On May 27th the Saint Paul City Council will hold a hearing on the city's [draft Climate Action and Resilience Plan](#). This plan update is aggressive -- reducing energy emissions, incorporating best-practice technologies, and creating a broad set of 5-year priorities that will set us on a worthy course.

Climate change impact is urgent, local and imminent. The plan identifies the neighborhoods most vulnerable to extreme heat, flooding and poor air quality: Hamline Midway, Frogtown, Summit-University, North End, Payne Phalen, Dayton's Bluff, Greater East side, downtown, West Side. And the most vulnerable populations: adults over 65, young children, low-income households, renters, people with disabilities. Pretty much all of us.

The city council should adopt this plan. And then adopt a budget with public engagement that supports it or even amplifies it. This community voice is the secret sauce in setting Saint Paul on a path of bold climate leadership.
