Spring is here: 2017 construction season underway

Here we go again! Spring is here and the trees and grass are getting green. That must mean one thing here at SPRWS; construction season is here!

We have many projects that are just beginning and some that continue to progress. Major improvements are on the way at the treatment plant and to the West Saint Paul pumping station. Most of the major electrical components at the treatment plant are being updated or replaced and we are adding an on-site emergency generator at the WSP pumping station. Kou Vang, civil engineer IV, will be overseeing these two important projects in addition to many others in production.

In distribution, this time of year always brings a lot of activity as we are bringing on new and returning seasonal staff and all the street reconstruction projects are kicking off. This year is no exception. Large projects this year include replacement of the water main in Ford Parkway down in Highland Park, the replacement of more than 100 lead water services on Smith Avenue south of downtown St. Paul and on the west side, and other water main replacements in St. Paul street reconstruction areas in addition to work in Maplewood, West Saint Paul and Mendota Heights. All totaled, we are planning more than 8 miles of water main replacement this season.

I know that all this work and the effort undertaken to support it is the result of many hours of preparation, construction, inspection, and restoration activities. All this work is critical to our continued success and I want to make sure that everyone knows that we recognize and appreciate the commitment you all show to SPRWS. I look forward to a productive and safe 2017 construction season!

Recarb chamber gets cleaning

In the recarbonation chamber, fluoride and carbon dioxide are added. The carbon dioxide is used to adust the pH of the water to optimize corrosion control in the distribution system. It is the only place in the plant that does not have a redundant system in place and can not be out of service for more than several hours. Staff moved quickly to remove as much lime build up as possible before putting it back into service the same day.
