




The story of Saint Paul began on the shores and bluffs of the nation's mightiest river. The Mississippi shaped everything: culture, community, commerce and more. Today, it shapes the way many of us relax, connect and explore.

The river life can be a good one. Liz Miller knows it well. She eats, sleeps and drinks the ebb and flow of the Mississippi's magic as the owner and innkeeper of The Covington Inn Bed and Breakfast. For the past 20 years, she's been at the helm of this beautifully repurposed towboat turned B&B, which is permanently moored at Harriet Island just across the Wabasha Street Bridge from downtown Saint Paul.

Here, the water gently ripples past her tightly-secured three-story riverboat all year long. She hears morning birds and the slow churn of working towboats pushing barges at night. She hears the evening bustle of summer concerts in the nearby parks and creaking, cracking sounds of ice amid silent winter snowfalls.

"So many people like the calming effect of water," she says. "And it makes sense: our bodies are mostly water."

Born and raised in Saint Paul, Liz worked around the country in hospitality before returning to her roots. When she got a chance to embrace life by the water, she seized the moment, taking over the one-ofa-kind getaway spot in 2002. The floating inn features four staterooms decorated with charming nautical warmth. Some suites have authentic portholes. All have a private bath, deck access, fireplaces or stoves for the cooler months and air conditioning for the summer ones. The salon, where Liz serves her guests breakfast, was once the towboat's engine room. Now the room's atmosphere of reclaimed wood, colorful area rugs and vintage furniture conjures a cozy, welcoming energy.

Like Liz, visitors are here for the romance of the river. Guests often come for anniversaries or weddings. (Liz has officiated vows nearly 100 times.) A family or group of friends might rent the entire boat for a special event. Sometimes a couple comes aboard planning a night on the town, but opts to just kick back on the deck for a sunset toast and views of the greens, reds and whites of city lights illuminating the skyline.

"When you come down to the water, you feel so remote. It's like you're a world away from everything," Liz says.

The Covington, in fact, is the lone vessel on a long public pier where bluegrass bands fiddle away on fall evenings. Look downstream and you see the Minnesota Boat Club on Raspberry Island, a favorite wedding destination. Nearby, rows of houseboats line the docks. A block away to the south, the Padelford Riverboats dock along Harriet Island. Liz says these tour boats are a wonderful way to get out on the river in the warm months to explore, learn local history and catch a glimpse of wildlife soaring or roaming these shores — especially when

the forests are beaming with fall color. Or rent a kayak at Hidden Falls Park and paddle downstream to Harriet Island. Along the way, you'll go past Historic Fort Snelling, Pike Island, Crosby Farm Regional Park and Lilydale Regional Park. All of these green spaces offer various trails for hiking, biking, skiing or snowshoeing.

Saint Paul boasts more shoreline (26 miles) than any other Mississippi River city — and it's all part of the Mississippi National River and Recreation Area. Small wonder then that Liz's favorite summer pastime is cruising the river with friends from the Saint Paul Yacht Club. They find nooks and crannies of the river to tie up boats and spend the day swimming, eating and relaxing.

"I get my chores done, then get in my cabin cruiser and go. It's the best way to spend a day."

When she goes ashore in Saint Paul, Liz likes Skinner's for pizza with girlfriends or the Spot Bar, Dark Horse or Boca Chica. She'll catch a band at Minnesota Music Cafe and do a little shopping at Up Six Vintage or Poppy Fun Fashion.

She recommends families and artists visit Como Park for events or just the winter oasis of the conservatory. A tour of the Minnesota State Capitol and the Minnesota History Center are big on her list.

Another nearby favorite: the Wabasha Caves, located a half mile inland from the Covington, are part of a massive stretch of sandstone caverns that have been used for everything from Prohibition-era bootlegging to mushroom growing. Get a weekend tour or try Swing Dance Thursdays with live music. The nightclub once known as "Mystic Caverns" is worth a visit, Liz says: "To hear about the sordid past of our fair city and hang out in a cave is so cool!"

New perspectives

Tour an authentic towboat that serves as a viewing platform at the Science Museum of Minnesota, where all ages can enjoy interactive lessons on the river, its people and history.








LIVE AND LEARN

Overlooking the Mississippi River downtown, the Science Museum of Minnesota attracts visitors from around the Midwest for unique, hands-on learning from dinosaurs and space to the human body and beyond. Plus, the onsite Omnitheater amps the experience with a 70-by-90foot movie screen. The new Bell Museum, Minnesota's official natural history museum and digital planetarium, is home to high-tech exhibits and famous wildlife dioramas, including some mammoth Ice Age creatures.

For a different kind of funpark, try Can Can Wonderland for art installation mini-golf, arcade games and more. Or come at night (without kids) for a slightly wilder scene.







FIND YOUR FAM JAM

For decades, the capital city has been a favorite Minnesota family getaway. It's a playground and learning hub for kids big and small. Here are some ideas for finding your jam while you're in town.

MAKE IT AN EVENT

Plan your stay around one of the Twin Cities' famous gatherings, like Flint Hills Family Festival, Festival of Nations or the Minnesota State Fair. Music lovers will find free outdoor concerts for all ages all summer long in places like Como Park, the Minnesota History Center and Mears Park. For the dramatic, there's Circus Juventas or big stage performances at the Ordway Center for the Performing Arts. Chill out in a family-friendly and dogs-welcome brewery or break out sleds, skis or skates here in one of the nation's top-ranked parks systems.

SAINT SMALL

Tiny tots will dig the **Minnesota Children's Museum**, where kids ages 1 - 10 and older can create, play and imagine. There's more to explore at **Como Park Zoo and Conservatory**, with its animals, gardens, amusement rides and more — all nestled among the rolling hills and trees of a gorgeous and expansive city park where you can golf, kayak, bike or simply lean back in the grass against an old oak tree.

ALL ABOARD, TRAIN LOVERS

This is your town. Young ones love a visit to the **Minnesota Transportation Museum's** historic Jackson Street
Roundhouse for Tots & Trains
Wednesdays or a vintage caboose train ride on Saturdays. Tinker around at the **Twin Cities Model Railroad Museum**.
Use the historic Union Depot to arrive by Amtrak or enjoy the picnic area where the trains come and go from the historic building.

TAKE ME OUT TO THE FUNPARK

A baseball game at **CHS Field** is just plain fun. Home of the St. Paul Saints, the Minnesota Twins' AAA minor league affiliate, the ballpark is known for shenanigans, slapstick and surprises. Find it in Lowertown near the Metro Green Line and Farmers' Market.

Love pro sports? Come see Minnesota United FC for MLS soccer at **Allianz Field**, the Minnesota Wild for NHL hockey at **Xcel Energy Center** or the Minnesota Whitecaps for NWHL hockey at **TRIA Rink**.




Saint Paul's annual **Cinco de Mayo Festival** is the largest Latino event in Minnesota. The celebration along Cesar Chavez Street reflects a proud Mexican influence in the West Side neighborhood.

Minnesota History Center programs and exhibits include a look at Minnesota women who shifted the political landscape with the passage of the 19th Amendment, and a lens on immigrant and refugee experiences. East Side Freedom Library recounts those experiences with resources, events and tours of spots like Swede Hollow, where waves of Scandinavians and, later, Poles, Italians, Mexicans and others once settled. Nearby Saint Paul neighborhoods continue to attract immigrant communities from around the world, including Salvadoran, Karen, Hmong, East African and more.

The city's European influence is evident at the **Germanic-American Institute**, which hosts annual events like St. Paul Oktoberfest, as well as at **Celtic Junction Arts Center** and Irishthemed festivals like the **St. Patrick's Day Parade** and **Irish Fair**.

Interactive exhibits at the **Hmong Cultural Center and Museum** teach about the Hmong people's history, culture and experience in the U.S. over the past 25 years. Home to the world's largest urban Hmong population, Saint Paul hosts a **Hmong New Year** celebration each fall that draws thousands of visitors for traditional dance, music, crafts and more. The popular **Little Mekong Night Market** sports a full spectrum of music, art and street food from across Southeast Asia.



WELCOME TO THE FESTIVAL

Experience many rich cultural traditions at once during the Festival of Nations. Held annually the first weekend in May, this showcase of over 90 ethnic groups features authentic cuisine, markets, music and dance. There's much more on the event calendar in a city that embraces its cultural diversity and unique community character. Try a family-friendly Saint Paul festival like India Fest, Japanese Obon Festival and Little Africa Fest. Celebrate our seasons at events like the Saint Paul Winter Carnival, the Minnesota State Fair, Grand Old Day and the winter and summer Beer Dabblers — as well as a host of outdoor music and art showcases

KEGS, KEEPSAKES AND CONVERSATIONS

If the brick and steel walls of Keg and Case West 7th Market could talk, they'd probably sound a lot like Phil Gagné. As the last brewmaster at the old Schmidt Brewery, which closed in 2002 after a 150-year run, he's made it his business to know everything about a place that shaped a neighborhood and America's beer history.

Since 1979, when he started working on-site as a brewer, Phil's story has been the story of the brewery. He's made it his business to know everything about the place — from the original Cave Brewery in 1855 (which explains the underground tunnels beneath the campus) to the Stahlmann Brothers and Jacob Schmidt years all the way to the end, when it closed as Minnesota Brewing Company.

"I'm the last man standing," says the North Saint Paul man who's dedicated 42 years to this iconic Saint Paul destination. "I'm the captain that went down with the ship. But I can tread water really good."

When brewing operations ceased, Phil stayed on to help developers as the brewhouse and bottlehouse were transformed into artist lofts. He oversaw the restoration of Keg and Case Market, a former keg house built in 1937. Then he helped overhaul and revive the Rathskeller, a 1935 building known for its ornate German-style basement beer hall that has reopened as an event space on the historic Schmidt Brewery grounds.

"For me to be able to do something like this is the cherry on top of the whipped cream," says Phil, who continues to be the go-to guy for all things Schmidt and anyone who likes a good story.

On any given day, you're likely to run into him chatting up merchants selling everything from coffee and halva to fresh spun cotton candy, baked goods and beyond. With more than two dozen artisans on site, everyone knows him. He's the historian, unofficial "mayor" and, more officially, Keg and Case director of operations.

"They'll probably have to carry me out of here one day," says the man who made it his duty to preserve and restore many historic brewery artifacts. "And if it weren't for the support of my wife and family, none of it would've happened."

The objects he saved from demolition or dumpsters are now on display throughout the building. Stroll through the former keg house turned 33,000-square-foot food hall and you'll see Phil's imprint on surfaces at every turn.

Photos he kept were enlarged and given cheeky placement in the bathrooms. A hops scale, which was used to weigh more than 19 million pounds of hops in its 50 years of







service, stands proudly by the entrance. Upstairs on the mezzanine, there are "cradle benches" that Phil fabricated from old beer tank supports and planks of douglas fir. There are giant valve handles he turned into end tables. A 100-year-old sculpture of King Lineas, the patron saint of beer, stands in front of windows gazing over the couches and chill-spaces of the natural-light-bathed warehouse. He loaned these items to Clutch Brewing Co., whose taproom overlooks the market. One of their best selling brews, "Phil's Pils," is a co-creation featuring an old recipe he'd been saving. Another, "Lil Philly" summer pilsner, features a 1962 photo of Phil at age 3.

"There's a nice brotherhood among brewers," he says. It's why he loves supporting the young, beer-savvy owners of Clutch, as well as friends down the street at Waldmann Brewery & Wurstery, the oldest surviving commercial building in the Twin Cities. "That place is a great mix of history and beer: two of my favorite topics."

You can find that conversation at Keg and Case, too, by grabbing a seat at the Brewer's Table upstairs at Clutch. It is perhaps the mother of all of Phil's shared artifacts. One of the hundreds of items he pulled from Schmidt when it closed, the former lunchroom table was built in 1910 from the wood of 1860s brew tanks. He put 200-plus hours into restoring it. So he understandably likes to talk about it.

"It's a table for the community to come together. A lot of times, groups of people sit down at it and they don't start talking right away. But soon, they're talking. It's really brought a lot of people together."

Want a conversation starter? See if you can find Phil's initials carved into the table. The walls, as they say, are definitely talking.

What is Keg and Case?

This food hall features chef-driven restaurants, craft brewing and a curated marketplace of eclectic regional products, pop-up shops and outdoor events. It's also a building steeped in Saint Paul history that's helping a neighborhood buzz with new life.

FAMOUSLY FOODIE FRIENDLY

Foodies rejoice. You can tuck into everything from the new and hip to the classic and comforting, as well as the rustic, the random, and the really down to earth. A "come as you are" ethos makes it easy to explore Saint Paul restaurants. Whether you're in the mood for adventure or tried-and-true, it's a melting pot of fresh finds, old favorites and hidden gems.

Chef Justin Sutherland's recipe for restaurant success has all the key ingredients of the Saint Paul food scene: finely honed, collaborative and diverse — seasoned with genuine approachability.

The restaurateur's rise to celebrity is a tasty starter story in itself. He grew up in nearby Apple Valley, graduated from an Atlanta culinary school and returned to his Midwest roots to hone his skills in some of the region's top restaurants, including Meritage Oyster Bar downtown. Since opening his first establishment, the Handsome Hog in Saint Paul's Lowertown neighborhood, Sutherland has gained a reputation for excellence — and a following that extends beyond the Twin Cities. He won a culinary showdown on Food Network's "Iron Chef America," and competed on Bravo's "Top Chef Season 16," where he introduced the world to some distinctly local traditions like a high-end Juicy Lucy, the much-beloved stuffed cheeseburger. He went on to do TruTv's "Fast Foodies" Season 1 and Season 2 (airing in 2022), which showcases his haute fast food skills in pursuit of a 'Chompionship Trophy.'

Locally, he focuses his culinary efforts at the Handsome Hog, which moved to a larger location with an expanded patio in the Cathedral Hill neighborhood, and Ox Cart Arcade and Rooftop in Lowertown.

These restaurants, like Justin, are full of the "cool" factor without being too full of themselves. They're authentic spots to experience new and old at the same time.

In Diversity We Trust

His style blends the distinctness of Saint Paul with a welcoming mix of the world that reflects his African American, Japanese and Norwegian roots. "In diversity we trust," the motto of a clothing line he operates with his brother, comes across in his cooking — and his city pride.

"As a city of neighborhoods, Saint Paul is very much a big melting pot of cultures," he says, noting the newer influence of the Hmong and Somali populations in a city built by immigrants, including the Irish and Italian. "This was a sleepy town 15 years ago, which I loved. But I love being part of the growth and evolution that's been happening here. It's

very exciting. Together, we're trying to hone in on the differences that make us Saint Paul."

The differences are brought together in ways that celebrate and build off each other, he says. As a business owner and food explorer who's seen and tasted his way around the country, Sutherland says Saint Paul fits in and ranks highly in the national food scene: "We're up there, if not one of the best."

"I think we're able to be really genuine, really true to the roots of the food. And we can take more chances. In San Francisco, for instance, you wouldn't dare partner with other (competitor) chefs and do some of the things we do here. The support we share with each other, and get from the community, allows us to try new things and grow."

The proof is seen in a dining scene that's evolved dramatically over the last 20 years. One of the most exciting trends he's seeing: collaborative pop-ups where chefs experiment with new cuisine in new places, as well as the food hall "craze" that's done a little differently here, allowing startup restaurants to get a foot in the door.

World of Flavor

That welcoming attitude toward people and food is found at Allianz Field, where Justin serves as the culinary consultant tasked with telling the story of Saint Paul cuisine. Here, you can sample his and other fare while taking in a Minnesota United FC match. The soccer stadium, located in the diverse Midway neighborhood, has featured foods by local vendors since its inception — from Brasa burritos and Handsome Hog pulled pork sandwiches to a

J. Selby plant-based Cubano, El Burrito Mercado marinades, Grand Ole Creamery ice cream and more. This kind of salute to diverse local offerings has brought more than just new flavor to the table.

"It's changing the mindset. For a long time in America, you had the hierarchy of big name chefs (the known commodities) that people celebrated and sought out. But the whole time, there's been a lot of good food cooked in these mom and pop shops by a lot of the immigrant population we have around here. I think we've done a really good job of recognizing those foods, those styles, and supporting some of these people."

When it comes to tasting your way through town, it's also vital to remember the old standbys that have shaped classic Saint Paul: from West 7th, where you'll find staples like Mancini's and "some of the best Italian red sauce ever" at places like DeGidio's and Cossetta's. Or the hearty Irish meals that recall early immigrant stories. Meanwhile, Sutherland says new stories are shaping University Avenue, where there's no better spot in Minnesota than here for Thai, Hmong, Vietnamese or Ethiopian foods.

"It's worth visiting University, or the East Side or West Side for Hispanic food at spots like El Burrito Mercado. Those spots are real Saint Paul. The rest of us are kind of filling in the blanks."

His advice for exploring the depth and variety of Saint Paul's modern flavor?

"Put your eating pants on. Take a drive through some of those off the beaten path neighborhoods and eat some of that food. If some lights are burnt out on the sign, and the door's creaky ... that's where I want to eat."

Mouthwatering Markets


Make your way through a market or bustling food hall where you can sample a wide world of flavor in one visit. The Hmongtown Marketplace and Hmong Village provide tastes of southeast Asia, including pho, barbecue, curry, spring rolls, boba tea, stuffed chicken wings and more. Insider tip from food writer and chef, Mecca Bos: be sure to experience a made-to-order fresh green papaya salad. Just tell a vendor how you like your salad — more or less sweet, sour, umami or spicy. Then eat up. It's an event.



3 WAYS TO TASTE THE TOWN •

We asked Mecca Bos, Saint Paul-based food writer and professional chef, for three "do not miss" spots in her beloved city.









University Avenue's Thai Cafe. Standing in the shadows of the bigger and more famous Bangkok Thai Deli (also a 'don't miss'), Thai Cafe is a mom-and-pop shop for the ages with some of the best food I've eaten, anywhere. Order the Sour Pork Ribs and prepare to have life changed, forever.

Brunson's Pub. Growing up on the Eastside, I would want my visitor to have a quintessentially Eastside experience. Brunson's is just that: part vintage neighborhood pub, part melting pot, part simple burger and beer joint, and all parts excellent.

Engaging with our vast East African community is a Minnesota experience that's not to be missed. Have a full injera, tibs and wat meal at Fasika, the Snelling Avenue Ethiopian institution, and if you can go with a group, even better. Sharing is the whole point.











HIDDEN GEMS

Experience a beautiful traditional Ethiopian coffee ceremony and a wide selection of East African cuisine at cozy Sabrina's Cafe & **Deli**. Feel welcome — or "Karibu" in Swahili — at **Karibu Grocery** and Deli, where you can snack on Somali rice and sambusas on the patio near Swede Hollow Park. A few blocks away, try the popular pupusas at Mañana Restaurant, which dispenses tamales and other Salvadoran and Mexican classics in an unpretentious locale.

There are a lot of delicious reasons to stray off the beaten path. Consider some of these family-owned and -operated eateries.

Want grub from the North Country? The Iron Ranger pub serves a diverse mix of Minnesota comfort food ranging from Cornish pasties and Croatian cabbage rolls to Italian porketta and Slovenian potica. Feel like watching the boats go by? Get a drink or a bite at City House for seasonal dining in a restored grain elevator right on the Mississippi River. A fast casual concept, **Urban** Wok cooks up vegan and gluten free Asian fare with daily made-fromscratch sauces.

Cool treats

A perfect summer day in Minnesota starts on the water and ends at an ice cream shop. Our hot spots for cool treats:

FRESH FINDS






Get out and about

Urban explorers can take the METRO Green Line to the Little Mekong District for XIAART and on to the Creative Enterprise Zone. This artsy neighborhood is home to the annual Chroma Zone Mural & Art Festival and Can Can Wonderland, a popular family and datenight destination for artist-designed mini golf, live entertainment and arts-infused performances. On the East Side, check out Indigenous Roots Cultural Arts Center. In Lowertown, AZ Gallery.

Hunt for it

Look for **Sidewalk Poetry** under your feet in 1,000 spots around town. Vibrant murals adorn buildings in the Creative Enterprise Zone, Snelling and Selby Avenues, and beyond. LOVE FOR LOWERTOWN

With its warehouses, railroads and river access, Lowertown was Minnesota's manufacturing hub at the turn of the 19th century. Today, the neighborhood is a vibrant artists' quarter filled with galleries, restaurants, breweries, the stunning CHS Field, a farmers' market and more. Ta-coumba Aiken is one of the artists and community activists who led the area's creative transformation into an urban village. Fondly called "The mayor of Lowertown," he helped found the Lowertown Lofts Artists Cooperative, which welcomes visitors each

year for the Saint Paul Art Crawl. His artworks grace spaces throughout Saint Paul, including the 117-by-33-foot "Be Nice!" mural visible from the light rail stop outside of Union Depot. Go inside the historic train station to see "Forever Saint Paul," featuring the world's most Lite-Brite pegs ever used in a painting. Ta-coumba says you'll find great people, cultures, attractions and some tasty jazz and classical music venues in this city — especially if you bring a positive attitude.

Today, Anwar continues the family tradition as a Juventas coach and internationally recognized circus artist.



That vibe extends to **The Fitzgerald Theater**, which features world music, public radio events and more.

Minnesota Music Cafe and Wilebski Blues Saloon are known for local independent acts that roll with soul. From folk and jazz to roots and hiphop, intimate sounds abound in venues like Ginkgo Coffeehouse.

For the arena experience, catch the biggest touring acts at **Xcel Energy Center**, a 20,000-seat arena with international acclaim. Next door, **The Legendary Roy Wilkins Auditorium** has hosted everyone from Elvis to Bruno
Mars and packs the house for the much loved Minnesota Roller Derby.

Free summer shows & fantastic festivals

Summer's not nearly long enough, so we make a point of bringing people together outside as often as possible. And with the welcoming, accessible charms of these venues, you'll likely want to keep coming back for more.

When in Lowertown, your first stop should be Mears Park for Lowertown Sounds on Thursday nights, then come back for the Twin Cities Jazz Festival and the Lowertown Blues and Funk Fest. Talk about free and fun.



Want more outdoor music?

There's a performance almost any night of the week, including these free venues where you can kick back on a blanket or lawn chair.

BANDS ON THE BOULEVARD Tuesdays in July

If Saint Paul's breweries were united by one common ingredient, it wouldn't be hops, though locally sourced ingredients are a mainstay. It's not the water, though a deep ground aquifer helped put the city on the map in the 1800s as a brewing powerhouse. When you boil and ferment it all down, it's about love. Of community. Of place. Of craft.

The motto at Urban Growler sums it up nicely: "We bring people together through beer." Which makes sense, since in many ways, Minnesota's first women-owned microbrewery got its start in a love story. A decade ago, Master Brewer Deb Loch and Restaurateur Jill Pavlak traded in their successful, steady careers in corporate America and sales to pursue a passion for brewing and great food. After scouring the Twin Cities for the perfect location, they found a spot that would ideally accommodate their dream of bringing people together.

"They say you date Minneapolis, but you marry Saint Paul," Jill says, noting that her partner in life and business, Deb, is very "Saint Paul."


Each of these entrepreneurs professes a love for the city where they've made a home for themselves and their business. Their neighborhood, called the Creative Enterprise Zone, has an extra special place in their hearts. It's where so many people embraced their startup business. And where they've poured extra attention into supporting local activities like maker's markets, painting classes, book signings and pet celebrations. Organizations seek out the Urban Growler's charming rental spaces, taproom and outdoor beer garden knowing there's more than unique craft beer, but great food and nonalcoholic beverages in a welcoming atmosphere.

"We're beer for you, in every kind of way," Deb says. And like the Urban Growler, with its dog-friendly, bike-friendly, people-friendly mantra, so too is the tight-knit brewing community of Saint Paul. Whether you're exploring on your own, with friends, or on a brewery tour, odds are you'll always find folks who are eager to welcome you into their world to share a pint and a conversation.









The Creative Enterprise Zone, located in the city's northwest corner, is home to artists, makers and a tasty variety of independent breweries that are just a hop, skip and a jump away from each other.

Bang Brewing, next door to Urban Growler, makes organic-only brew inside a repurposed grain bin.

Burning Brothers Brewing, two miles east, is a dedicated gluten-free facility known for its Pyro Pale Ale.

BlackStack Brewing shares a historic industrial building with FlannelJax's axe throwing and CanCan Wonderland.

Lake Monster Brewing explores monstrous depths of beer flavor with an ode to Minnesota's love of lakes.

Dual Citizen prides itself as a community-focused brewhouse offering inspired, modern takes on familiar favorites.

The Lab Pilot Facility & Taproom features a self-serve tapwall and unique pilot brewing services for beverage makers.

The romance of the past stirs rich moments in the present.
That's captured perfectly in Saint Paul lodging that's both modern and brimming with historic charm.

If you're after a storybook setting, or one out of a 1920s movie, you've come to the right place. History lovers have a host of one-of-a-kind lodging choices in the heart of the city: from the boutique and the beautiful to the seductive and serene. Here are a few spots to consider.

The name says it all. **The Saint Paul Hotel**, built in 1910, is a case in point for unique hotels that literally define the city. This iconic downtown destination overlooks Rice Park, the Ordway and Landmark Center. It's played host to celebrities, weddings, high teas and eventful getaways for over a century. A stay pairs nicely with a night at the opera or a Wild hockey game.

In a city of Saints and sinners, this is truly a heavenly hotel. **The Celeste** opened in 2020 after being remodeled from its origins as a convent and fine arts academy. That past is on display in the lush decor of the lounge, hallways, breakfast Chapel and rooms — including original paintings with some divine inspiration. Its signature rooms offer views of the state Capitol, which is located blessedly close by.

An art deco delight, the **Hyatt Place** in Lowertown was once a government building and mail-sorting facility. The hotel was recently transformed from the Custom House, built in 1933, and is listed on the National Register of Historic Places. Rooms feature elevated ceilings and 13-foot windows, some of which look out on the nearby Mississippi River.

Live like a land baron. **The Davidson**, considered one of the city's finest homes when built in 1915 as the Davidson Mansion, was meticulously transformed into a nine-unit boutique hotel maintaining its English manor pedigree, including extensive gardens. It's a first of its kind on Summit Avenue. Historically, visitors wined, dined and lodged a few blocks to the north in the Cathedral Hill neighborhood. Case in point: the hotel's nearby sister property, **The Commodore**, features a 1920s atmosphere in a luxe bar once frequented by F. Scott and Zelda Fitzgerald.


HISTORIC WAYS

Saint Paul's past is rich with the stories of proud native cultures, bold immigrants, titans of industry, literary masters, architectural giants and even notorious Prohibition-era gangsters. That past comes alive in the streets and spaces of a town steeped in elegant Old World charms.



TAKE A STROLL

Summit Avenue, with the longest stretch of preserved Victorian homes in the United States, is a national treasure. Here, you'll find an astounding 373 of the street's original 440 homes — with historic mansions that represent a variety of architectural styles. Any time of year, it's worth a walk, bike or drive along this five-mile boulevard between the Mississippi River and Cathedral Hill on the cusp of downtown.



200 BC-400 AD {Sacred ground}

INDIAN MOUNDS PARK

Evidence of the indigenous people who first called these river banks home is seen in six burial mounds high atop 450-million-year-old limestone and sandstone bluffs overlooking downtown and the Mississippi River. They are among the oldest human-made structures in Minnesota and the only ancient Native American burial mounds still within a major U.S. city. HISTORIC FORT SNELLING

More than a military fort and interpretive center, it's a place to connect with the complexity that's shaped American history. This National Historic Landmark resides on Dakota homeland, known as Bdote, at the confluence of two mighty rivers. Learn stories of the fort and surrounding area, home to a wide history that includes Native people, trade, soldiers and veterans, enslaved people, immigrants and a changing landscape. An all new visitor center opens Memorial Day Weekend 2022.

SUMMIT AVENUE HOMES

This 5-mile boulevard connects the Mississippi River to the cusp of downtown. It is home to the longest stretch of intact Victorian architecture in the United States — most built between the Civil War and World War I. It's worth taking a stroll or drive here any time of year.

JAMES J. HILL HOUSE

{Reflection of a Gilded Age}

The Summit Avenue mansion built on a bluff overlooking the city was the crown jewel of Saint Paul homes upon its completion by railroad magnate James J. Hill, the "Empire Builder." The 36,500-square-foot, 42-room house remains one of the best examples of Richardson Romanesque architecture in the country. Open for weekly tours. mnhs.org/hillhouse







Tours to get closer

Take a thematic tour to discover more of Saint Paul's history, food, breweries, ethnic roots and more. Hop on a bus to see the sites of Prohibition-era kidnappings and gun battles. Taste your way through the Skyway or Cathedral Hill on a food tour. Get a bird's eye view of the city with MN Helicopter Tours. Or take a walking tour with the Minnesota Historical Society. LANDMARK CENTER

Originally built as a federal courthouse and post office, the Landmark Center was saved from demolition by citizen groups in the 1970s. Restored to serve as an arts and cultural center, the interior features a fivestory skylit courtyard and rooms with 20-foot ceilings. Its beautiful, castle-like design of turrets, spires, a clock tower and red clay tile roof are emblematic of Romanesque Revival architecture. Open to the public daily. landmarkcenter.org

MINNESOTA CAPITOL

Designed by influential architect Cass Gilbert, the Capitol building features the second-largest selfsupporting marble dome in the world. This masterpiece features an impressive rotunda, grand staircases, amazing murals and works of art, including the rooftop's Quadriga — golden horses representing the four elements of earth, air, water and fire. Free guided tours offered. mnhs.org/capitol

THE MARJORIE MCNEELY CONSERVATORY AT COMO ZOO

Designed in 1914 by architect Frederick Nussbaumer, the conservatory is one of very few glass-domed Victorianstyle indoor gardens in the U.S. The garden, home to more than 260 varieties of plants, is open every day of the year. Free with donation suggested. comozooconservatory.org

CATHEDRAL OF SAINT PAUL

One of the most impressive cathedrals in the United States, the Cathedral of Saint Paul sits on a hill overlooking downtown Saint Paul and the Mississippi River. It is the third largest Catholic church building in the country. Guided tours are offered Tuesday through Friday at 1 p.m. cathedralsaintpaul.org

WABASHA STREET CAVES

Dive into the dark and mysterious past of gangsters and outlaws. These caves, originally mined for silica to make glass, were used as a mushroom farm before turning into a speakeasy during Prohibition. At that time, Saint Paul was a hotbed for whisky bootleggers and criminals like John Dillinger and Ma Barker. Today, you can tour the caves, now on the National Register of Haunted Places, and dance to big band music in the event hall on Swing Night Thursdays. wabashastreetcaves.com

Hockey is the heartbeat of Minnesota and fans come together in Saint Paul in more ways than you can shake a stick at. For high energy action, there's nothing like game day when the NHL's Minnesota Wild face off at **Xcel Energy Center**. The arena also hosts top college playoff games each season and the storied Minnesota State High School League boys' tourney, one of the highest-attended state sports tournaments in the world. It's kinda like our Super Bowl.

At nearby **TRIA Rink**, the official practice facility for the Minnesota Wild, you can watch all ages of hockey and do some rink ratting of your own. This rooftop rink in the Treasure Island Center features stunning city views and high caliber play. It's home ice to the National Women's Hockey League champion Minnesota Whitecaps. In a state that leads the U.S. in girls' hockey players, Whitecaps games always sell out. On your way inside, look for the world's largest hockey mural on the building's exterior.
