Public hearing to consider the appeal of Told Development of the Planning Commission decision to deny a requested variance to the 0.3 Floor Area Ratio minimum at 1212 Prosperity Avenue.

Councilmember Yang thanked the Council for supporting the layover, and staff for their work. She said she was going to move to grant the appeal. She said she felt the Planning Commission erred in findings 4a, b, c, and d. She said with regards to finding 4a "The variance is in harmony with the general purposes and intent of the zoning code," she felt the floor area ratio (FAR) variance was reasonable, and the appellant worked with City staff to come up with the building site design, which the Planning Commission found to meet the general purpose and intent of the Zoning Code. She said requiring the appellant to construct another building and a half to meet the district's FAR requirement as a means to facilitate compact development was not a reasonable basis to deny this specific application on this unusually-shaped lot. She note that the appellant agreed to construct a taller building to visually conform with the FAR requirement when viewed from the street. With regards to 4b "The variance is consistent with the comprehensive plan," she said the bank was a permitted use at the location and consistent with the current 2030 Plan, the pending 2040 Comprehensive Plan, and Small Area Plan for the district. With regards to 4c "The applicant has established that there are practical difficulties in complying with the provision; that the property owner proposes to use the property in a reasonable manner not permitted by the provision. Economic considerations alone do not constitute practical difficulties,"

she said the appellant worked with staff to design a building which met most of the code requirements, and requiring the appellant to construct another building and a half to meet a FAR requirement as a means to facilitate compact development was a practical difficulty and would result in creation of interior space for which the appellant had no use. With regards to finding 4d "The plight of the landowner is due to circumstances unique to the property not created by the landowner," she said the appellant did not create the lot size which drove one half of the FAR calculation, and the size of the lot was therefore a circumstance unique to the property that the appellant did not create. She said granting a FAR variance for appellant's building was not unreasonable because the large size of the lot, if split, allowed for a new building on the new lot of a size which would allow for a building that met the FAR requirements for this district. She said the Planning Commission found that findings 4e and 4f were met, and she moved that those findings be made a part of her motion to grant the appeal. She said, in granting this appeal, in addition to all the conditions imposed by the Planning Commission, she would add the following condition: The area the parcel, described as "the eastern 50 feet of the parcel" must be planted and maintained as "green space" as a means to offset the impact of appellant's reduced building size, until such time as the lot is split for redevelopment purposes. The appellant shall submit site plan for this green space to DSI staff to review and approve for consistency with the requirements of this condition.

For the following cases, the recommendations are contested. Therefore, a staff report will be presented.

Legislative Hearing Officer Marcia Moermond gave a staff report on the two cases involving assessments for Excessive Consumption of Code Enforcement Services. She said when an inspector went to check and see if work was done on deadline, and it was not done, they had a practice of issuing a bill for that inspection. In this case there were two visits by the inspector several months apart where the work was not completed, therefore DSI billed for those inspections. Each bill was \$122, with a \$35 service charge to be processed as an assessment. Orders were issued in June 2018 related to maintenance of the exterior and structural issues with the back porch and balcony above the porch; the Council granted extensions for the work to be completed

later into 2018. Ms. Moermond said the property maintenance issues had been addressed, and what remained was repair of the work on the steps and balcony area. She noted that it was now 20 months past deadline. A building permit to complete the work was pulled in the fall of 2019, a year after the Council deadline. There were two inspections, one which was item 34 and occurred on July 3, 2019; item 35 was an inspection which occurred on October 21, 2019. Both times the work was incomplete. She said in some cases she would recommend a reduction or even deletion of the work was done by the time of the staff report. She said DSI was out there on June 4 and the permits were still open and the work not completed, so she wouldn't recommend a reduction. She said the homeowner did contest the assessment and had submitted additional written materials which had been in the record since the previous week. She said there were three emails communicating basically the same information. She summarized, saying the appellant's concerns had to do with the nature of orders and how people call in and complain about things, and how that can be an unfair process; and then how does the City explain to property owners what the expectations are. The property owner also expressed that she paid real estate taxes, and this would be a tax on top of those. The property owner indicated in the Legislative Hearing that she felt rushed to do the work based on the deadlines; she noted the extensions beyond what DSI had issued. She said the property owner focused on the grounds maintenance issues, but the City had closed those orders, and the remaining item was closing out the building permit on the balcony.

Council President Brendmoen confirmed with Ms. Moermond that the public testimony was in the Legistar system. Ms. Moermond said a fair bit of written testimony from the property owner had been provided.

Councilmember Jalali moved to close the public hearing. Yeas - 7 Nays - 0
