SUBJECT: Summary of the public process and comments received on the proposal for bicycle lanes on Hamline Avenue between University Avenue and Pierce Butler Route.

This memorandum presents a summary of the public process and comments received on the proposal to incorporate bicycle facilities into Saint Paul Public Works' scheduled mill and overlay of Hamline Avenue from University Avenue to Minnehaha Avenue, as well as Public Works' proposal to extend bicycle lanes on Hamline north of the street resurfacing between Minnehaha Avenue and Pierce Butler Route. The full text of all written statements received is attached to the end of this memorandum.

The proposal to implement bicycle facilities on Hamline Avenue was released publicly in March 2016. A website was created for the project, providing an overview of the planned improvements, data, project documents, visuals, timeline, and a project contact for questions and comments. Each project website was linked to on stpaul.gov/bikeprojects, a website providing a list of all bicycle projects throughout the city.

Notification was sent to of the District Council where the project was proposed (Hamline Midway Coalition, District 11), and city staff attended a Hamline Midway Coalition Transportation Committee Meeting and District Council-sponsored open house to present information on the proposed improvements to Hamline Avenue. City staff and Hamline-Midway Coalition staff also attended a June Hamline Hi-Rise Resident Council meeting to present information and answer resident questions on the proposed Hamline Avenue bike facilities.

Hamline Avenue Open House:

A City-sponsored community open house was held in May 2016 for the proposed bicycle facilities on Hamline Avenue. Residents and property owners within 200 feet of the proposed project were sent notifications of the open house via mail, along with an overview of the project details and impacts. 628 flyers were sent out for the Hamline Avenue open house. The flyers provided a map of the project, a link to the project website, contact information for city staff, and information about the project details.

Open House details:

- Hamline Avenue Open House Thursday, May 26, from 6:00 PM to 7:30 PM at the Sejong Academy Library (1330 Blair Avenue W, Saint Paul, MN, 55104).
- A total of 49 attendees were recorded on the sign-in sheet





Written Statements Received:

As of September 12, 2016, city staff received a total of 76 statements specific to proposed bicycle facilities on Hamline Avenue from the following sources:

- Comments sent or forwarded to city staff via email (32 statements)
- Comment forms from the open house (33 statements)
- Statements received on Open Saint Paul (8 on-forum statements)
- Requested transcription of telephone conversations (2 statements)
- Summary of Hamline Avenue Survey Responses

(*note*: this survey was created and administered by the Hamline-Midway Coalition. This memo includes a summary of all survey responses. A file containing the complete survey forms is available on the Hamline Bike Lanes Project Website, and is attached to City Council Resolutions RES PH 16-267 and RES PH 16-268).

It should be noted that the total number of statements received may include multiple statements from some individuals, as well as some duplicate statements (e.g. an individual may have provided written feedback at an Open House and provided feedback online on Open Saint Paul).

Mr. Stark, Ms. Lantry, and Mr. St. Martin,

The Board of Directors and Transportation Committee of the Hamline Midway Coalition (District Council 11) recommend the approval of proposed plans for in-street separated bicycle lanes between University Avenue and Minnehaha Avenue and removing on-street parking from the East side of the street as part of the Mill and Overlay work to be completed in 2016. We further recommend approval for extending the bike lanes North to Pierce Butler Route at this time and removing on-street parking from both sides of the road to allow better safety for all road users.

Hamline Midway is an active community that is committed to having multimodal transportation options. The Hamline Midway Coalition Transportation Committee prioritized safety for bicycling and walking in our Neighborhood Transportation Plan, and feel these proposals are in line with the established vision for transportation in the community.

Hamline Avenue is already a well-utilized bike route through the neighborhood, as evidenced by the attached bike count data (Attachment 1) collected by the HMC Transportation Committee. However it is clear that most people do not feel safe biking on this route as it is currently configured. In a survey distributed by the committee (Attachment 2), 65% of respondents said they use Hamline Avenue as a bicyclist. At the same time, the overall sense of safety was ranked low compared to driving or walking on Hamline Avenue. We also recognize that bike lanes have proven to be effective traffic calming measures, something we view as important, in light of concerns raised in the community regarding traffic speed and safety on Hamline Avenue.

Hamline Avenue is a vital neighborhood street that serves five schools, valued local businesses, places of worship and residences. Considering current demand and capacity for parking, as illustrated in the Public Works parking study, removing parking from only one side of the street between University Avenue, and Minnehaha Avenue is a good compromise, and is not likely to significantly negatively affect area businesses and residents. These proposed changes would also make it safer and more pleasant for customers to travel to area businesses by bike or on foot, which research suggests will lead to an increase of local business patronage.

We feel that it is also appropriate at this time, to extend the proposed bike lanes North to connect to Pierce Butler Route, despite this section not being included in the Mill & Overlay project. This would connect several important bike routes, including the pedestrian bridge over the rail yard, the

Charles Avenue Bikeway, and Pierce Butler Route, which serves as the most direct connection for residents biking to and from Minneapolis from the neighborhood.

In recognizing that extending the bike lanes North of Minnehaha to Pierce Butler Route would require removal of parking from both sides of the street, we further offer these suggestions to help mitigate potential negative consequences of parking removal:

- 1) That the City and Public Works department work with the households on Hamline that lack any off-street parking in this area to explore other possible solutions, and that they fund reasonable infrastructure costs so as not to further burden the homeowners.
- 2) That additional handicap permitted parking be considered for the North side of Englewood just East of Hamline for Hamline Hi-Rise residents, and that the Public Housing Authority work with the Public Works Department and Hi-Rise residents to improve the utility of the South-facing entrance to the Hi-Rise. We also encourage PHA to consider signing several spots in the off-street lot for caregiver and visitor use.
- 3) That relevant agencies explore the feasibility and benefit of moving the Metro Transit bus stop currently located at the Northeast corner of Minnehaha and Hamline to the Northwest corner to open parking capacity for businesses at that intersection.
- 4) That the City assist businesses around the intersection of Hamline and Thomas to explore ways to share off-street parking near that intersection.

HMC Transportation Committee members and staff have worked extensively to gather feedback from the community regarding this project. A survey was developed and distributed both online and in hardcopy formats, eliciting more than 200 responses—a large majority being from Hamline Midway residents. In-person outreach was also conducted all along the project corridor and throughout the neighborhood, gathering extensive feedback from businesses and residents. Multiple in-person meetings were held with representatives from the Hamline Hi-Rise public housing complex at 777 Hamline Avenue and an additional public meeting was also organized by HMC with support from Saint Paul Public Works in April. Committee members also collected independent bicycle and pedestrian count information, as well as additional parking data over the course of several months.

In considering the feedback and data gathered through this extensive outreach process, we recognize that varying opinions exist within the community about this proposal, but it is clear that community support for the entire project significantly outweighs opposition. We ask that Saint Paul City Council and Public Works staff consider the greatest utility and safety for the greatest number of people in making their final decisions regarding the proposal for bike lanes on Hamline Avenue, both from University Avenue to Minnehaha Avenue, as well as from Minnehaha Avenue to Pierce Butler Route.

Thank you for your consideration of this important project and for your continued work to make Saint Paul neighborhoods vibrant communities with a range of safe transportation options.

Subject: Hamline Ave resurfacing project

As a long-term resident at the corner of Lafond and Hamline, I would like to request that either:

1) This project be modified to just be a repaying: no signage, parking, or other changes.

or

2) This project be deferred until the bike plan be reviewed to determine whether Hamline Ave is the appropriate path.

In support of option 1: since current proposal interferes with long-term usage (i.e., parking) with no real benefit (the proposed bike path isn't connected at either end to anything, nor is there a reasonable hope that the south end ever will be), there is no good reason to alter parking at this point. If a full path solution is ever developed (see next paragraph), it can be implement in the future with no more effort than doing so now. In other words, the current plan spends extra money now and makes people miserable, but has no benefit.

In the long term, the neighborhood needs a viably way to move bicycles and people along Snelling Ave between Hamline University and the Fairgrounds: using the current sidewalks is hazardous due to the on/off ramps. Once Snelling becomes a usable path, the bicycle path can then continue down Pascal Ave - which is currently a designated bike path, is appropriately marked, and is continuous from Pierce Butler to Marshall Ave. That is a much more appropriate North/South bike path than Hamline and it requires no disruption of existing uses.

In support of option 2: I drive this road multiple times every day. It is in reasonable shape and does not need resurfacing at this time. As a benefit of retaining the current condition, it avoids becoming an even more desirable alternate route for Snelling Ave traffic.

Mr. Luke Hanson

I was very disappointed by the City Council's decision last night to delay the installation of bicycle lanes on Hamline Avenue, north of Minnehaha.

This decision to postpone the discussion and ultimately hope for funding next year to widen the lanes (to accommodate both parking and bike lanes) demonstrates their lack of concern for bicyclist and pedestrian safety in my neighborhood. It also makes me question whether the City Council will continue to support the already approved city wide bike plan. It's my understanding that this approved bike plan had included Hamline avenue bike lanes all the way to Pierce Butler; And that when Public Works opportunities like this presented themselves, the plan is intended to be applied.

It is frustrating to see the ongoing discussion about the inclusion of bike lanes along Hamline, especially seeing that the public comment period and discussions to approve the bike plan have already taken place. I understood that the city-wide bike plan was in the implementation phase.

The reality is, **there is, and will continue to be** many students and neighborhood residents biking along this route. Regardless of whether the bike lanes are added or not, the children will be using this route as their primary route to the nearby schools (Friends, TRUTH Academy, and Great River). Their decision to defer the lanes is clearly putting the children and community at risk.

This decision seems to be influenced by a small number of very vocal residents who feel slighted because the planned bike lanes (from the approved city bike plan) were to be added this Fall. How can this small, vocal minority influence the decision making of the City Council and ultimately impact the safety of the greater community? As I testified last night, there are frequently 50 children per day commuting by bike to Great River School. Without a safe route for the kids and drivers to travel predictably, everybody's safety is being compromised. As my neighbor Rachel also testified last night, many of these kids will frequently choose to travel on the sidewalk, thinking it is safer. Not having clearly designated lanes on these regular routes leads to unpredictable behavior by the young cyclists, increasing the risk of crashes between cars and kids.

It's obvious that many conversations have taken place over the past several week with this vocal minority to help them make this decision. I would like to be included in future conversations prior to the September 14th meeting. I believe if they approve the recommendation to postpone the lanes until the street is widened, the lanes will likely not happen since no funding is currently available for such a project.

I would hope the Council will make **the safety of our neighborhood a priority** and move forward with stripping the bike lanes on Hamline between Minnehaha and Pierce Butler Route this Fall. I look forward to hearing from you and being included on any further discussions prior to the September 14th meeting.



Hello Russ, Paul, and Luke -

I'm writing in regards to the proposed Hamline Ave Mill and Overlay with bike / ped improvements. The Hamline Midway Transportation committee, of which I'm a member, has started working with the City on outreach and design for this project.

I spoke to my neighbor, Zaraawar Misty, who owns 1346 and 1342 Van Buren. He is also the owner and operator of Dreamland Art Theater at 677 Hamline Ave.

Overall he is supportive of bike and ped improvements but he has some concerns about how removing parking might affect his parking variance. Dreamland Arts was granted a large variance when it opened 10 years ago because it lacks a parking lot and relies on the Hamline Ave parking for its patrons.

I told him I would help track down this issue to make sure adding bike lanes to Hamline and removing one side of parking would not impact his ability to continue running this great theater. He and his wife Leslye Orr are a great asset to the neighborhood, and have taken great care not to disrupt the neighbors. They encourage their patrons to park on Hamline and not in front of homes on side streets, as well as limiting late night noise. Living next door to the theater for 5 years, I have zero complaints and definitely am invested in seeing this business continue in our neighborhood.

Zaraawar did not express direct opinion on which side of Hamline would retain parking if bike lanes do go in, but he did have concern about having space to pick up and drop off patrons directly in front of the theater for those with limited mobility. Many people coming to the theater are using Metro Mobility and we need to be aware of this loading issue on this block. Perhaps a small passenger loading zone can be added to the plans.

We reviewed the parking study quickly during one of our monthly meetings, so I don't remember exactly what the counts were for the 600 block of Hamline near the theater. Zarawaar also asked if counts captured a night with a show at the theater. If they did not, I would recommend the city recount that block on a night where there is an event at the theater. May is a slow month for them while taking some personal vacation, but June and July have many scheduled evenings. Full schedule will be available soon at http://www.dreamlandarts.com/shows/

Both he and his wife are busy next Wednesday and can't attend the open house at Galtier. They hope to attend future events for this project.

Hi All,

I apologize in advance for the lengthy email.

Just wanted to update you about a meeting I had today at the Hi-Rise regarding the Hamline Ave project. In attendance were: Jim Lovold (president of hi-rise resident council, Margaret Gilbert (secretary for hi-rise resident council), Tom Fitzpatrick (ED of HM Elders), Kathy Carlson (HM Edlers board member), Jen Jackson (St. Paul Public Housing Agency, Human Services Coordinator), Kaohnou Yang (PHA Assistant Resident Services Manager), and myself.

We had a good discussion about the project and proposed improvements, and everyone left with a better understanding of how the proposed improvements could make the street safer for all road users. The Hi-rise residents are concerned about losing parking on the west side of Hamline, which is most used by caregivers coming to the building and other visitors for residents. The lot is permit parking only and only residents are given permits. Also, when the lot is full, some residents do occasionally park on Hamline. It sounds like some residents do park on Hamline even when the lot is not full, because it is actually closer to the front door than the spots towards the back of the lot. They are concerned about making their care providers walk any extra distance because they are often carrying heavy equipment or bags.

I talked about different ways they could make sure their voice was heard, and they plan on passing a letter at their next council meeting advocating for advisory bike lanes (more below). We also flyered the whole building, and all residents were sent the mailing from public works. We also discussed the option of collecting signatures for a petition, but they decided that may not be as successful or impactful as a motion from the resident council. I also left a stack of surveys for them to fill out and return to us.

Potential Compromise

In an effort to seek potential compromises, I raised the idea of an advisory bike lane on the west side of Hamline between Englewood and the entrance to the parking lot or potentially up to Hewitt as a way to maintain limited parking for visitors and caregivers, when it is needed. I have no idea if this is a realistic option or not, and was very clear about that fact, but said I would look into it. They latched on to the idea, and are now planning to pursue that solution, rather than oppose the project outright.

Next Steps

I encouraged them to work on collecting their own parking data on usage of the lot and parking on Hamline, and explained that we as a committee were already helping gather some of that info. We further discussed the possibility of developing a survey to figure out how often residents have visitors from caregivers, family, etc, how they got their, and where they parked. I will continue to work with Jim on this and to organize a system for

tracking parking demand and capacity. The folks from the PHA are going to send me numbers for parking spots available, and the number of permits currently held by residents.

Jim and Margaret will both attend the open house next week and will work on getting more residents there, as well. Luke Hanson and I will attend the next Hi-Rise resident council meeting on June 7 at 1:30pm to discuss the project more and gather feedback. Jim will attend our next Transportation Committee meeting on June 6, as well.

I think we should entertain the possibility of an advisory bike lane, as it seems to be a good solution that could keep at least most people happy.

Regarding the resurfacing between University and Minnehaha, there are two sets of old street-car tracks on the north bound side of Hamline between Thomas and Minnehaha. After the resurfacing gets old, the pavement starts to break up above the old rails and creates groves and potholes. Removing these old rails prior to resurfacing should make it last longer.

In regard to the proposed idea to remove parking on both sides of Hamline to have bike lanes, I offer the following comments and opinions :

There are two homeowners I know of who do not have off street parking, they are on the east side of Hamline between Englewood and Hubbard, there are no alleys in these blocks.

There was a neighborhood meeting quite a few years ago, about putting bike lanes on Hamline. The people from the city measured the street before the meeting and said it wasn't wide enough. I also remember reading something a few years ago about Syndicate becoming a North-South bike lane to Pierce Butler. What happened to that idea?

My wife and I bought this home in 1973, (776 N. Hamline Ave.), it is on the S. E. corner of Hamline and Seminary. The Hamline high rise is directly across the street, (777 Hamline). When the Hamline high rise was in the planning stages in the mid-seventies, parking was a big concern among neighboring homeowners attending the meetings. Over the last 10 – 12 years there has been an increasing number of vehicles parking on both sides of Hamline near the building entrance. Some of these vehicles are care-givers that work at the high rise and some are visitors or relatives. These drivers always park as close as they can to the south end of the high rise driveway and in front of our house.

My neighbors and I believe there are some people living with a tenant at the high rise illegally --- they always park on the street --- not in the lot. These "Illegals " have no regard for snow emergency or street cleaning parking policies, and they never get towed! Given that attitude --- if they park on Seminary near our driveway and don't move their vehicles for a snow emergency, the wind row from the snow plow winds up seven feet into the street, away the front of our driveway, (this has happened) .

There is a rental property on the N. E corner of Seminary and Hamline that has 4 vehicles, there is another rental two doors south of us, that has 4 and sometimes 5 vehicles. Last week I counted 18 vehicles on Hamline between Englewood and Hubbard, 10 on the west side and 8 on the east side. The 10 on the west side were likely for the high rise and the 8 on the east side were likely from the two rental properties mentioned above.

Eliminating the parking on Hamline between Minnehaha and Pierce Butler will push these vehicles onto Seminary east of Hamline. Several of our neighbors on Seminary park one of their vehicles in front of their home. I think the competition for parking between homeowners and those forced off Hamline, because of a bike path, could get ugly.

Dear Mr. Hanson and Public Works officials,

As a parent of a student from Great River School and/or a resident of Hamline Midway neighborhood, I support installation of bike lanes and removal of parking along Hamline Avenue from University Avenue to Pierce Butler. Limiting/removing parking along Hamline Avenue and installing dedicated bike lanes will allow students at Great River, TRUTH Preparatory Academy, The Friends School, Sejong Academy, LEAP, and Galtier a safer route to school by bike.

In a recent article, Bryan Jones, of Alta Planning + Design called for true leadership and vision in transportation projects focused on doing the right things including sustainability from a financial prosperity (for individuals and agencies), ecological, and public health and safety perspective. Adding bike lanes and removing parking along Hamline Avenue does all of those things. Striping lanes from University to Pierce Butler is an efficient use of resources and exhibits good stewardship. Adding the lanes provides cyclists a safer way to take ecologically sound transportation to and from work or school, increasing public health through exercise. The planned bike route also aligns with the Mayor's 8 to 80 initiative.

Please note that the bike lanes will be especially helpful for Great River students. An informal survey of 262 students and teachers this past April revealed that 61 of them routinely use Hamline Avenue for commuting. Furthermore, all 100 7th and 8th grade students take an annual bike trip at the end of the school year for several days. In preparation for the trip, students take group rides weekly beginning in April each year.

Reuben and Luke - I thought some more about the Hamline segment north of Minnehaha and may have a solution....I know you heard at last week's open house that one or several homes do not have off-street parking on their properties and thus are highly opposed to the concept of bike lanes in this segment. I thought of a way to maintain parking on one side of Hamline within the 36-feet wide street surface between the curbs:

I believe I heard there are 10' lanes with 7' for parking on Minnehaha Ave now, so this would not be unprecedented, and I do believe I've seen other instances (Prior Ave perhaps) where one side has a bike lane and the other a bike shoulder. Do you think this configuration may be possible? I know this may not be the best long term solution, but seems like something that could be done in the short term.

Hi Luke - thanks for your response....so, then I gather that Hamline has gutter pans for this segment? How wide are they? It seems to me that your example of Fairview for 4-foot shoulders has segments that are not 4' wide, especially closer to Ford Pkwy & St Kate's, and are still designated as bike shoulders or "bike route", and Fairview has much higher ADT than Hamline at that location. I need to go back and take a closer look, but also I would contend that if you could achieve at least 3-feet of designated pavement adjacent to a 12" gutter pan, that would provide a significant improvement to the biking experience and would be preferred by most over "sharrows" as an alternative.

I oppose putting bike lanes on Hamline Avenue, especially the part north of Minnehaha Avenue, because loss of all on-street parking is not acceptable for people who live, work, and serve the Hamline High Rise. About 10 years ago, I was involved with exploring putting bike lanes there, but upon discovering that all parking would be lost and strong opposition from residents of the High Rise, I took their suggestion and worked to get the shared bicycle route one block west on Albert Street. More recently, the Griggs Avenue Bikeway was built at a cost of over a half million dollars. This bikeway runs parallel to and is just two blocks east of Hamline Avenue. The bikeway designation doesn't go north of Minnehaha Avenue, but it would be relatively inexpensive to extend the Griggs Bikeway north to Hewitt Avenue, then riders could travel two blocks east to Hamline and then the one block north to get to Pierce Butler. In addition, a shared bike route is in place on Pascal Street, which is parallel to Hamline and just two blocks west. Both the Pascal and Griggs Bike Routes have signalized crossings at University Avenue and have bridges over I-94. Since we already have two high quality north/south bike routes within two blocks of Hamline Avenue, I see no reason to put bike lanes on Hamline at this time. In the future, if bike lanes are to be added to Hamline Avenue north of Minnehaha, funding should be provided to widen the boulevards by two feet on both sides of the street, allowing parking to be retained on one side of Hamline. This is a more equitable solution, given the high number of seniors living in the high rise whose caregivers and families need close and convenient access and parking. Just about all bicyclists are able-bodied people, and riding an additional one or two blocks does not take much effort, compared with handicapped people. Do not put bike lanes on Hamline north of Minnehaha unless parking is preserved on at least one side of the street.

Mr. Luke Hanson,

Regarding the resurfacing between University and Minnehaha, there are two sets of old street-car tracks on the north bound side of Hamline between Thomas and Minnehaha. After the resurfacing gets old, the pavement starts to break up above the old rails and creates groves and potholes. Removing these old rails prior to resurfacing should make it last longer.

In regard to the proposed idea to remove parking on both sides of Hamline to have bike lanes, I offer the following comments and opinions :

There are two homeowners I know of who do not have off street parking, they are on the east side of Hamline between Englewood and Hubbard, there are no alleys in these blocks.

There was a neighborhood meeting quite a few years ago, about putting bike lanes on Hamline. The people from the city measured the street before the meeting and said it wasn't wide enough. I also remember reading something a few years ago about Syndicate becoming a North-South bike lane to Pierce Butler. What happened to that idea?

My wife and I bought this home in 1973, (776 N. Hamline Ave.), it is on the S. E. corner of Hamline and Seminary. The Hamline high rise is directly across the street, (777 Hamline). When the Hamline high rise was in the planning stages in the mid-seventies, parking was a big concern among neighboring homeowners attending the meetings. Over the last 10 - 12 years there has been an increasing number of vehicles parking on both sides of Hamline near the building entrance. Some of these vehicles are care-givers that work at the high rise and some are visitors or relatives. These drivers always park as close as they can to the south end of the high rise driveway and in front of our house.

My neighbors and I believe there are some people living with a tenant at the high rise illegally — they always park on the street — not in the lot. These "Illegals " have no regard for snow emergency or street cleaning parking policies, and they never get towed! Given that attitude — if they park on Seminary near our driveway and don't move their vehicles for a snow emergency, the wind row from the snow plow winds up seven feet into the street, away the front of our driveway, (this has happened).

There is a rental property on the N. E corner of Seminary and Hamline that has 4 vehicles, there is another rental two doors south of us, that has 4 and sometimes 5 vehicles. Last week I counted 18 vehicles on Hamline between Englewood and Hubbard, 10 on the west side and 8 on the east side. The 10 on the west side were likely for the high rise and the 8 on the east side were likely from the two rental properties mentioned above.

Eliminating the parking on Hamline between Minnehaha and Pierce Butler will push these vehicles onto Seminary east of Hamline. Several of our neighbors on Seminary park one of their vehicles in front of their home. I think the competition for parking between homeowners and those forced off Hamline, because of a bike path, could get ugly.







Q3 How often do you or members of your family use the section of Hamline Ave. between University Ave. and Pierce Butler Route?






Q5 What are your most common destinations when traveling on or crossing Hamline Ave.? (Check all that Apply)


Q6 How would you rank your overall sense of safety on Hamline Ave.?









HAMLINE AVENUE Open House

The City of Saint Paul is hosting an open house to share information and take input on the proposal for bike lanes on Hamline Avenue from University to Minnehaha Avenue.

The open house is Thursday, May 26, from 6:00 PM to 7:30 PM at the Sejong Academy Auditorium (1330 Blair Avenue W, Saint Paul, MN, 55104). Visitors may enter through the east door of Blair Avenue, and an ADA accessible entrance is located from the parking lot with elevator access to the auditorium.

What is the Proposal?

The City is planning a street resurfacing on Hamline Ave between University Ave and Minnehaha Ave in 2016. The Bicycle Plan recommends bike lanes on Hamline within the project corridor. Implementing bicycle lanes with the street resurfacing is proposed.

Changes to On-Street Parking

To add bike lanes, some on-street parking would be removed on Hamline. Between University Avenue and Minnehaha Avenue, on-street parking would be removed on one side of the street.

Minnehaha to Pierce Butler

The City is also exploring extending bicycle lanes north between Minnehaha and Pierce Butler. Hamline narrows north of Minnehaha, and installing bike lanes would require parking removal on both sides of the street. Since this section of Hamline is outside of the area scheduled for resurfacing, the City is looking to take input on whether or not bike facilities should be extended north of Minnehaha in 2016.

At the Open House

- Preliminary layouts and concepts will be shared.
- City of Saint Paul staff will be available to answer questions and address concerns about the proposed plan.
- Comment forms will be provided to collect public input on the proposed plan.
- There will be no formal presentation the meeting is intended as an opportunity for the community to review the project and offer feedback that will inform the final design.

Project Details:

Saint Paul Public Works is planning to resurface Hamline Avenue between University Avenue and Minnehaha Avenue in 2016. Adding bike lanes to Hamline Avenue between University Avenue and Minnehaha Avenue during the street resurfacing is proposed. Bike lanes are also being proposed on Hamline Avenue north of the street resurfacing between Minnehaha Avenue and Pierce Butler Route.

University to Minnehaha:

To accommodate the installation of bike lanes, parking removal is proposed for the east side of Hamline Avenue between Sherburne Avenue and Minnehaha Avenue, except for the northern half of the block between Van Buren Avenue and Minnehaha Avenue. Parking removal is also proposed for the west side of Hamline Avenue between Van Buren Avenue and Minnehaha Avenue. New time-limited parking capacity (1-hour parking) is being proposed on the south side of Thomas Avenue east of Hamline.

Minnehaha to Pierce Butler Route:

To accommodate the installation of bike lanes on Hamline Avenue north of Minnehaha Avenue, parking removal is proposed for both the east and west sides of Hamline Avenue between Minnehaha Avenue and Pierce Butler Route.




