### **Public Works Vision/Mission/Values**

**Vision**: A thriving, prosperous, and connected Saint Paul for all.

**Mission**: Public Works designs, builds, and maintains safe, sustainable, and equitable public infrastructure and services to meet the needs of Saint Paul for today and into the future.

**Values**: Equity, Safety, Service, Sustainability, Trust



### **Public Works Overview: Assets**

Saint Paul Public Works is a nationally accredited department with more than 400 employees who maintain the public infrastructure and systems of Minnesota's capital city:

- 1,874 lane miles of streets
- 1,200 miles of sidewalks
- 330 miles of alleys
- 806 miles of sanitary sewer & 450 miles of storm sewer
- 107 bridges
- 200+ miles of bike lanes
- 38,000 street lights
- 375 signalized intersections
- 4,200+ gallons of paint applied annually for long lines, crosswalks, and messages
- 70,000+ signs



## Public Works Overview: Operations & Services

#### **Maintenance and Operations**

- Plowing and snow clearing deliver services for snow events and snow emergencies
- Patching and paving skimming residential streets, year-round pothole patching
- Street sweeping fall and spring citywide & frequent downtown and arterial sweeps
- Street lighting and signal operations electrical payments

#### **Solid Waste and Recycling**

- 74,000 households for garbage service (7,400 serviced by city staff in 2025)
- 129,000 households for recycling service

#### **Public Rights of Way Management**

12,000 annual right of way, transportation, utility plan, sidewalk café, & residential parking permits issued

#### **Parking Management**

1,970 parking meters/spots (193 pay stations and 430 coin meters)

### **Opportunities & Challenges: Short Term**

#### Funding

 E.g., IIJA, Safe Streets for All (\$16.7M) Rondo RAISE (\$2M) grants, and State bonding (\$77M 3rd/Kellogg Bridge)

#### Innovations

- Snow Operations, e.g., automated routing, one-sided winter parking cycle
- Solid Waste and recycling (from collection, to diversion and reduction)
- Copper wire legislation and anti-theft strategies

#### Community engagement

- Equity, and expanding ownership/inclusion/connections, e.g., Rondo RAISE
- Program/project input and improvements

#### Service expectations

- Evaluate and "cost-out" options/needs, e.g., 2019 PCI study
- Clarify with policy makers/public, e.g., snow ops and signs/markings



## **Opportunities & Challenges: Long Term**

#### Sufficient funding

- Enough to achieve lifecycle replacement and maintenance goals
- Example: Common Cent for arterials/collectors, sewer utility

#### Sustainable funding

- Predictable funding over time
- Example: Sewer utility, garbage and recycling

#### Matching sources & uses

- Align by asset type, e.g. street sweeping, and solid waste
- Expand who pays, when possible, e.g. Common Cent
- Preserve General Fund for services/assets with no other sources, e.g. residential streets

## 2025 Budget Proposal







### 2025 Budget Goals

#### **Achieve citywide General Fund reduction goals**

Shift funding from the General Fund to other sources when possible

#### Plan and deliver new service expectations

- New snow operations
- Solid waste and recycling
- Economic development and tax base growth

#### **Pursue new funding strategies and opportunities**

- Vegetation management from Right of Way (ROW) permitting fees
- Parking enforcement and Right of Way management
- Common Cent implementation

#### Address existing funding gaps affecting traffic safety operations

- Pavement marking materials (e.g., existing crosswalks, bike lanes, long lines)
- Sign materials (e.g., existing life cycle, knockdowns, graffiti, theft)



### 2025 Proposed Changes: Sewer Utility Revenue Transfer

## **Special Fund transfer into General Fund for Street Sweeping (ongoing)**

- Increase revenue shift from Sewer Utility to Street Maintenance (General Fund) by \$950,000 to cover 95% of street sweeping costs, keeping debris out of storm sewers
- Revenue transfer to off-set and reduce pressure on General Fund
- Right-sizing funding sources and uses and creating a more financially sustainable program





#### **Snow Operations: \$425,000 (one time)**

- Rationale: Residents and businesses expect improvements in snow operations service
- Contracts needed to accomplish required analysis and planning for new citywide snow operations, such as:
- Parking analysis and modeling
- Signing plan and design
- Engineering work
- Community engagement and communications
- Pilot in designated neighborhoods
- Electronic ticketing





#### **Create new Development Review Position: \$173,789 (ongoing)**

- Rationale: New position to better support citywide large economic/housing development projects and tax base creation
- Increases ability to coordinate construction projects in partnership with PED, DSI, CRWSD, SPRWS, Parks, etc.
- Supports ability to manage Public Works projects and reduces staff impacts to other construction related projects

#### Restore funding for signs and markings (Traffic Operations): \$247,252

- Rationale: Restore funding to address increase in costs and historical spending to meet minimum safety and reflectivity/replacement requirements
- Repurpose two vacancies in Street Maintenance (one time) \$197,252
- Increase funding from General Fund (ongoing) \$50,000



#### Downtown investments: \$118,000 (one time)

- Rationale: Support downtown development and activation, including the Downtown Alliance's Investment Plan.
- \$118,000 includes funding for:
- additional clean-ups \$78,000
- street lights maintenance \$25,000
- additional signage and wayfinding \$15,000
- Additional garbage cans \$75,000 (special fund through Solid Waste and Recycling)

Total downtown investment (general and special funds) of \$193,000

## Rate Changes: Right of Way (ROW)

## Goal – accomplish needed business improvements within Right of Way Management through increased permit fees.

#### **ROW Inspection Capabilities (\$97,400)**

 Improve timeliness and quality of interactions and field presence, leading to improved compliance and best management of right of way for the public

#### **ROW Vegetation Management (\$200,000)**

- Improve the public's perception and enjoyment of public spaces
- Support ongoing care of new plantings through Common Cent, etc.
- Ensure compliance with regulations

#### Parking Management for Public Works Operations (\$288,300)

- Support snow operations electronic ticketing
- Ensure compliant parking: Public Works operations (residential parking permits, Public Works field operations with posted No Parking (Sweeping, Mill and Overlay, etc.),
- Permitted No Parking for developers, utilities, and others
- Special events/permits for reserved metered parking spaces

### Solid Waste and Recycling Program Changes

- City crews will provide residential collection service for garbage to 10% of residents
  - Focus on difficult to serve alleys
  - Create city union jobs (18 FTEs)
  - Immediately respond and deploy needed resources in case of natural disaster
  - New facility with expanded services for the public
- Bulky item collection will expand from 2-3 items to 12 items at same cost.
  - Easier for residents not need to be scheduled except for recyclable items (electronics/mattresses)
  - Increase use of bulkies (currently only at 10%)
- Opting out and cart sharing will be phased in, with provisions.
- Cart repairs and deliveries will be handled by city staff, not contracted haulers.
- All customer service calls, including requests for service holds, will be handled by city staff.
- Bills will be issued quarterly for garbage services by the city, not the garbage hauler.
- The city will organize four regional clean-ups in partnership with FCC (garbage hauler).
  - Bulky items/illegally dumped and bagged litter will be collected
- Solid Waste team will collect and dispose of illegally dumped items and litter bins in ROW
  - Currently managed by Street Maintenance utilizing general funds



## Garbage and Recycling Annual Service Fee Proposed Rates Pending Council Approval

Fees collected annually with Ramsey County Property taxes. Fee covers the cost of carts, program administration, clean-up programs, education and outreach.

- Recycling annual service fee includes collection costs, residents are not billed separately for this service.
- Garbage annual service does not include collection or disposal costs, residents are billed separately for this service.

Contract sets collection cost at 3.5% increase; disposal varies by year and is set by county.



## **Rate Changes: Sewer Utility**

- Annual Sewer Rate Study results completed by Baker-Tilly on Sept 18. They
  are recommending increase to both sanitary and storm sewer rates
- Requesting time to review recommendations and return to Council to present 2025 Sewer Rates by November 6
- Increase 2025 revenue shift from Sewer Utility to General Fund by \$950,000 to cover 95% of street sweeping costs, keeping debris out of storm sewers

#### **PRESSURES FOR RATE INCREASE**

- MCES fee increase of nearly 10% in 2025
- Recent legal changes initiated the shift of revenue from sewer utility to cover 95%
   of street sweeping costs, as sweeping keeps debris out of storm sewers
- Planned street improvements, LOST (Common Cent) and capital projects put additional pressure on sewers

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
