacts the immediate neighborhood negatively, drastically, and permanently. Because if they are granted this variance, that will mean more traffic (both busses and parents bring their children to this school), no available parking on the days they hold events (already quite frequent), less sunlight and open space, *another* playground out front directly across from my bedroom window, and of course more bad blood between the school and the residents who live here. I am not up for that, and will be happy enough to leave, although sad to leave behind my great neighbors and what has been, up to this June, a wonderful place to live.

My name is Amy Moeller and my husband and I strongly support the proposed upgrades to Linwood Monroe Arts Plus facilities on both campuses and hope that you will too!

We have a son in 5th grade at the Monroe Campus and feel very strongly that this amazing school needs the facilities to support all they do for students of Saint Paul. I am sure you are familiar with all the ways in which these upgrades are important to create not only a 21st century learning environment but also to improve the handicap accessibility in the buildings.

We are saddened that a small group of people living around the Linwood Campus have made efforts to block these important improvements. We live approximately 12 blocks from the Linwood Campus, but I understand that since our zip code is not 55105 and because we have a child in the school, our opinions on the Linwood changes are not valued by those who live closer to the building. I guess they feel we are biased and can't understand the impact this would have to a neighbor. To that, I have a story to share.

Within the past year, we have been faced with the very same issues- all within blocks of our house. We live just 2 blocks from new construction for the Immersion Academy, Jardin, on Victoria and Hague Avenues. It should be opening its doors to students very soon now. But, in the months before this project began, we had conversations with each other and with neighbors about it. It was clear that we were sad and frustrated with elements of this project. For example, we were upset to see the historic building would be torn down only to be replaced with a very modern building that does not fit the historic integrity of other buildings in the neighborhood. We were also worried about the traffic and parking issues that were likely to be created with this new business. Finally, we were sad to review the plans for the building as we felt there would be a loss of open space around the building. All these arguments sound very familiar to the arguments presented by those opposing the Linwood improvements. The difference is that my husband and I fully supported this development. We did this because we acknowledged and appreciated the value that this immersion academy would bring to both our neighborhood and to the larger community of Saint Paul. Yes, we looked past the loss of the historic building and the perceived loss of open space to fully support and welcome this change so close to our back door. It was the right thing to do for Jardin and it is the right thing to do for Linwood Monroe Arts Plus.

Change can be difficult, but it is necessary for progress. Please support this effort and don't let the fear of change from a small number of very vocal people keep the important progress at Linwood Monroe Arts Plus from happening! Please be strong enough to support what is best for the community.

I'm writing to you to ask for your support and approval of the much needed expansion and renovation plan for the Linwood Monroe Arts Plus School (LMAP).

I'm blessed with a biracial child who is abled-bodied, an English speaker, and overall, a healthy 9 year old. LMAP is the only public, arts education pre-K to 8 school in Saint Paul, serving 67% students of color, 67% low-income students, 17% students with disabilities, and 38% ELL students, and most of our students come from outside the neighborhood. As you may know, Linwood is also a Developmental and Cognitive Disabilities and Language Arts designated school.

To say that Linwood Arts is a special place, is an understatement. My daughter, Isabelle, is thriving academically, socially and culturally. What parent would not want that for their child and to that end, for all children? Apparently, a group from Summit-Hill, the Linwood, Neighborhood Friends, do not seem to have the same wishes for our children.

The Summit-Hill neighborhood where Linwood Art Plus Lower Campus resides is 86% White, with a median income of \$72,389, 92.7% English is their native language, 7% identify as people with disabilities, and 72% of the residences have a \$300,000 plus assessed value. Most of these families send their children to other schools in the area.

These statistics matter when it comes to who is opposing the variances. Unfortunately, a small yet vocal group of Summit-Hill neighbors have been leading a very concerning campaign to stop the renovation and expansion of Linwood Arts. For a parent to hear comments from these neighbors referring to the children at Linwood as "cargo that needs to be moved, ""those kids," "juvenile homo sapiens" points to the implicit racism and classism embedded in their responses to the plan. It is deeply disturbing that my child has become "cargo that needs to be moved" by Summit Hill neighbors. Comments like these change the narrative from opposing on technical terms to opposing because of who the children are.

In this day and age, I would assume that investing in your public schools would be welcomed rather than contested. This project for renovations and expansions of Linwood Arts Plus is not about trivial updates to an existing building. These are critical updates that support a comprehensive declaration of equality of children of color, low income children, children with disabilities and children who are English language learners (ELL). The support from our St. Paul NAACP Chapter and the St. Paul Federation of Teachers agree that this is not just a zoning issue, it is an equity issue.

The vast majority of the project is about bringing Linwood up to code as mandated by the Americans with Disabilities Act passed 26 years ago. With 17% of the children with disabilities and the school classified as a DCD school, it is not adequate to simply assume that the fact that children have the opportunity to get on a bus, go to a wonderful school like Linwood, that they are not being isolated or reminded of their disabilities. Whether it is having only one accessible bathroom in the entire school to no bathroom in the nurses station that presses staff to put a sheet in between offices to give the child some privacy, those updates are not just necessary, they will help our children retain their dignity.

Despite the progress we have made as a society, we still live in a world that the rights of children with disabilities, children of color, low income children and new American children are not always protected and respected. This project has the ability to do just that, give our children a much deserved 21st century school.

As members of this board, I trust that you value our children, schools and communities. Because you have accepted a public service position, I'm asking you to support the Linwood Arts Plus variance request and school infrastructure that will benefit the children. We have an opportunity to turn equity into action.

I look forward to standing shoulder to shoulder with you to advocate for our St Paul kids and SPPS.
