Town hall provides overview on several current projects

The utility held a town hall to inform staff of several projects that employees are working on.

The meeting provided an overview of the funding for the Lead Free SPRWS project that the state is hoped to provide. Discussion is around \$800 million over 10 years for lead service line replacement in the state. That would be between \$80 - \$90 million a year annually for that time, which would be shared throughout the state. SPRWS is hopeful that it could receive about a quarter of that funding if it is approved.

A quick overview of the new Sharepoint site was given by Adam Worm, management assistant. Adam

explained what the new Sharepoint site incorporates from the old Waternet site and the new features it will have in the future.

Martha Burckhardt, IS manager, provided a look inside the process of obtaining a new customer service portal online for our customers that will include many new features and allow for greater flexibility in accepting payments.

Todd Blomstrom, distribution division manager, talked about the new Enterprise Asset Management System (EAMS) that is to replace the current

Tuition reimbursement available

Looking for a way to pay for schooling?

The city provides up to \$600 of tuition reimbursement per year for full-time employees and up to \$300 for part-time staff.

The utility will provide up to \$2,500 per year for full-time employees and up to \$600 for part-time staff.

With city and SPRWS benefits combined, a full-time employee could be reimbursed up to \$3,100 for coursework taken as part of an accredited program.
