Marcia Moermond, Legislative Hearing Officer, said this special tax assessment is for garbage hauling services. It is \$96.08. After a 45 minute Legislative Hearing on wide ranging topics, Mr. Anderson disagrees with the trash hauling program and does not think he should have garbage service. He also says he does not stay at the property in the winter. He indicated he was not aware of that as a possibility. He struggles to keep up with his mail and notifications coming from the City. Because Mr. Anderson does not need much service and got the default of a medium can, she is asking the Council to charge him the assessment for the small can every other week, which would decrease it to \$60.83. Her recommendation is a reduction to that level. He was provided paperwork so that he could have a service hold if he wants to.

Larry Anderson thanked Moermond for his accommodations. Something is better than nothing. For the last ten years, he has a friend in Woodbury that helps him because he is a handicapped person. He helps her with her association fees. He can put his trash in her trash can. He does not have a use for the trash service in Saint Paul. He is a veteran. He believes in freedom. The trash is a tax. He is 79 years old and every time he loses a freedom it irks him. Now people don't have a choice as to whether to have trash service or not. Maplewood pays half of what we do. The City did not do their due diligence. They bargained a way a lot of their ability to get a better deal with these people. He gets public assistance. He does not own a vehicle. He has a bicycle. He knows how to live on a minuscule budget. Now the City wants him to spend money he does not have. The City does not do enough to help seniors. They go out of their way to over-assess things to people. He talked to an attorney friend of his Jack Heschler. There are 10,000 names of people who did not pay for the trash. The City wants to take everything to the limit. Moermond helped him slightly. He still has to pay for something he doesn't use. (He talked about overseas military.)

Prince said she appreciates his strong convictions, contributions, and objections. It is the law and we must uphold it, although she has objections. Moermond gave him a break on the penalty. Prince moved the recommendation of the Legislative Hearing Officer.

Kyle Brasser, representing the developer, resides in St. Louis Park. (He put a document on the screen). He showed where the site is located. It is fenced and underutilized. They are proposing to put 136 parking units on the site. They will be creating a pedestrian realm. It would be high density, multi family housing. There is no public subsidy. The rent structure is affordable, as they reduced some of their rents. This is a similar approach. Regarding the rezoning, they feel the proposal satisfies. It is currently vacant and underutilized. T3 is consistent with other zoning in the area. Rezoning from T3 will provide a better transition. They met with the neighborhood and received a support letter.

Councilmember Nelson asked about the subcontractor stuff. Brasser responded they will abide by these criteria: wage enforcement, non discrimination on the site.

Nelson asked about the mechanisms to follow-up and check in with contractors. Brasser responded they have an intake process. They go through training, screening, hire contractors that will abide by these things. The sight staff are trained to look for certain practices that are concerning.

Nelson said she appreciates his efforts.

Councilmember Prince said she was impressed with the community benefits. She sees that the Port Authority has written a letter regarding the rezoning.

Staff member said the letter stated their policy in general. The thinking on the part of staff for this property was mostly led by the land use designation. Both identify this area as mixed use. The Port Authority is a key player in St. Paul.

Martin Hernandez, Chairperson of West Side Community Organization, appeared. They would like to make sure any future projects would emphasize things more affordable. They had concerns about labor standards and trafficking. They will make periodic site visits. The Council has their letters. This is a start for future issues. They want this to be a model they can use.

Steve Heckler said a year ago many new breweries came into that area. He was brought in to create a festival in that area. The idea was for a free civic event to bring people together. They realized there were a lot of rules. They started a process to see what they could do and reached out to residents to explain what this was. He personally presented to many different areas. That's how they started the process. This will bring a whole new vitality to that neighborhood.

Robert Parson, 2410 Unviesity Avenue West #106, said the brewery is right downstairs in the retail area. They had a block party there and the residents loved it. If the Council okays it, there will not be a problem.

Catherine Day said she is the chair of the board of the Creative Enterprise Zone. It was in District 2. They were written into the neighborhood as an entertainment district, cultural district. They have been working for a long time to increase the connectivity of the neighborhood, a destination, a mixed used area. They are enthusiastic about this ordinance. The district is a large employment district for the City plus a large tax base. It is also expanding rapidly: a very young population, growing diversity in the neighborhood, people who want to live and work in a transit oriented community. Adding this type of vitality is what they are looking for. This will continue to fuel workforce development in the area. This is for people who want to live, work, and play in close proximity to each other. There is a mural festival they are planning in September, which will add to the vitality. They want to make this area a national city of murals. She also wants to speak on behalf of Jo Pavlak, Urban Growler, who could not be here. Also, the District 12 council was consulted and voted very favorably for this ordinance.

Brendmoen asked is Urban Growler part of that district. Ms. Day responded yes. There are 7 now in the neighborhood. (She explained the area's dimensions.)

Max Filter, co-owner of a business on Raymond and University, said they tried to do this last year. They want to engage more of the community. Being able to expand this to the street would be good for them. They are trying to make the neighborhood somewhat different. Minneapolis has things like this. They may be able to pull this off in Saint Paul.

Approving adverse action against the Liquor On Sale - 101-180 seats, Liquor On Sale - 2AM Closing, Liquor On Sale - Sunday, and Gambling Location licenses held by JC & MTM, Inc., d/b/a Johnny Baby's (License ID #20040000766) at 981 University Avenue West. (Public hearing continued from July 10)

Theresa Skarda stated DSI (Department of Safety and Inspection) has recommended adverse action and the imposition of a third matrix penalty. It was a subject of a violation. The police reviewed the video and saw the violations. No one was there to copy the video. The licensing office is recommending a \$2,000 penalty and a 10 day suspension. Discussions included the need of wanding. There was a shooting in the parking lot. The licensee called the police and notified them of the incident. They did the ten day suspension immediately. They decided to change format and make security changes. DSI was clear that they only make a recommendation to the Council. The licensee did close Johnny Babies for ten days and added more security processes to the department.

Councilmember Thao asked the clarification of the recommendation. Skarda said to lower on condition they work with the licensed beverage association to work with training. There is not good training on how to wand. The techniques vary.

Thao asked is there information why the bouncer was not wanding correctly. Skarda responded there is not policies and procedures on how to wand.

Jeffrey O'Brien stated he is the attorney for Johnny Babies. He met with the executive director. There is a draft outline already prepared. Other licensees should have the same safety training. In terms of the recent incident, it was a misunderstanding. One staff member was terminated.

Jonathan Price, general president of JC & MTM. He takes responsibility of what transpires. There was an issue with training, which is not resolved. They will hire additional security for inside and outside of the bar. They met with the Chief and commanders and to suggest that the shots fired is on location. They have had issues. They pride themselves on working with the neighbors. He tells them to bring the issues to him and not to let it fester. They have been receptive to that. A young man was killed. Cynthia received a death threat about giving the videos. Friday after that, a young man was shot at another bar. Since then, Johnny Babies is on the market to be sold. They are looking to exit this business. He is taxed with the job of putting an exit strategy together. With that, he is speaking in favor of the agreement that we reached with the City and department.

Thao moved to close the public hearing and said he appreciates him coming down. He is a man of integrity. He is going to move to amend that the City impose the 10 day suspension. As far as the penalty matrix for \$1,000, it is fair to reduce it to \$1,000 so staff can get the training needed.

Council President Brendmoen asked for clarification on the ten-day suspension. Skarda responded that the business called the department and said they wanted to shut down. The department was clear and said they will recommend you get credit for time served but we are not the final decision maker.

Councilmember Prince asked is he recommending an additional ten days. Thao responded yes.

Skarda said the ten days were not imposed by the Council. They asked for credit for time served.

Thao said they should serve 10 more days. Skarda responded they should discuss how to serve the 10 days.

Thao responded it should be in the next 30 days.

Brendmoen asked ten days consecutive or two 5 days.

Prince said the ten days served are short circuiting the problem. She is inclined to go with the staff recommendation; she is inclined to go with him.
