Awarding the sale of General Obligation Capital Improvement Bonds, Series 2011A in order to finance certain capital improvements and refund certain prior capital improvement bonds; fixing the form and specifications of the Series 2011A Bonds; directing the execution and delivery of the Series 2011A Bonds; and providing for the payment of and levying a tax for the Series 2011A bonds and the refunding of the prior bonds.

Todd Hurley, Acting Manager, Office of Financial Services, appeared. He noted that agenda items 24 through 27 are bond sales that were held earlier on this date. They are the 2011 CIB, 2011 Street Improvement Bonds, 2011 Sewer Revenue Bonds, 2011 Water Revenue Refunding Bonds, and 2011 Series E Water Revenue Refunding Bonds Taxable. Prior to the sale, the Sewer Utility and the Water Utility were reviewed by both Moody's and Standard and Poor's rating agencies. All three entities of the City: Sewer, Water, and the City, were reaffirmed as AAA by Standard and Poor's which is the highest credit quality possible. In their rating, Standard and Poor's once again reaffirmed the City's strong financial management assessment rating meaning that the City's financial management practices are "strong, well embedded, and likely sustainable."

Moody's reaffirmed the City's, Water Utility's, and Sewer's AA1 rating and left the City on a positive outlook for a potential upgrade to AAA. Mr. Hurley said they pushed hard to see why they would not be upgraded to AAA. The looming State of Minnesota problem that could affect the City is the reason why Moody's has maintained the AA1 and maintained the City's positive outlook.

Mr. Hurley said it was an extremely successful sale. The City is still in historically low interest rates. The high credit quality of the City, Sewer and Water Utility are very important in these markets. These are volatile times and things that happen throughout the world result in a flight to quality and it's great that the City of Saint Paul and its' entities are high quality, Hurley said.

This resolution awards the winning bid for the \$15.185 million GO Capital Improvement Bonds, Series 2011A. The bonds were sold to refund the 2003 CIB and provide funding for the various capital improvement projects as part of the City's annual capital improvement program. The refunding resulted in a \$155,000 present value savings to the City.

Six bids were received in this sale. The lowest one came from Stifel Nicolaus at a rate of 2.14% with a cover bid of 2.19% coming from UBS.

The Council was presented with a completion certificate that will allow Financial Services to update and amend the resolution.

Councilmember Harris commended Mr. Hurley and his staff for the good job they always do on the bond sales and the immense amount of money that is saved for the City. Harris asked if they had a budgeted estimate for the 2011 budget. Mr. Hurley responded that when they build the budget, depending on how risky the times seem, it is around 5% and they have come in well under 5%. Also, the principle is amortized over 10 years so it's not like half of the budget is saved. He will be showing the Council what the actual budget savings are. Of the \$155,000 of the refunding, one-quarter of that is going to be savings in this year and 75% will be savings next year.

Harris said he would like an e-mail from FSO to the Council showing the net 2011 savings on all these issues. The Council needs to have that number as one of the considerations when they enter budget deliberations. It can't just disappear into fund balance, they need to know that it was unbudgeted. Mr. Hurley said that report has become standard over the past few years.

Baird with a cover bid of 3.77%, 1/1000th of a basis point higher coming from Piper Jaffrey. Todd Hurley, Acting Director, Office of Financial Services, stated this resolution awards two different bond sales of Water Revenue Bonds. This issue had to be split between taxable and tax exempt bond funds. It awards \$3,865,000 in tax exempt revenue bonds, Series 2011D and the \$2,665,000 taxable water revenue bonds, Series 2011E. These bonds were sold to refund the 1998 Minnesota Public Facilities Authority Note. Some extra work was required on this looking at the sources of the money that the PFA gave the City which was a combination of State tax exempt dollars and Federal grant dollars which the State received plus do a pro-rata refunding with both taxable and tax exempt bonds.

The first issue is the tax exempt series. Four bid were received with the lowest rate of 1.99% from Piper Jaffrey. The cover bid was 2.01% from Hutchinson and Shockey.

Eight bids were received for the taxable series. The lowest bid was from Robert Baird at 1.2% and the cover from UBS at 1.27%.

Mr. Hurley said the present value savings is \$400,000 for the Water Utility.

The completion certificates before Council allows staff to amend the resolution to include the relevant purchaser.

Councilmember Stark presented an amended resolution and provided background information saying there was a lawsuit against the Central Corridor project and the courts determined the project had to do some environmental work with business mitigation which they did. The headline of that work was that the overall impact on businesses along the corridor was fairly modest as a percentage of their overall revenues. But when the details are looked at, there are some significant losses that weren't protected for certain kinds of businesses. Mr. Stark said they looked at what kinds of losses, based on the study, that businesses should expect and then went back and looked at all the ways in which both the City and the Council have contributed to mitigation type efforts. The basis of the resolution is to say that there is still about a \$3.6 million gap between what has been done and what the report says will be the losses of these businesses on University Avenue. He said they are urging the Metropolitan Council to find a way to add to their mitigation of the original project.
