
Minnesota Has 10 CoCs

The U.S. Dept. of Housing & Urban Development (HUD) CoC Program:

"...is designed to:

- promote a community-wide commitment to the goal of ending homelessness;
- provide funding for efforts...to quickly rehouse homeless individuals...while minimizing the trauma and dislocation caused by homelessness;
- promote access to and effective utilization of mainstream programs, and
- optimize self-sufficiency among those experiencing homelessness."

(24 CFR part 578)





Heading Home Ramsey Continuum of Care (HHR CoC)

Vision:

We work together to create a community where homelessness is *rare*, *brief*, and *non-recurring*, where we eliminate racial disparities, and everyone is housed.

Mission:

Prevent and end homelessness by delivering effective, people-centered, integrated responses that are racially equitable and driven by community voice, advocacy, and learning.





Heading Home Ramsey: A Community-Wide Collaborative

Full CoC (open to all)

- · All can participate, meets twice per year
- Delegates responsibility to Governing Board through Charter and elected GB/SC members

Governing Board

- 21-25 members: 10 designated positions; remainder elected by full CoC
- Senior officials with decision-making authority
- Meets every other month

Ranking

Committee

Steering Committee

- 25 members: 12 appointed by GB; 13 elected from full CoC
- People with intimate knowledge of field, operations, and funding
- Meets monthly; establishes workgroups as needed

Work Groups

- Standing or ad hoc as established by Steering Committee to develop strategies into actionable workplans or explore options to solve particular concerns.
- At least one member of the Steering Committee must serve on each Work Group.

Heading Home Ramsey: A Community-Wide Collaborative

In a recent survey of our CoC membership:

- 20% of those responding identified as a person with the lived experience of homelessness,
- 39% identified as BIPOC,
- 23% identified as a member of the LGBTQIA community, and
- 19% identified as a person with a disability

Eviction Prevention Needs in Ramsey County

A Growing Crisis:



- In 2023, 5,172 Households sought prevention assistance
 - Of those, 860 Households were served
- 1 in 6 of those in needs of assistance are currently served
- Eviction filings are continuing to rise
 - Average of \$3,700 needed to prevent an eviction
- Rental Assistance needs range between \$3,500-\$6,700 on average




Sheltered & Unsheltered Homelessness in Ramsey County

A Growing Crisis:

- Between 2018 and 2024, unsheltered homelessness more than tripled.
- The 2024 Point-in-Time count found our largest-ever number of unsheltered individuals.
- Throughout 2023, there were an average of over 40 families waiting for space in family shelter.
- County warming spaces regularly hosted more than 150 adults and youth every night last winter.


TOTAL PEOPLE IN POINT-IN-TIME COUNT, 2018-2024





Shelters in Ramsey County Serve Regional Needs

- Ramsey County has just 9.5% of statewide population but has 24% of all state Emergency Shelter beds
- Ramsey County has the greatest density of Emergency Shelter in the metro area






Racial Disparities in Homelessness in Ramsey County

Our county has significant racial disparities in homelessness:

- Black people are 7.4 times more likely to be homeless than white people
- Native American people are 14.1 times more likely to be homeless than white people

Our Affordable Housing Crisis & Coordinated Entry

Need for Affordable Housing & Permanent Supportive Housing Exceeds Supply:


- Gap of over 18,000 housing units for those at or below 30% Area Median Income (AMI) in Ramsey County in 2020.
- Coordinated Entry (CE) Key Performance Indicators as of August 26th, 2024:
 - An average of 112 households are assessed each month.
 - 2,255 households on waiting list
 - Average wait time is 220 days





Shelter Strategic Planning Charge

Develop a strategic plan to advance collective efforts to provide shelter and emergency services to meet the needs of people experiencing homelessness in Ramsey County

- Ensure providers have access to physical and programmatic resources
- Address gaps identified by the HHR Needs Assessment and other data
- Identify short, medium and long-term strategies



HART Team

Continuing Need for Response

The City created the Homeless Assistance Response Team (HART) to address an unprecedented rise in homeless encampments amid a regional crisis in affordable housing.

Since then, we've connected more than 80 individuals to affordable housing and aided countless others with resources, information, or referrals to the numerous partner agencies.







Encampment Response

- The DSI Inspector regularly coordinates with private property owners to trespass and close encampments on private property.
- Re-occupied sites are posted with a 48-hour notice of reclosing. New sites are posted with a 72-hour notice.
- It is crucial to provide adequate notice to residents and to assess housing needs before occupants are required to relocate.







Interdepartment Response & Coordination



St. Paul Police Department

Each week, officers join the HART to assist unsheltered individuals and participate in cleanings. This is crucial for building trust and rapport in the community.



Ramsey County Social Workers

Assists in the response to unsheltered communities in an array of situations to supportive resources.



CARES

Offers essential medical services for unsheltered individuals in encampments, providing assistance as needed. Supporting vulnerable populations by ensuring they receive the medical care they require.



Familiar Faces

Committed to supporting unsheltered individuals adjacent to the encampment work currently being done.
Offering assistance to those that frequently cycle through the system.

Referring Partners

Familiar Faces will be individuals who are frequent utilizers of emergency response—

- Law enforcement (SPPD and Metro Transit)
- Saint Paul Fire and EMS
- City of Saint Paul Optimal Response Teams-HART, CARES, ONS (Office of Neighborhood Safety)
- Ramsey County COC Partners
- City of Saint Paul and Ramsey County Attorney's Office
- Hospital Emergency Rooms

Focus of the Familiar Faces Initiative

Familiar Faces will focus on systems mapping, design, and improvement work centered on creating a system of integrated care for complex health populations that are also experiencing homelessness. The Familiar Faces Initiative will consist of the following components.

- 1). An Intensive Care Management Team
- 2). A dedicated transitional/interim shelter space
- 3). System reform

Familiar Faces will be a sentinel population



Familiar Faces Timeline and Budget

Year One-2024 Infrastructure Build-Out and Design

- Evaluate homeless response, criminal justice, and health systems and identify gaps by creating case studies
- Build out job description series for intensive case management team
- Partner with Canopy Roots on the development of recommendations for the redesign of Optimal Response Teams within the City of Saint Paul
- Relationship build with City Departments and build support for Familiar Faces program
- Create and build out Apricot Data Base and Case Management Software
- Due Diligence associated with HOME-ARP funding and purchase of 268 Marshall
- Begin onboarding the Intensive Care
 Management team starting with Outreach

Year Two- 2025 Familiar Faces Implementation

- Close on the property located at 268 Marshall
- Construction and Rehab of 268 Marshall
- Complete onboarding Intensive Care Management team
- Begin staff training components developed by Canopy Roots
- Create Familiar Faces Advisory Board
- Finalize programmatic policies and procedures
- Release RFP for building/provider operator
- Open Familiar Faces Stabilization center fall of 2025

CRISIS INTERVENTION

Prevent and respond to incidents of violent, dangerous, and criminal activity in our city.

Examples:

- Police Officers
- · Fire Fighters
- Paramedics

Interrupt cycles of crime and violence, and lighten the load for officers by engaging professionals as rapid responders to connect people in crisis to supportive resources.

Examples:

- Social Workers
- Community Public Health Workers
- Housing Counselors

SAFETY BY DESIGN

Data-drive investments to reduce high-potential residents' likelihood to become an offender or victim.

Examples:

- Grief Counseling
- Youth Jobs/Summer Programs
- Workforce Training
- Housing for Returning Residents

Investment in Crime Prevention through Environmental Design (CPTED) in our highest-potential neighborhoods.

Examples:

- Lighting and Sight-Line Improvements
- Activation of Public Spaces
- Natural Access
- Cleaning and Maintenance



A Vision for the Future

The vision for Familiar Faces puts the client at the center of a care team that includes the flexibility to address the level of care and specific needs of the individual. The goal of this approach is to achieve the following outcomes:



Improved health status



Improved housing stability



Reduced avoidable hospital emergency department use



Reduced criminal justice involvement

- Over \$11 million (97%) is granted to service providers for programmatic purposes
- \$335,000 (3%) in Administrative funds support planning staff (contracted partners also get a share of Administrative funds)
- Program spending periods vary; this is snapshot of current 1-year cycle






Where HHR Funding Goes by Project Type

State Legislative Strategy 2025

- HHR voted on 9/19/24 directing staff to pursue a coalition approach with Hennepin, service providers.
 - Address additional funding gaps faced by providers, despite increases in current biennium and supplemental increases in upcoming biennium
 - Address fiscal cliffs faced by counties due to end of federal pandemic relief funding
 - Build capacity in Greater Minnesota to access long-term funding streams (e.g., Medical Assistance, Housing with Supports, case management, etc)
- All funding in bill would be for five years. Bill would not authorize perpetual funding.
- Bill is designed to reflect true statewide impact
- State Capitol Environment: Budget year, possible political changes, committee structure.
