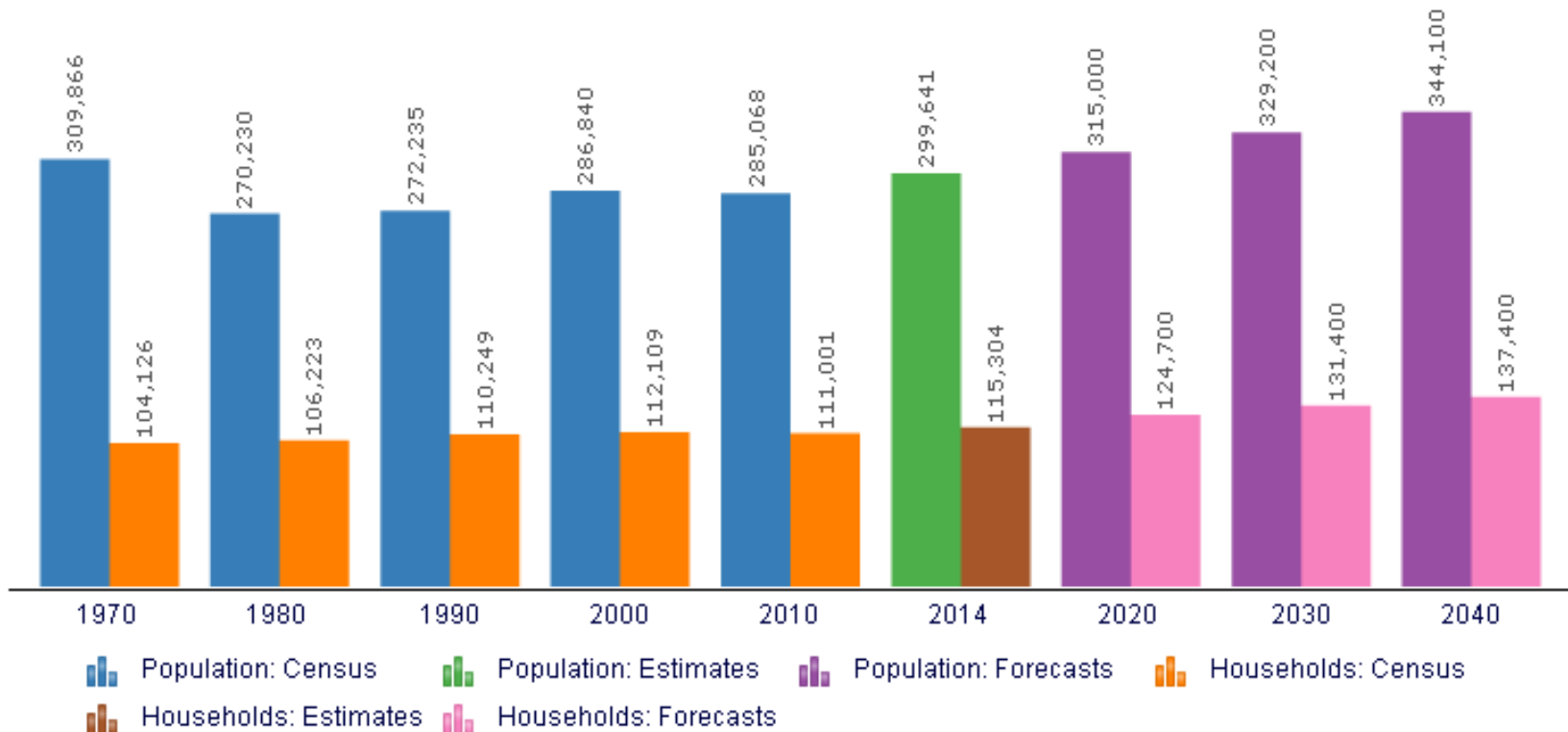

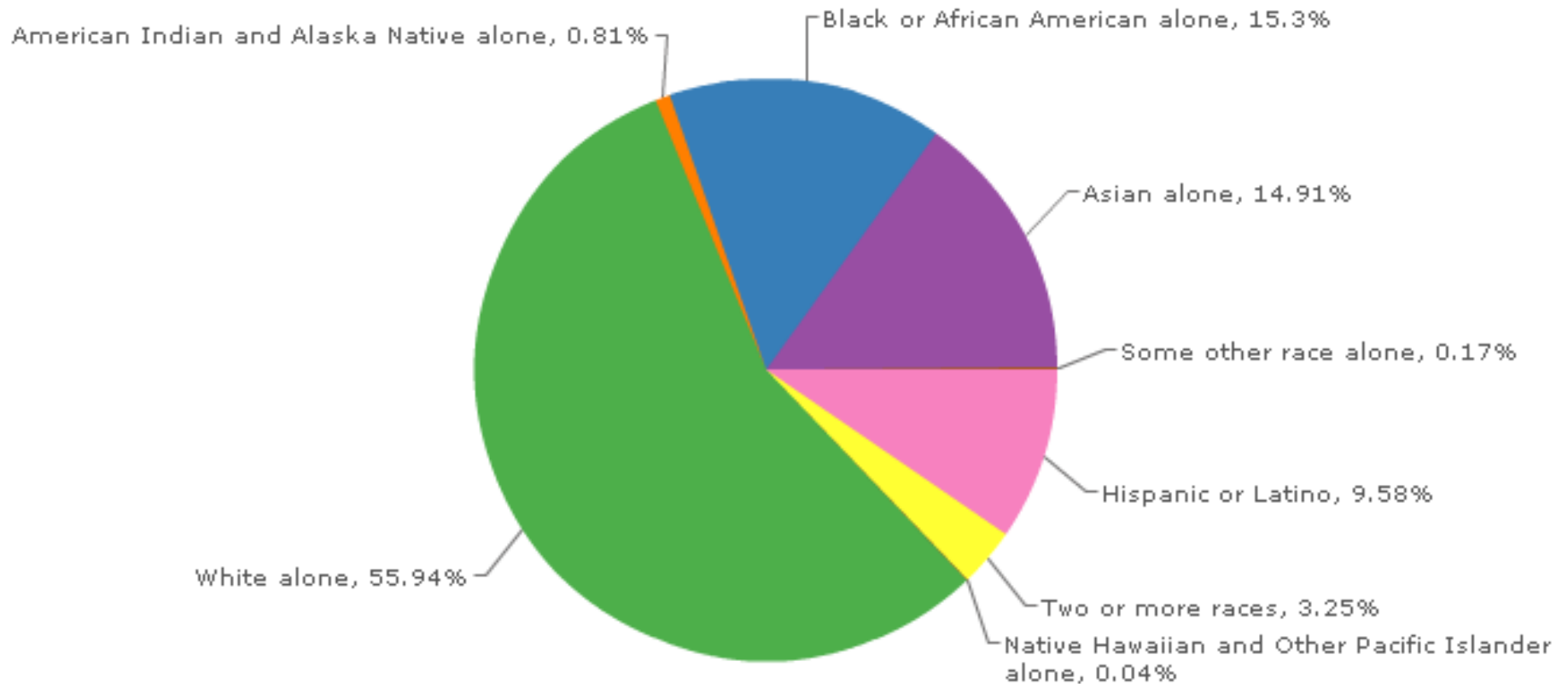

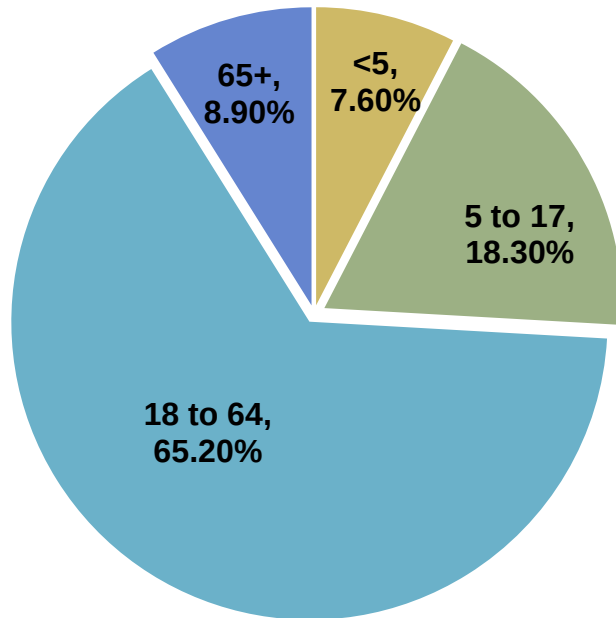
Population by Race and Ethnicity in St. Paul



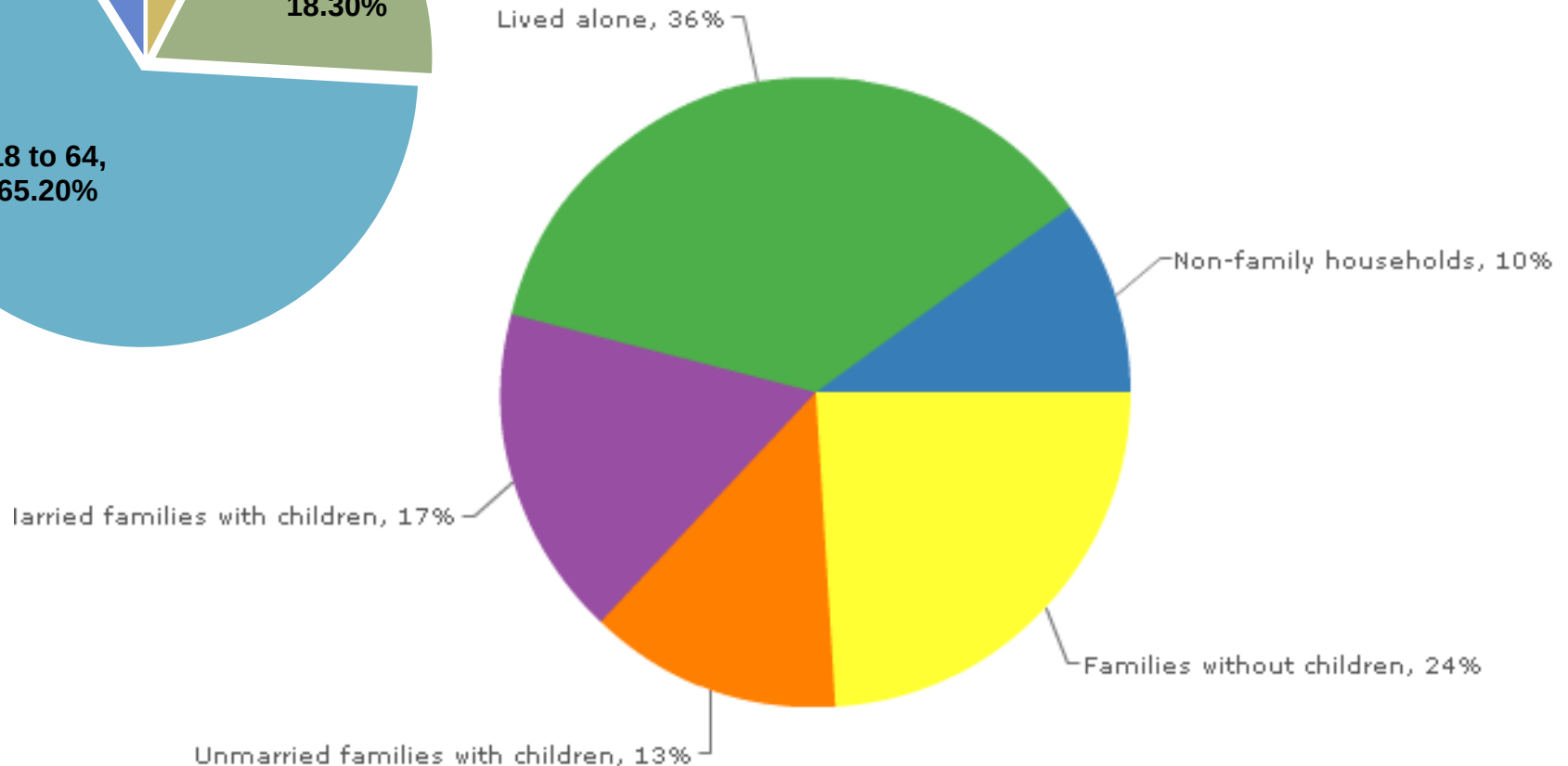

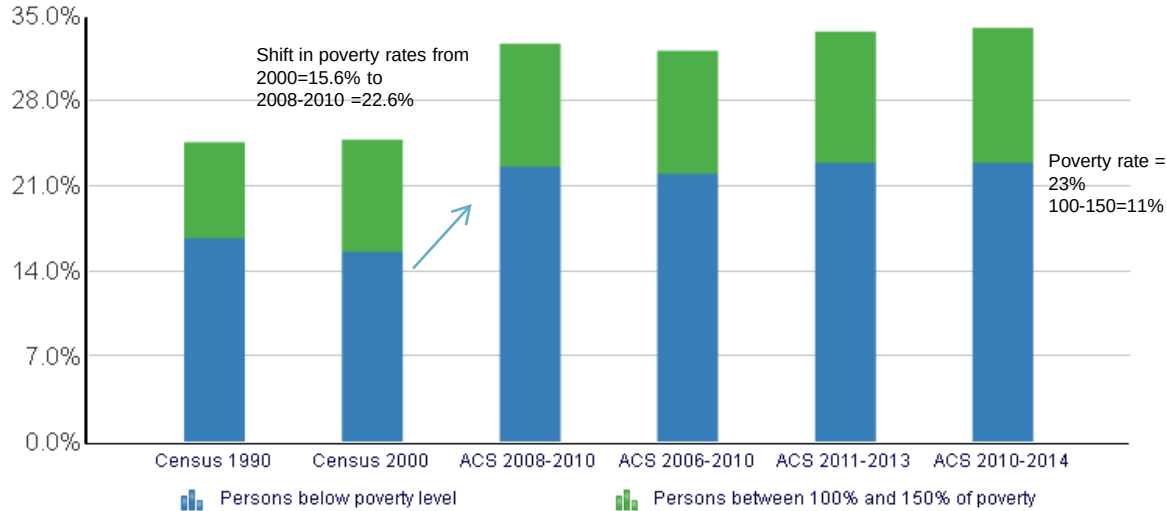
Official Poverty Measure

The U.S. Census Bureau determines poverty status by comparing pre-tax cash income against a threshold that is set at three times the cost of a minimum food diet in 1963, updated annually for inflation using the Consumer Price Index and adjusted for family size, composition, and age of householder.

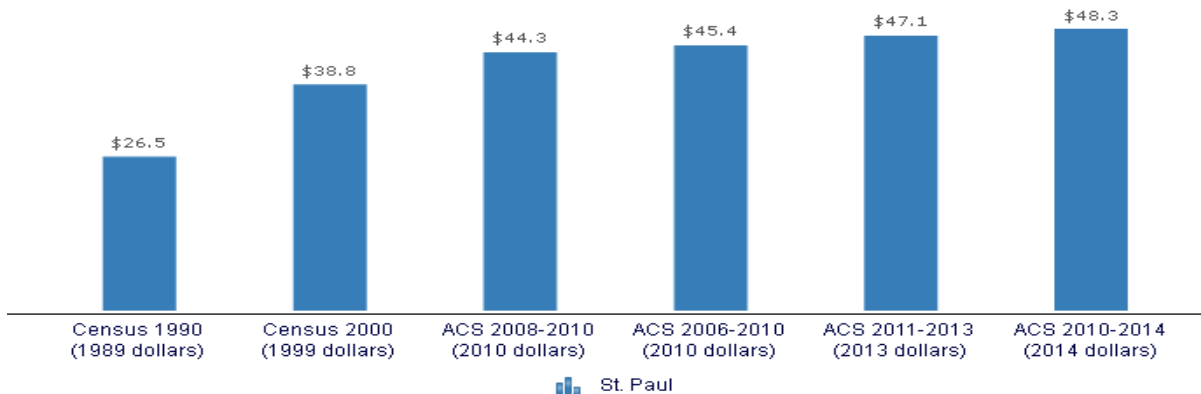

Percent of the St. Paul Population Below the Federal Poverty Level



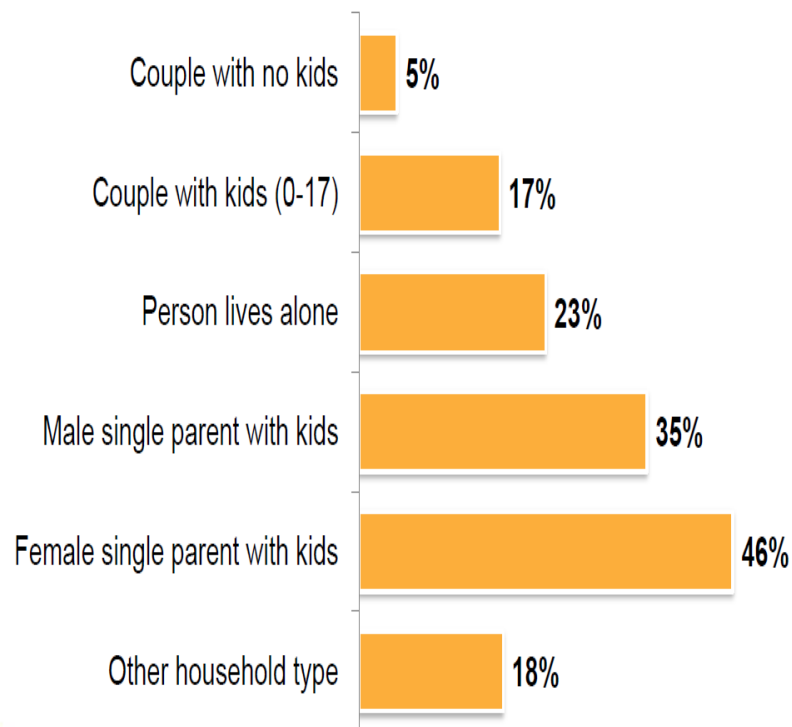
- Almost 25% of Saint Paul residents live in poverty, compared to 11% in the 7-county Twin Cities region.
- Median household income is \$48,855 compared to \$68,261 for the Twin Cities 7-county region.
- 39% of Saint Paul households have incomes under \$35,000; 53% under \$50,000.
- 38% of children age 17 and younger live in poverty, about 25,000 kids.

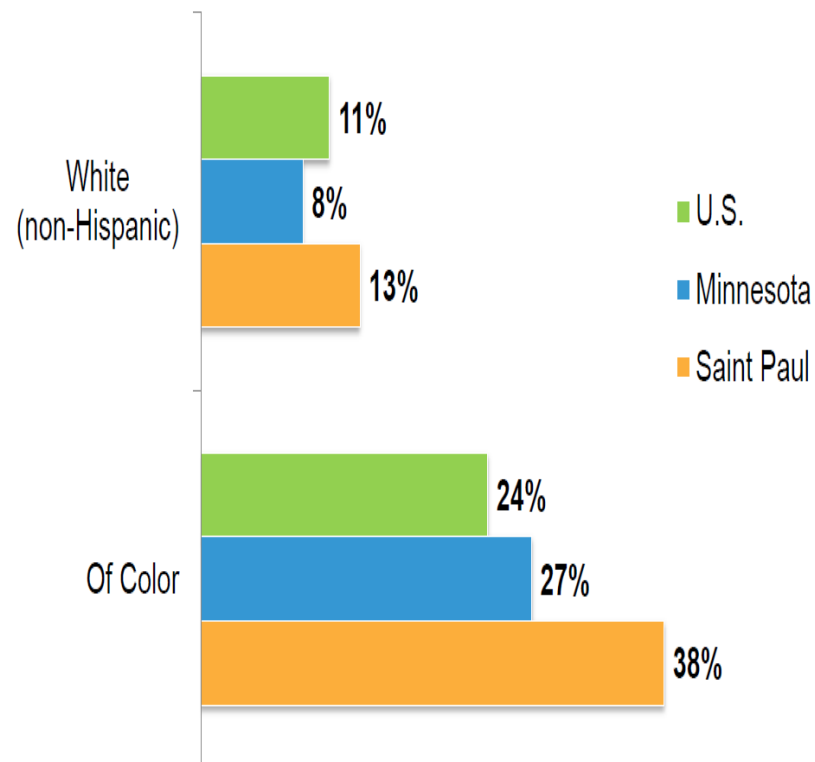
Poverty rates in Saint Paul by household type

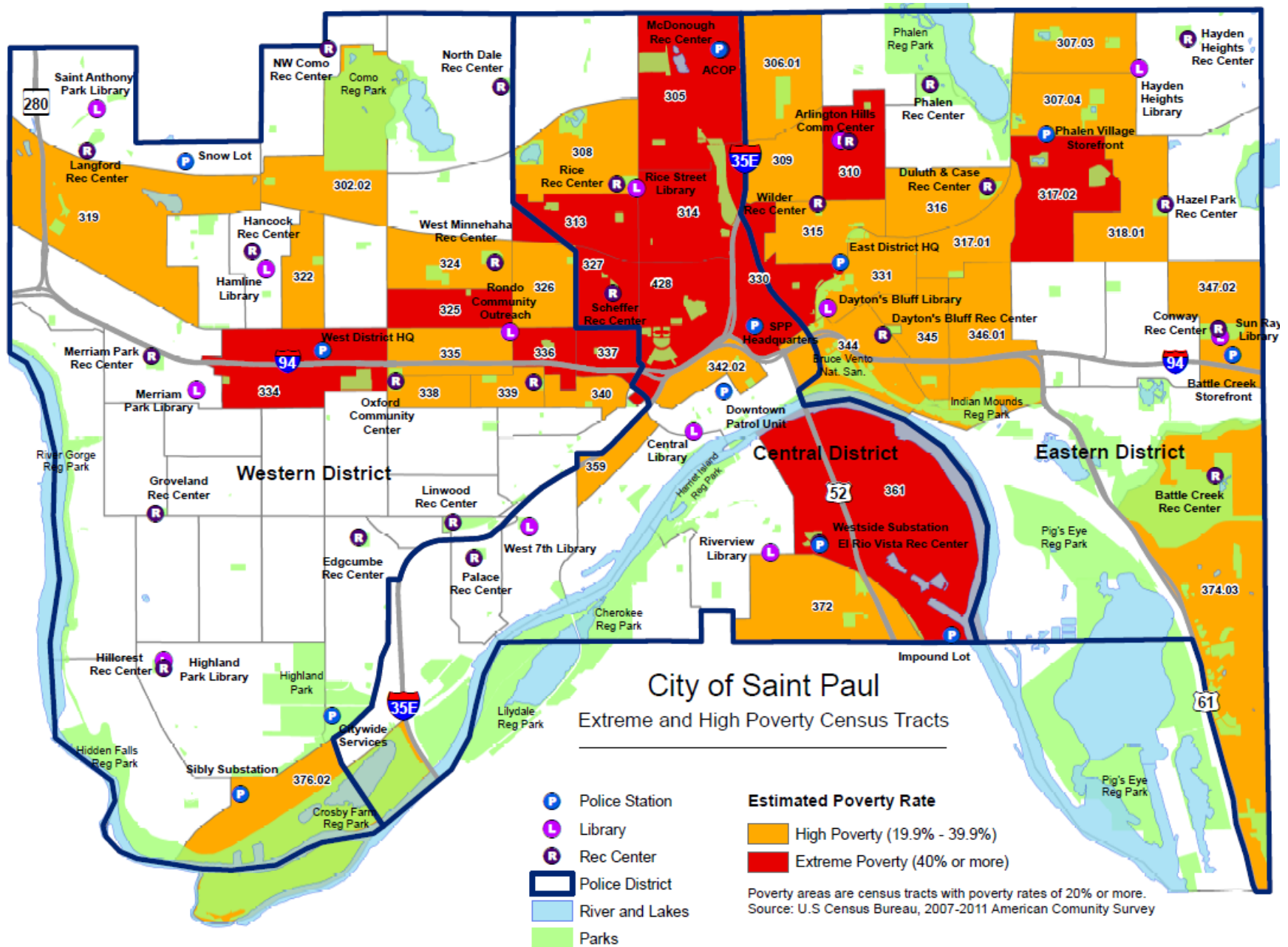

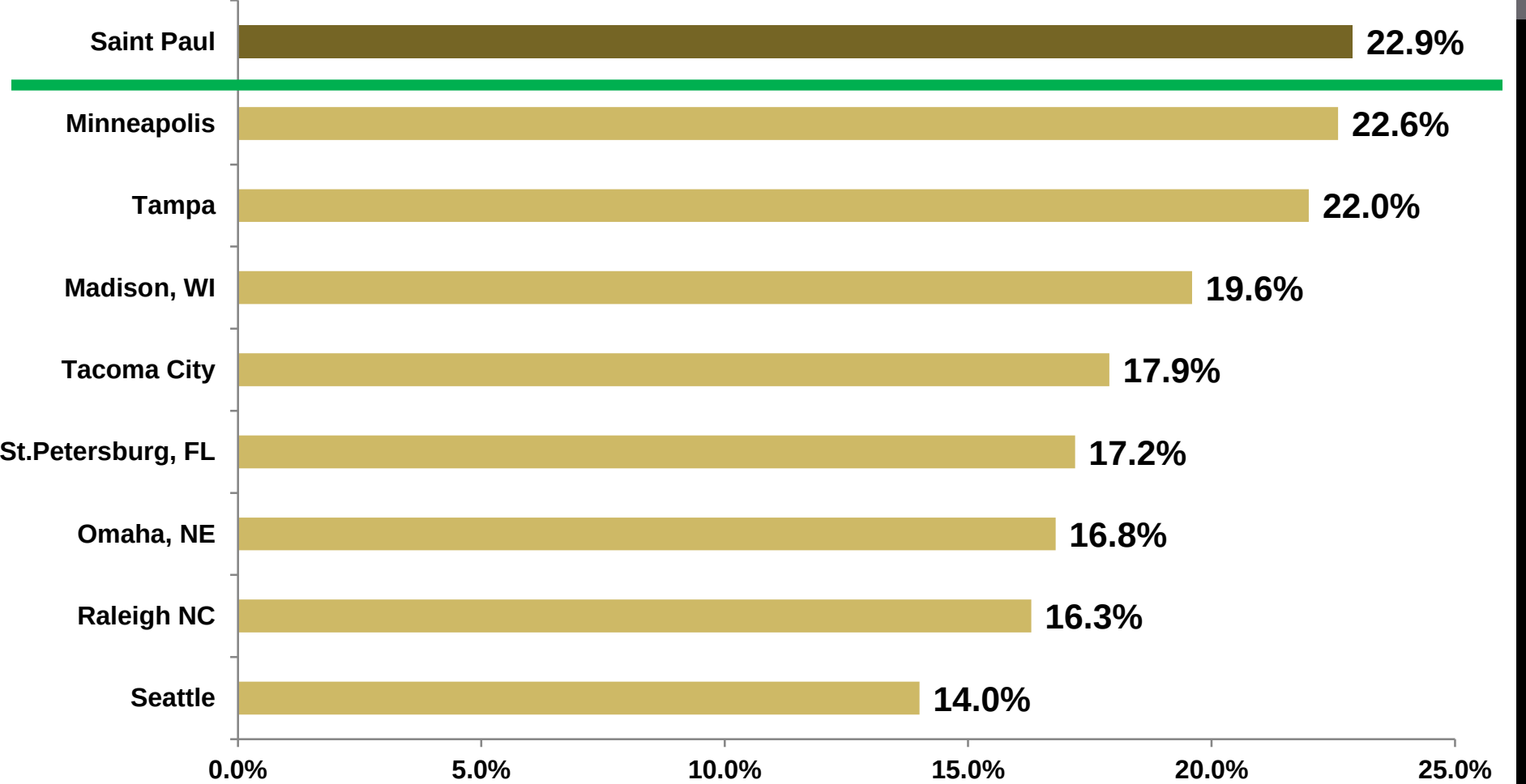

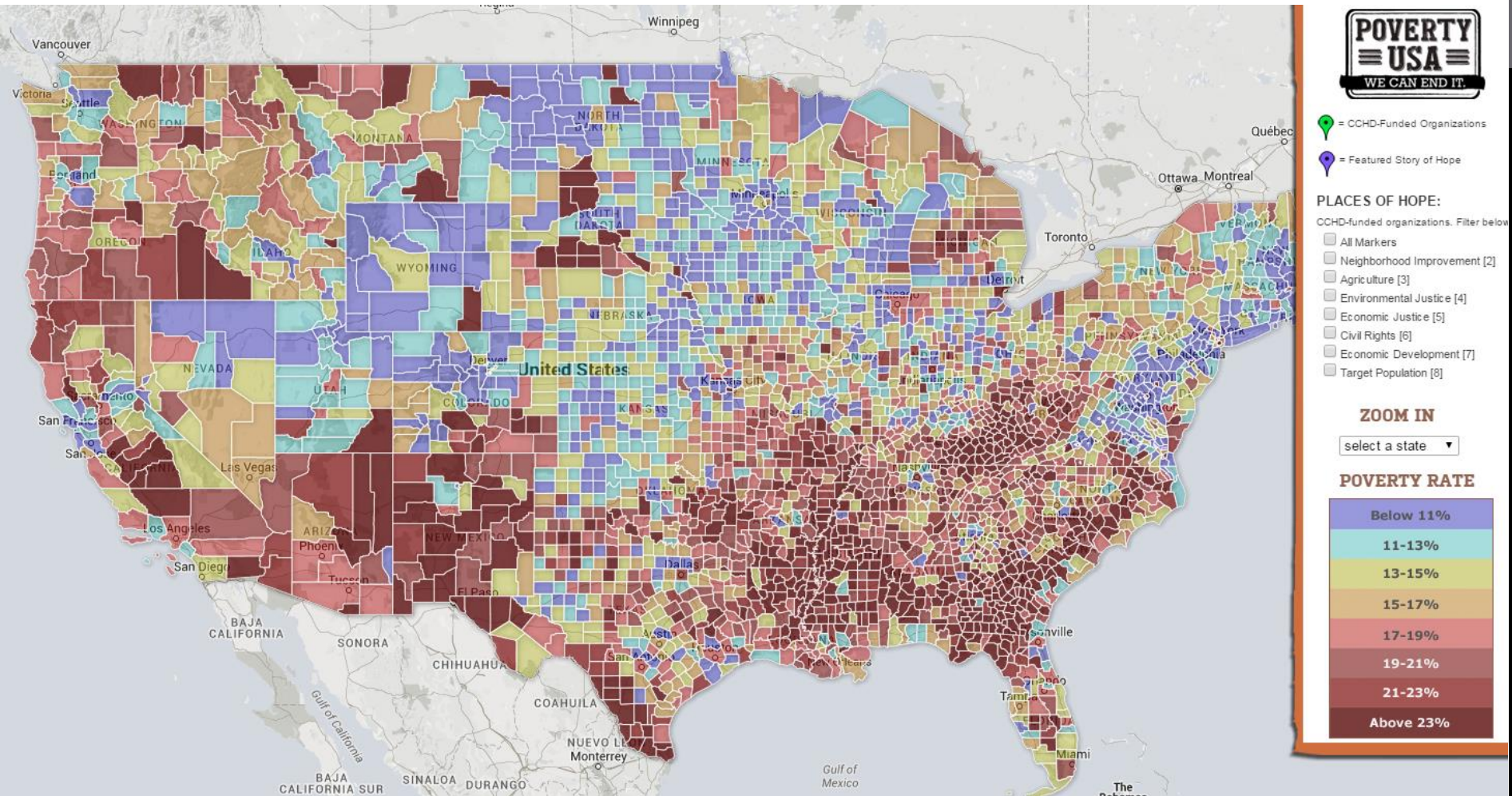


POVERTY RATES COMPARED BY CITY

(ACS 2014 Data)



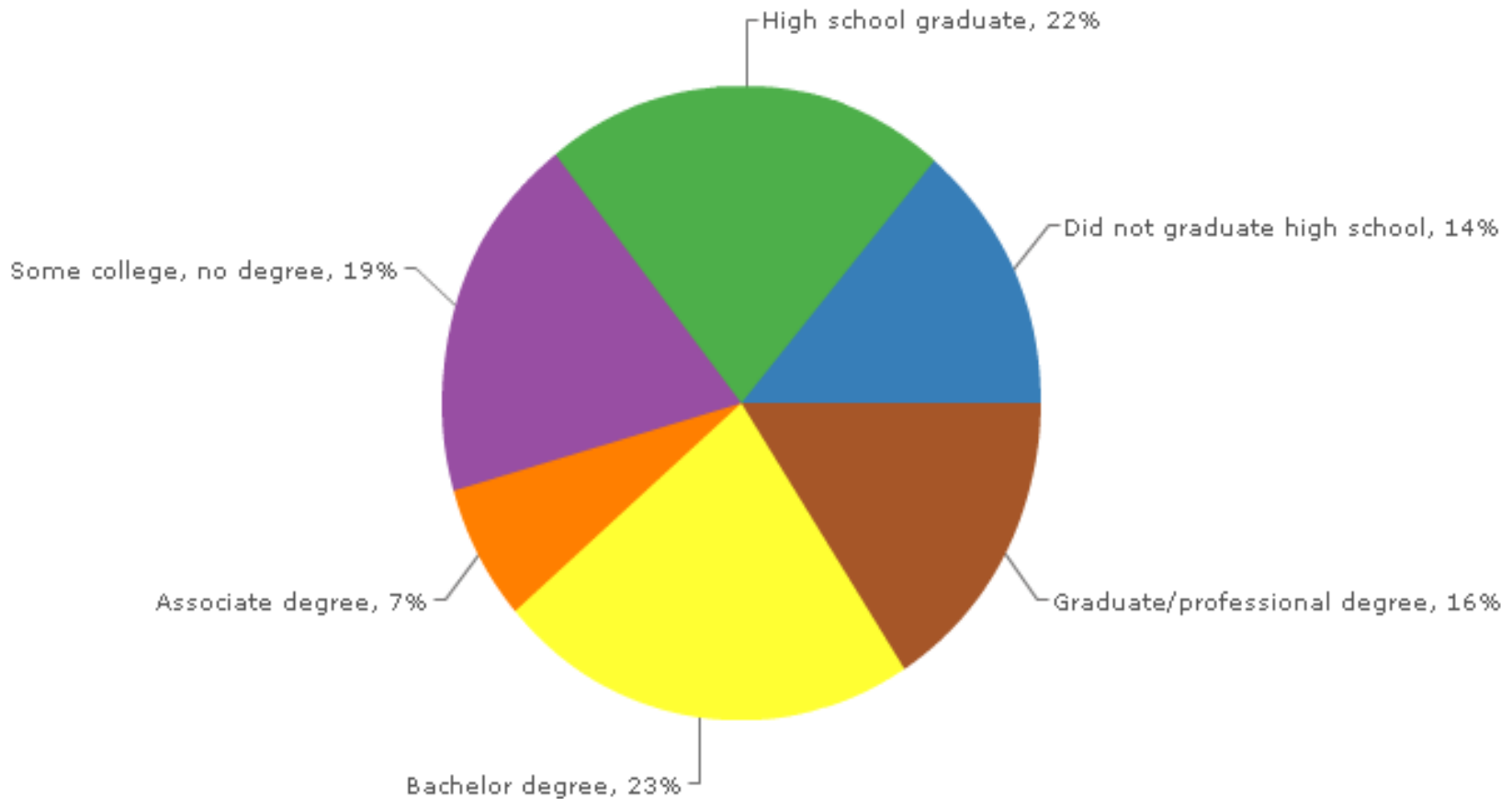
POVERTY RATES BY COUNTY IN THE UNITED STATES



SAINT PAUL DEMOGRAPHIC PROFILE: EDUCATION

- 45% of Saint Paul students meet or exceed 3rd grade reading compared to 58.7% in the state.
- 47.5% of Saint Paul students meet or exceed 8th grade math compared to 57.8% in the state.
- 73.3% of Saint Paul students graduate on time compared to 82% in the state.

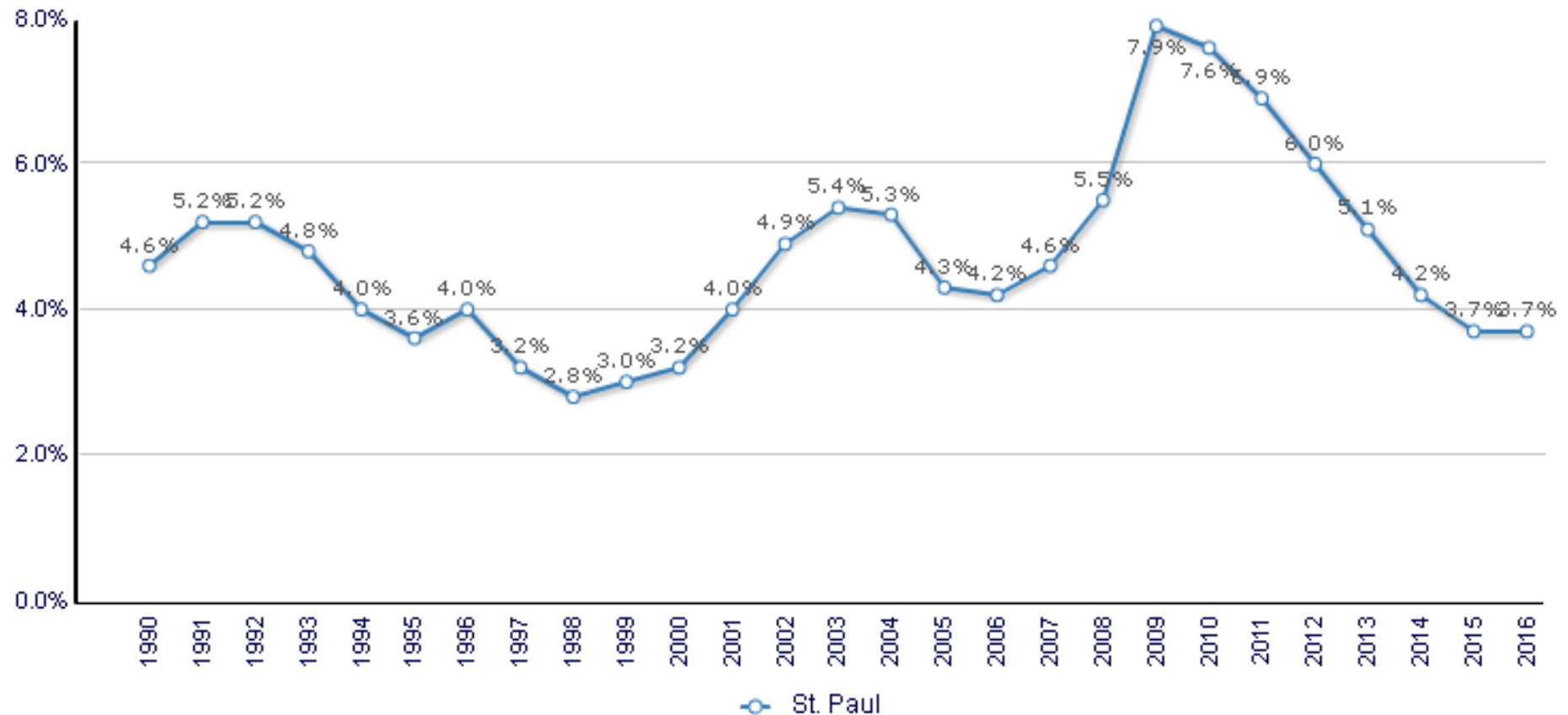
Highest Level of Education Attained by St. Paul Residents

Average Annual Unemployment for St. Paul Residents

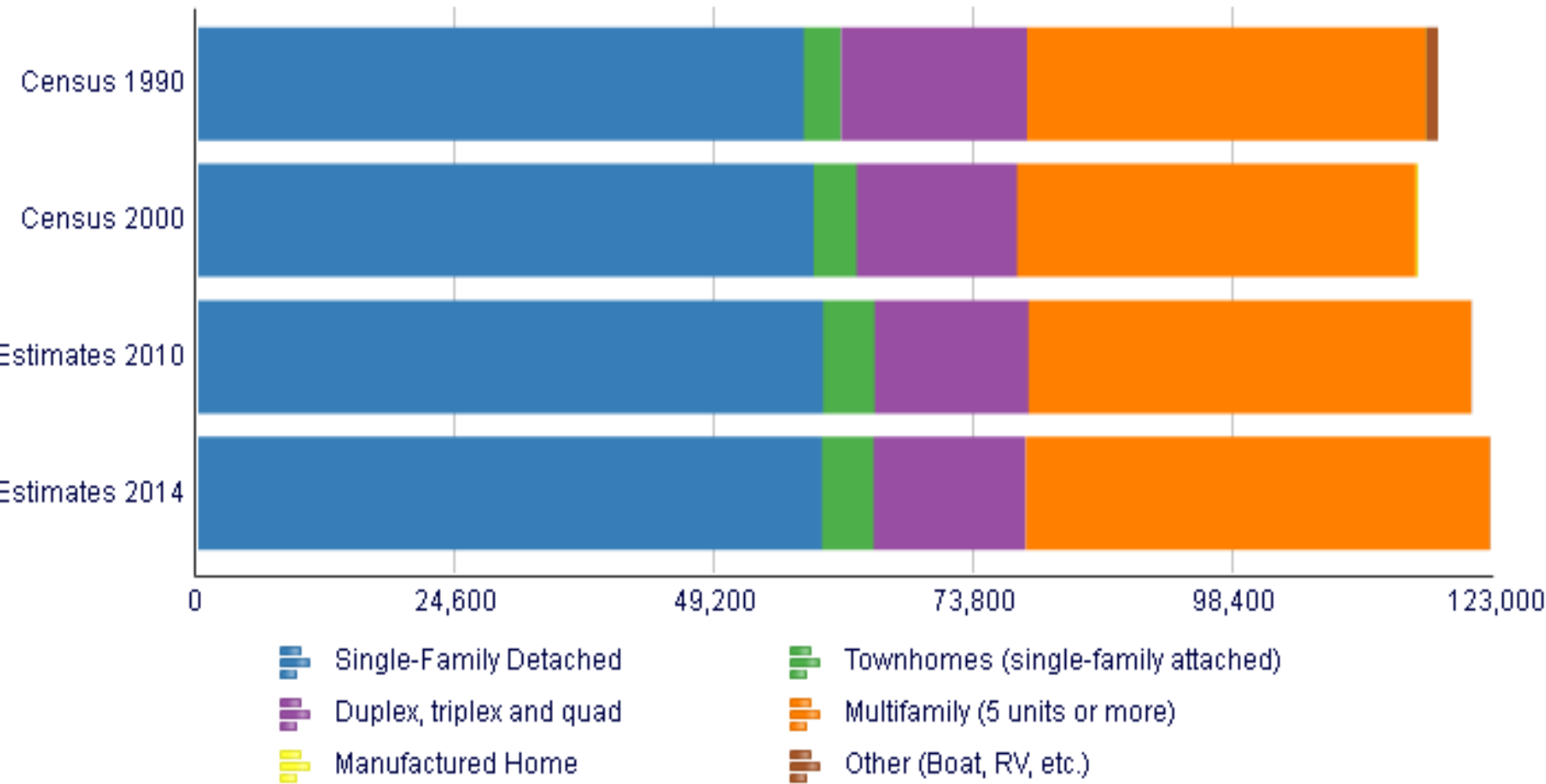

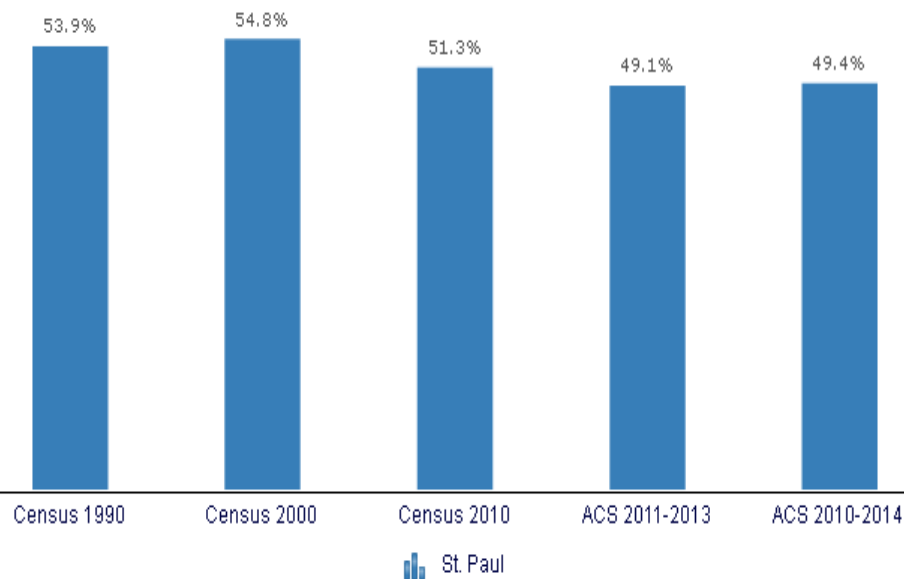
Housing Type in St. Paul

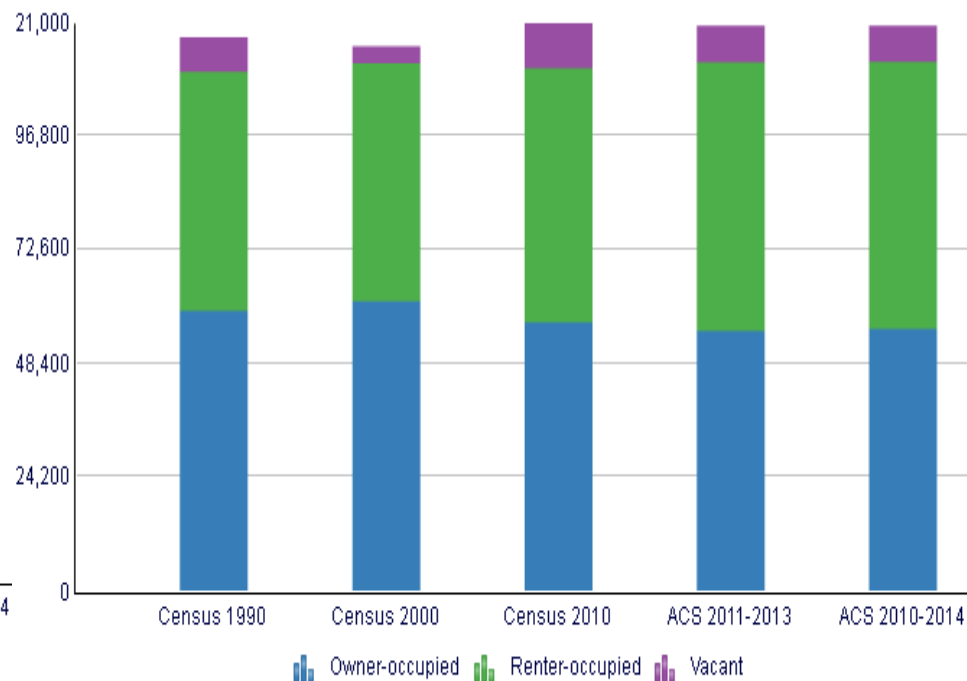

Housing Tenure and Vacancy in St. Paul

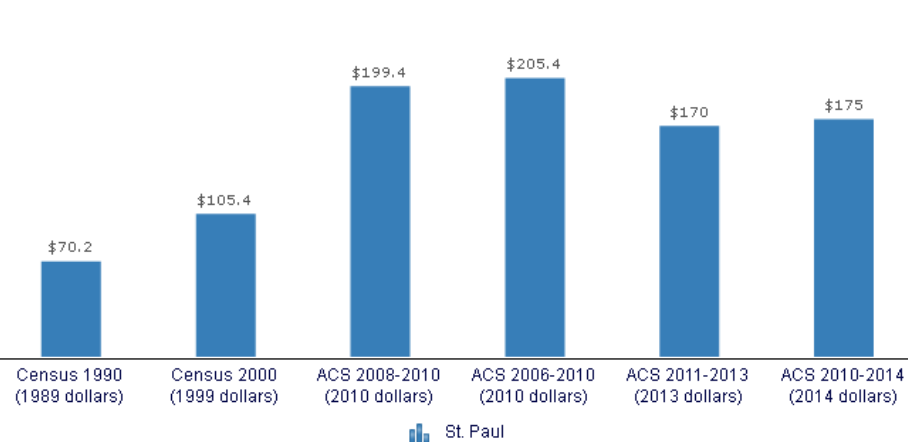

- There has been a shift from owning to renting.

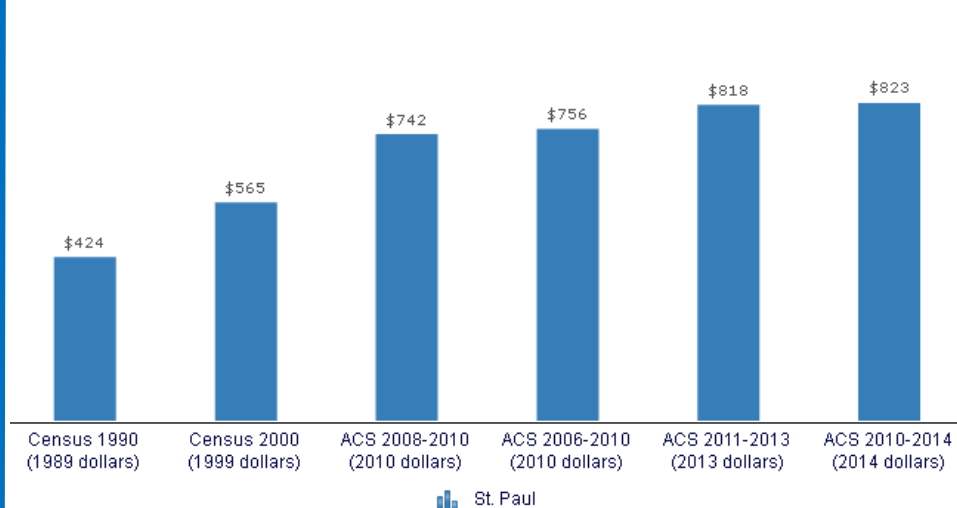

Median Gross Rent in St. Paul



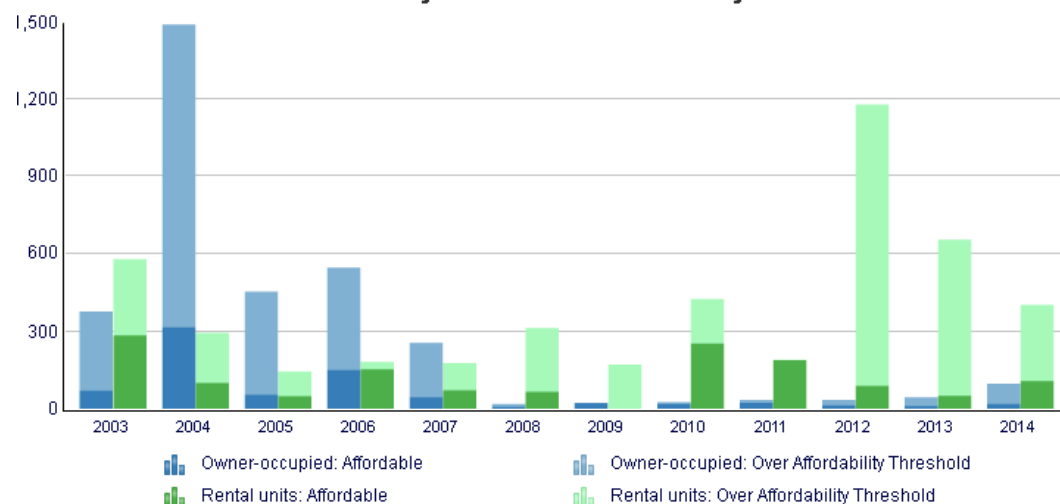

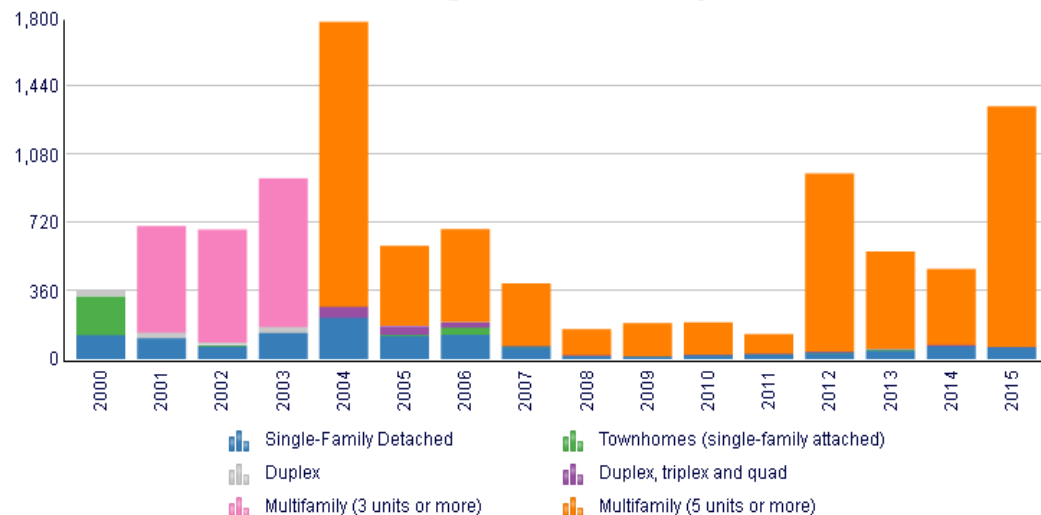
- New development 2008 has primarily been in multifamily units.

New Housing Units Permitted by St. Paul

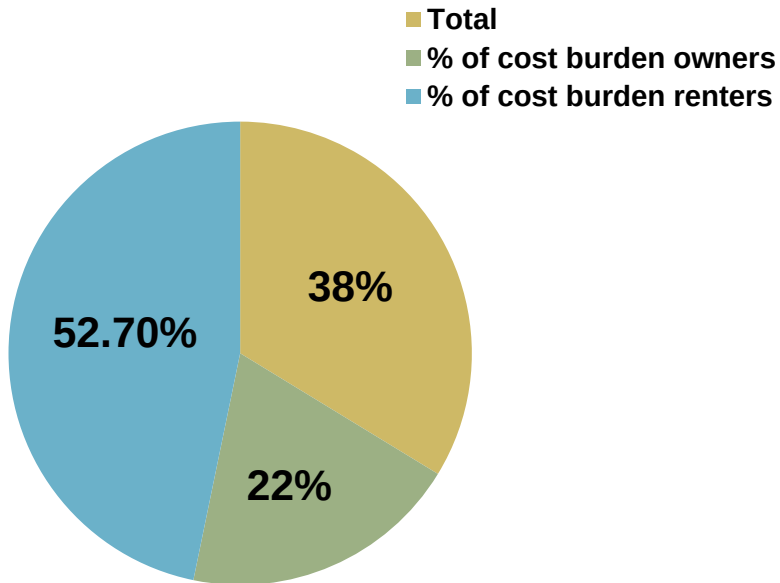

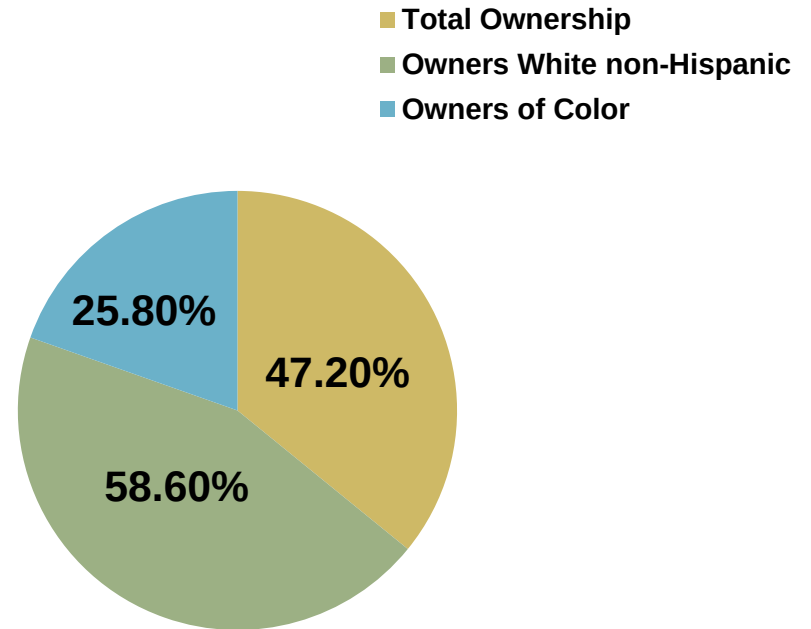

Ownership Rate

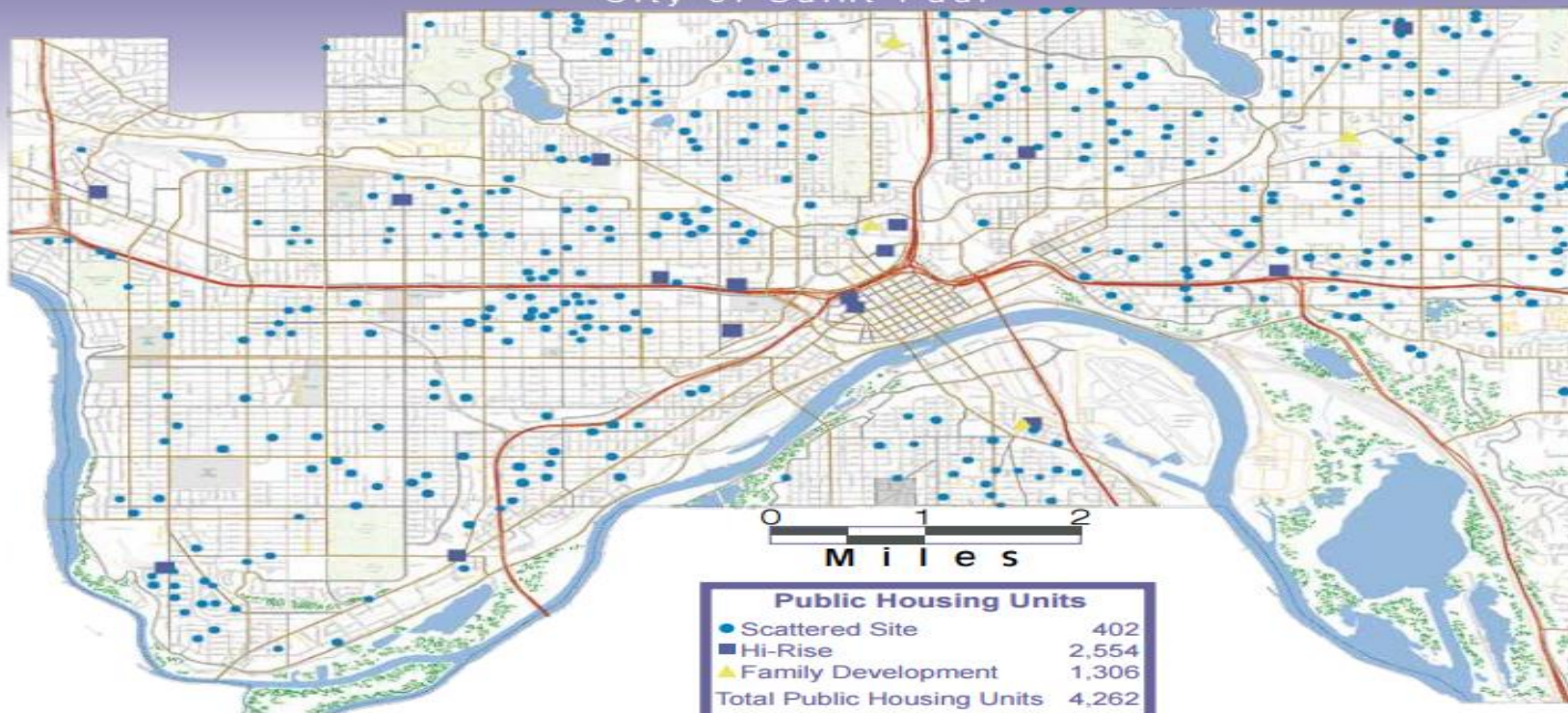

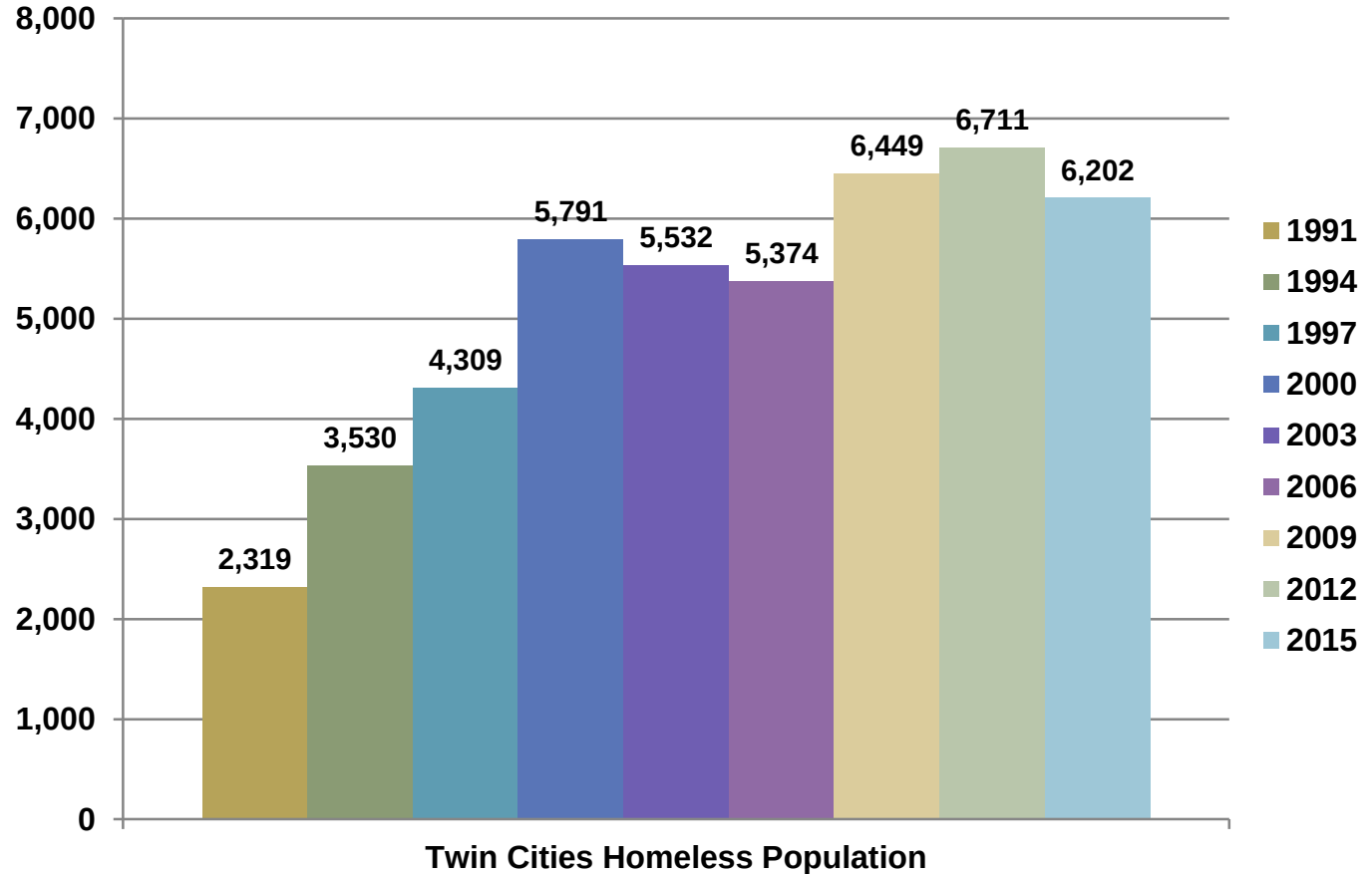

SAINT PAUL DEMOGRAPHIC PROFILE: HOMELESSNESS

Wilder Foundation conducted a homeless study in 2015, the following information is directly from the study; the one night survey found **that homeless counts decreased from 2012 by 9%**. The contributing factors that affect homelessness identified in the study include;

- **Lack of affordable housing** is still a critical issue: 46% of homeless adults age 18 or older are on a waiting list for subsidized housing, with an average wait time of 11 months; another 14% were unable to get on a waiting list because it was closed.
- **Employment** continues to rise after reaching a low point in 2009: 30% of homeless adults are employed; 14 percent full-time.
- While **African Americans age 18 and older** make up just 5% of Minnesota's population, they make up 39% of the homeless population.
- Homelessness is often preceded by **childhood trauma and abuse**: 39% of adults age 18 and older were physically abused, 33% experienced an out-of-home placement, and 37% lived with a parent or guardian with mental health issues.
- **Persistent physical and mental health issues** are on the rise for homeless adults: 57% of homeless adults report serious mental health issues compared with 36% in 2000; 51% report chronic physical health issues compared with 39% in 2000.
