Capital Improvement Budget Process Redesign

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CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT BUDGET

- How the City funds infrastructure
- o \$30-70 million annually

Funding decisions on a two-year cycle

• Primarily funds projects in:

- o Parks
- o PED
- Public Works
- o Libraries
- o Public Safety



CIB PROCESS REDESIGN CURRENT PROCESS

Current CIB Process	Managed by OFS Staff	
October - January	Project proposals prepared and submitted	
January – March	City Staff reviews proposals	
March – May	Task Forces: Hear proposals, rank projects and inform CIB Committee	
May – June	CIB Committee makes recommendations to Mayor	
June – September	Mayor proposes funding decisions	
September - December	Council finalizes and adopts budget	

- 30+ year old process
- Complicated
- Time and Labor Intensive
- Highly Competitive

Redesigning process to focus more strongly on:

- Equity and Inclusion
- Strategic Investments
- Fiscal Responsibility

PROJECT GOALS

EQUITY AND INCLUSION

- Maintain conversation between the residents of Saint Paul and the City on capital investments.
- Select investments using an **equity lens**.

STRATEGIC INVESTMENTS

- Strategically align CIB projects to reviewed City plans, including Parks' asset management strategy, PED Comp Plan, and Public Works' 5-year plan.
- Include informed and strategic community engagement.

FISCAL RESPONSIBILITY

- Use facilities condition data to create prioritized lists of capital investments.
- Proactively maintain existing infrastructure.

WHY THIS YEAR?

• Unique opportunity in 2018-2019

- Most funding previously committed to 2 projects:
 - o Scheffer Rec Center
 - o Fire Station 20 projects

$\circ~$ What does this mean for the 2018-2019 cycle?

- No new outside proposals considered for 2018-2019
- Focus on maintaining existing infrastructure
- We will use this break to refresh the CIB process for future cycles
- New process will roll out in 2018 to make decisions for 2020-2021 budget cycle

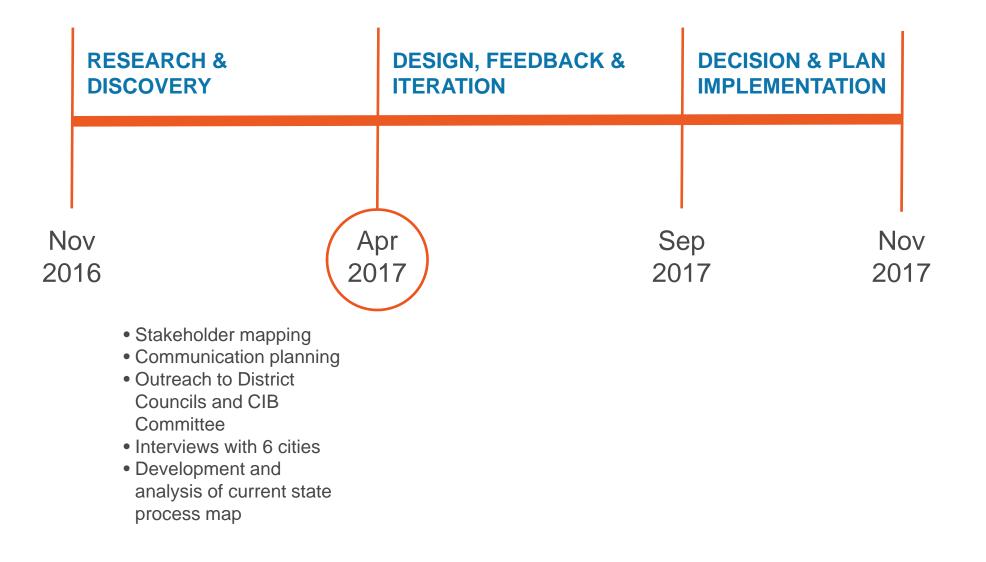

WHAT WE HAVE LEARNED THUS FAR

- o Starting from a position of strength
 - Saint Paul's current approach rates high for community engagement relative to many other cities
 - Example of government sharing power with residents by giving them ability to recommend budget decisions to Mayor
 - Parks and Public Works are nationally accredited organizations
 - o City's AAA Bond rating

WHAT WE HAVE LEARNED THUS FAR

- However, there are challenges:
 - o Submission forms
 - Volume of submissions
 - E.g. Parks Design team spends 500-600 hours of staff time for each CIB cycle
 - Task force process
 - Equitable representation on committee and task forces
 - Communication between elected officials and CIB volunteers

The process redesign aims to keep what works while improving the pain points.
