Dear City Council,

I am writing to formally object to the proposed assessment for the resurfacing project on Cretin/Bayard, which affects my property at 2171 Bayard Ave. My family and I have resided at this address for more than 23 years, and during this time, we have consistently contributed to the maintenance and improvement of our community through sales and property taxes.

The recent Sales tax increase of 1% along with the taxes we already pay are intended to cover public infrastructure maintenance, including road resurfacing. Therefore, I find it both unfair and unacceptable to be subjected to an additional assessment of \$1,247.85 for a project that should be financed by the funds already allocated for such purposes.

Historically, our neighborhood has not been assessed for these large amounts, and this sudden imposition is not only a financial burden but also a deviation from the city's established practices. We already pay approximately \$120 annually in assessments, and this new proposed assessment exceeds that amount by more than tenfold. Such a significant increase is unreasonable and places an undue strain on our family and neighbors.

I urge the City Council to reconsider this proposed assessment and explore alternative funding methods that do not disproportionately impact homeowners. Utilizing the existing tax revenues, which we diligently pay, would be a more just and equitable solution.

Thank you for your attention to this matter. I trust that the City of Saint Paul will act in the best interests of its residents by addressing this concern promptly and fairly.
