Shea appointed general manager

Patrick Shea has been appointed general manager with his new duties beginning on March 29.

The Board of Water Commissioners made the appointment at their March 9 board meeting.

Shea has served as the utility's assistant general manager since the fall of 2019. He previously served

seven years as the public services director with the city of St. Cloud. He has experience in managing drinking water, wastewater, storm water, renewable energy, and public works.

After a national job search, the Board of Water Commissioners appointed an examining committee representing SPRWS, local stakeholders, and water industry experts to review and assess qualified candidates. The committee then recommended finalists to be interviewed by the Board.

Shea was among four candidates, one other internal SPRWS candidate and two from out of state, that were interviewed by the Board.

"The qualified candidates from both inside SPRWS and across the country exhibited a good mix of experiences and skills for the Board to review," said Mara Humphrey, president of the Board of Water Commissioners. "After careful consideration, the Board decided that Patrick's combination of skills and experiences are the right combination to lead SPRWS as we embark on major improvements to our treatment facilities. Patrick is uniquely qualified to guide us into the future."

Shea will oversee the utility's operating revenues of about \$63 million and approximately 260 employees that provide drinking water related services to the customers of SPRWS.

"I look forward to ensuring we continue to innovate and improve in order to provide Minnesota's best drinking water to our customers," said Shea.

Leeann Smith retires after 20 years of service to water utility

Leeann Smith retired February 26 after working at the utility for 20 years.

Smith was hired in 2000 as a water utility worker I and was promoted to water utility worker II in 2002.

In 2006, she was promoted to water system worker II. In 2014, she took a position as a water meter technician, the position she retired from this year.
