On behalf of the Linwood Neighborhood Friends group which is composed of many neighbors who live near the Linwood School and/or frequently use the play ground and field at Linwood, please find attached an Executive Summary of our concerns with the two major variances as well as a more comprehensive document. Also, please find a view of the actual elevation of the proposed expansion as well as a diagram showing the height of other nearby apartment buildings, which demonstrates that the expansion is out of scale with other structures in the neighborhood. The height variance request combined with the lot coverage variance request makes for a massive building on the smallest school site in the entire district. Linwood Monroe Proposed Variances: A Neighborhood Perspective

A Short History of Our Group

When the neighbors within 350 feet of Linwood received the variance notice on 3/31/16, we organized to form *Linwood Neighborhood Friends* to do the following:

- Establish a working relationship with the SPPS.
- Work together to study the plans and advocate for our concerns.
- Create a public face to communicate information on the variances.
- Communicate our positions to people and entities who could help us engage further with the SPPS to create a solution for Linwood that would answer everyone's aims.

Our Position

We do not support the two proposed variances for these reasons:

- They fail to meet the six (6) points required by the Board of Zoning Appeals to grant a variance.
- They are inconsistent with the City Comprehensive Plan.
- They are inconsistent with the SHA Comprehensive Plan.

We do, however, strongly support all the proposed changes to improve the existing building to make it more functional and ADA compliant. In addition, we also support an appropriately scaled, 2-story addition that includes a new cafeteria.

Our Efforts to Communicate

As a group and as individuals of the group, we have tried to engage and work to achieve a solution that would benefit all parties: SPPS, Linwood School, and the neighborhood. To that end, we:
