Hi Tom,
Sorry we didn't have anyone at the public hearing and I appreciate you wanting our feedback. Regarding deregulation of rates, it is a bad idea. Rates nationally are regulated and it is for one primary reason and that is to protect the consumer since a metered rate is not necessarily transparent. If rates were deregulated, it would be an anarchy and the City would receive hundreds of calls a week complaining about getting ripped off by a cab driver.

On the minimum fare, the company that wants it increased doesn't even charge the current maximum allowed rate of $\$ 2.20$ per mile and a $\$ 2.50$ flag. They currently charge $\$ 2.00$ per mile with a $\$ 2.00$ flag. They want to advertise lower rates but make up for it in the first mile or two by stating it is a City mandated minimum. Furthermore, if they simply raise their rates to the new proposed rates, they hit their $\$ 8$ minimum at the 2 mile mark. I'm sure they will state most of their runs go less than 2 miles which might be accurate. But should those consumers really pay $\$ 8$ for a 1 mile run? Or worse yet $\$ 8$ for a 0.5 mile run?

I have attached an Excel spreadsheet that shows the math for the company that I assume is asking for the $\$ 8$ minimum. I pulled their current rates off of their website. My math doesn't account for the flag increment but in the case of St. Paul Yellow Taxi, it is only $1 / 20^{\text {th }}$ so it is insignificant in the total cost (\$0.10).
