Dear Mr. and Mrs. Vietor:

I'm writing regarding your request for the City of Saint Paul to remove the public boulevard tree in front of your home at 1566 Montana Avenue east. As you have explained it, you feel the tree is responsible for blocking your sewer line and creating costly service and/or repairs.

During our telephone conversation about a week ago I explained that unless there is a problem with the tree itself, e.g., a structural or health issue, or a construction/excavation issue where the tree needs to be removed, the City does not remove public boulevard trees over sewer line issues.

I agreed to have the tree investigated and this was done almost immediately after our conversation. As I understand, Forestry employee Greg Reese visited the site and talked with you, explaining that the 9 inch D.B.H. maple tree was in good health and not a candidate for removal.

I sympathize with your predicament knowing full well the cost you are incurring, especially if the sewer line or connections are leaking and need repair. This is usually the situation that occurs when tree roots infiltrate a sewer line and lead to a blockage. I encourage you to look closer into the condition of the line itself and, if you haven't already done so, you may want to explore the Department of Public Works to investigate anything that can be done about your sewer line connection to the city's sanitary system.

However, the boulevard tree is on the public right-of-way, is thriving in fine health, and is a valuable community asset. Again, as stated previously, the City's policy is to not remove trees in good health and condition.
