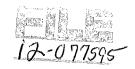

Creative Kidstuff Sign Variance Grounds for Appeal July 2, 2012

It is our understanding that the three main reasons that the Board of Zoning denied our Variance Appeal focused on these issues, which we continue to contest:

- 1. The signage will cause a distraction.
- 2. The sign is not in keeping with the "quaint" look and feel of Grand Avenue.
- 3. The square footage for signage is over the amount allowed by the city ordinance.

Creative Kidstuff intends to defend its rights to display decorative statues on the outside of its building that will delight and embellish Grand Avenue.

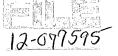
Reason One: Signage as a distraction

This issue has been only proven out to be measurable when signs are lit up, digital, and as some research shows, viewed as a "TV on a stick." In fact, the research that I have provided from The Governors Highway Safety Association associates substantial distraction mainly with food, cell phone talking and texting, other people in the car, gadget laden dashboards and people using their vehicles for other purposes than driving.

The lion and tiger sculptures proposed for the Grand Avenue location will be static, non-moving painted metal sculpture, leading to no distraction.

Reason Two: The proposed new storefront is not in keeping with the "quaint" look and feel of Grand Avenue

Have you looked at Grand Avenue lately? In regard to national vs. local tenants, store design and uniqueness? Is there a style guide that has been supplied to potential landlords and tenants depicting colors, structure and visual appropriate guidelines? Or is this a subjective opinion and if so, then who is to tell a business owner what is or is not appropriate to running their business and in keeping with their brand? Do the subjective parties pay property, payroll and sales taxes and contribute to the community with hosting events and fundraisers? I have and will show a slide show to the Council detailing what exactly Grand Avenue looks like. It will be eye opening. Creative Kidstuff has been a good neighbor, pays taxes and contributes fiscally to the community and has always been aesthetically responsible for over 28 years in St. Paul. Creative Kidstuff is a locally owned and run company, competing with the national boxes that seem to buy their way into any city and the consumer's pocketbook. Yet the foundation of Grand Avenue



has been to keep it local. We have striven to show our unique brand personality in each one of our stores, and purposefully made each one uniquely different. We are celebrating 30 years in business this year and we intend on being around for many more decades. We need to continue to stand apart, please help us to achieve that goal.

Reason Three: The "signage" size exceeds the square footage limit designated by the city for signage.

That is IF the City designates the sculpture to be signage. We do not. In fact, if you do not count the lion and tiger as anything but what they are - which are sculptural elements - we have actually reduced our footprint for signage. Therefore we believe this should not be considered an issue.

At Creative Kidstuff, our mission is simple: we help families play. Why? Because play is joyful, educational, creative and inspiring. Creative Kidstuff passionately believes in the importance of play, nurturing creativity and wonder. Our stores, inside and out, are designed to embrace that vision. What is art? What is a sign? It is up to the City Council to decide.

We have a storefront lion sculpture larger than what is proposed in another suburban city, St. Louis Park. It is considered a supergraphic / artistic visual element (enclosed you will find their findings.) We believe that what we have designed is a fun and intriguing way to teach the history of art and sculpture as you enter a store.

The ancient Egyptians worshipped the cat, and produced thousands of sculptures depicting this noble feline. The Creative Kidstuff communication materials include the lion / tiger illustration, so it was a natural to consider this image and extrapolate it into a work of art, referencing one of the most well-known works of art from ancient times. It is this attitude, and our desire to bring educational elements into the Creative Kidstuff sphere of wonder and influence, that inspired the storefront. It is our goal to support and develop curious young minds (and older minds as well) to help them thirst for bigger and better outlets for knowledge.
