I am making another plea to NOT take control of my trash collection service contract. I have submitted input previously online as well as to my council rep president Stark.

Government is best that governs least. The role of government is not to install and run a collective program in place of a private market service,

even if the majority wants it. The role of government is to protect the minority from the majority. Without it we have mob rule.

Last week at the public hearing I witnessed around 25 people who you claim are in the minority of wanting to be left alone to choose in our open haul system, vs. about 15 who represent your supposed majority that demand the city pick the winners and losers in your closed haul proposal.

The environmental grant given to Macalester to create an environmental study that supports your consolidation is loaded with bias, spin, and assumption to serve YOUR interest to do this. The study claims benefits will result in cost, energy, and efficiency. Untrue. The truth can be found in the survey showing the people are SPLIT on Yes or No to city organized collection, with half preferring individual choice, customer service, and small local business support. (MGCC OTC Survey of 2015 with 1951 respondents, published 12/14/15 in MinnPost.)

The <u>costs facts</u> are that the cost will go up. The free market always provides the best solutions, options, innovations, and prices when left alone. The only way the City can pull this off is to charge more and mandate it, eliminating the Opt-Out (which we were baited into believing was part of the negotiation all along). Your proposed system is so great you must force it on us. The City tried this in the late 70's/early 80's and couldn't compete with the small local providers, but sought to try again in '87, '98, and '09 before wising up.

You aren't even hiding the increased costs OUT OF THE GATE over the current rates. I will get the same service I get now at a higher price, you will just tell me who my company is going to be. Your admin fee of \$52 a year per household is \$52 more than I pay now to do it myself. At estimated 100,000 households that comes to \$5,200,000 each year, for YOU to sign the contracts to the 15 private haulers. (Where do I apply to be the one doing that?)

The <u>efficiency facts</u> are that our haulers have each already limited and consolidated their geographical territories because of costs and efficiencies. They don't send one truck to one alley to pick up one can and then sprint across town. You are also creating a barrier to entry for someone who wants to create this small business. In fact you will be putting some of them out of business.

The <u>environmental facts</u> are that the City run recycling program change has added two new alley truck runs per week, since they only know how to collect from one side of the truck apparently (that is when they feel I've correctly oriented and spaced my container to be worthy of pickup). That wear and tear on alleys argument is unproven spin. I've seen no problems and no maintenance in my 18 years here.

The <u>energy facts</u> are that you are diverting time, energy, and money from positive and productive agenda items like housing affordability, rec center and pathway neglect, and policing accountability.

And if you want to shift the reasons for the need to do this to an illegal dumping concern, you will never eliminate that and you are already charging that to residents anyways. I've gotten charged (excessively) for single items that people have dumped and that you have picked up at times unbeknownst to me. I accept that. The General Fund also has a budget for litter pick up, which is what this boils down to. Mr. Goldstein had a great idea, why don't

you set up a free trash dump on some piece of land you own, for people who can't afford to pay Twin City Refuse or Veolia or whomever. Ask for donations like they do at Como Park but assess any outstanding balances like street maintenance. That idea can't possible exceed \$5,200,000 per year. Let's try it and reevaluate in 6 months.

Last, you are putting us at risk from new problems that will emerge as they always do, such as an inevitable union of trash collectors ability to withhold service for more money, which has occurred in places like paris and new york, where trash piled up until they got their demands met. Right now I can fire and hire for doing a poor job or doing a good job. Don't take away my service authority and ability. Please don't do this.

I saw the price structure and it has confirmed for me that I will be paying at least \$100.00 more per year for my trash collection under the proposed plan. Cost is the biggest reason I'm so against this plan. When I negotiate my collection I often get 2 months of service for free and my monthly cost is lower than the amounts released in the payment structure. This is not a good deal for St. Paul residents. I also don't pay myself \$52.00/year for negotiating. I get to keep all of my savings. The city's payment structure has me over-paying for collection services, paying for services I don't need and won't use (bulk items and Christmas tree pick-up). To top that off, it has me paying the city to do a poor job negotiating my bill for me.

Council Member Brendmoen,

It was good to see you Wednesday night. It's hard to comprehend that it has been almost a year since the council met to start the process to organize trash collection in St. Paul. I wanted to weigh in on the coordinated collection agreement. As you know, I have been against Organized Collection from the beginning, I made that clear in our meetings. I also think that the time for that conversation ended on July 21, 2016 when the council passed the resolution to begin the OC process.

The last 10 months of negotiations have been grueling. Despite what the Waste Management attorney said about city staff, I feel the process was well managed. There were more than a

few times when I would have liked to throw Kris and Ann out the window, but I know there were times they felt the same about me. That's how negotiating goes. The agreement represents multiple compromises on both sides, and was signed by all fifteen haulers. I believe it is a solid program that will serve the vast majority of St. Paul residents well.

The issue of rates was brought up with a comparison to Maplewood. Maplewood was taken away from the independents on a low ball bid by a national company (the lowest rate in the state). The same company has the contract for North St. Paul and charges 76% HIGHER for their 35 gallon cart than they do in Maplewood. For a real comparison, North St. Paul has bulkie collection included in their program. Their 35 gallon cart rate with taxes and bulkies is \$22.48 for 2017. Our proposal is actually for a 2019 rate so adjust NSP by 2.5% a year for CPI and their 2019 rate would be \$23.62. Our hauler proposal for a 35 gallon cart is \$23.77. For \$.15/month we are going to carrying bad debt for up to a year, provide walk up service to handicapped residents, take Holiday Trees for free, provide a free cart size change every year, and do the billing. Keep in mind NSP doesn't have a Frog Town or a North End or a Payne/Phalen area like St. Paul and its mostly street pick up which is conducive to fully automated collection. The city spent \$300K on consultants who know the industry and the market. I must assume they approve of the agreement.

I hope the council approves the resolution so that we can begin the ominous task of implementing the program.

I have greatly appreciated your vote to authorize the process of organizing trash hauling in St Paul and I am incredibly grateful to City staff for their efforts on our behalf to make that happen. I would like to express my thoughts regarding the proposed agreement for organized trash collection in St Paul. I served as a member of the Macalester Groveland Community Council for six years. During that time I met with many of you or your representatives to address the Community Councils effort to study the current system and propose another possibility. I also facilitated the community conversations held by the Community Council which included conversations with hundreds of people as well as two meetings with the haulers. And I interviewed representatives of other cities who have organized systems. I was part of a team of volunteers who poured through our survey data and had input on the writing the final report. So many of my thoughts are based on those findings.

I am strongly in favor of organized trash collection and the proposed plan accomplishes many of the things that I believe will lead to a successful change to the current system.

It includes the removal of several bulky items each year from residences which hopefully will lead to less illegal dumping. It sets up a good system to handle customer service and billing throughout the City. There should be greatly reduced truck traffic - meaning less air pollution, less use of fossil fuels and less wear and tear on City streets and alleys. Rates will be uniform throughout the City taking away the need to bargain for the best rate from various haulers, which I heard often from fellow citizens was confusing and time consuming. And the wage standards are admirable as well, allowing workers a good wage for difficult work.

One of the things I heard most often from my fellow residents is not truly addressed in the new proposal and that is differential pricing that rewards those who recycle, compost and just simply reduce waste. A difference of \$7.15 per month between a 32 gallon container and one three times its' size does not encourage residents to reduce and recycle more. Those who have shared service in the past will no longer have that option. The option of bi-weekly service is available for only \$10 less a month than a behemoth cart of 95 gallons! I hate to say it, but that is truly disappointing and almost laughable. I

understand that the haulers have no incentive to induce customers to reduce, but I truly believed the City saw that as a priority. As I listened to those who spoke against the proposed plan at Wednesday's City Council meeting, I heard many speak of exactly this issue. For those who have been responsible; taken the time to recycle, compost and shop differently, those who have worked hard to reduce and/or live on a fixed budget these are not the prices they were hoping for. It appears to penalize them instead of reward them for their efforts.

I still strongly support an organized system. If this is indeed the seventh and final offer from the haulers, I hope that something will be built in to sharply reduce the rate of the smaller and bi-weekly service containers each year throughout the contract. I appreciate your willingness to read and consider my thoughts.

I'd again like to express my feelings regarding the city's trash collection issues. First of all, I'm glad the council did not rubber stamp the plan that was presented to them this past week.

I've shared my trash bill and my thoughts on the issue with the group that has been working on this plan for nearly a year now, and find them very "governmental" to deal with. All I ever get back in responses seems more to me like what "they" want, what they say the "majority" wants, what "they" know is good for me, without any names or numbers to back up what they are saying.

It seems to me they had their minds made up from day 1 what they wanted, and they've spent a year trying to make the facts and numbers fit their agenda. Whoever these folks may be, they certainly do nothing for my faith in government.

I worked in state government for 33-plus years, so I know how government tends to operate. And I know they tend to like to spend money fixing problems that really don't need fixing, while putting off dealing with real problems that could really impact our quality of life here, but are also very difficult to deal with.

I am retired, have owned my home in St. Paul for over 20 years now, and am now on a fixed income. I often have to make choices between what I want and what I need, when it comes to budgeting, and I'm okay with that.

What I don't like is seeing areas of spending where I have a choice dwindling. Federal, state, county and city taxes and fees continue to rise faster than my income does.

I can make budgeting choices on my phone and cell phone service, cable TV and internet service. If my insurance rates go up, I can shop around for a better deal, as I can with food, clothing, entertainment, and so on.

The "report" says most home owners will save money with the proposed plan, and most will see the same or better service.

Well, I must be in the minority. I currently pay under \$58 every 3 months for weekly trash pickup, and after shopping around for several years, I've been very pleased with the service I get from Highland for many years now.

Even if I go to bi-weekly pickup (poorer service), I'll still be paying more each month, plus the annual "administrative" fee. And I may well end up with a trash service that I've tried in the past and been very dissatisfied with.

I find it difficult to believe that a professional negotiating a rate for the entire city cannot come up with a rate as low as I have, all on my own. But then I shake my head, tell myself it's the government, and that pretty well explains it these days.

And yes, I've heard the stuff about reducing truck traffic, illegal dumping, air pollution, etc. and I don't believe the change will amount to anything worthwhile.

Heck, with the old recycling program, the recycling truck would come down our street once a week. With the "new improved" recycling program, the truck goes by twice a week, since it's only designed to pick up from one side.

Dear Council Members.

I've already been in contact with my Council Member; now I'm reaching out to all of you as a group.

I have long supported the idea of Organized Trash Collection (OTC) in St. Paul, but that was because we low-income homeowners were assured that:

- 1) the fees would not grossly exceed what we currently pay,
- 2) we could continue sharing a can with a neighbor (for us 1-person households and hyper recyclers and composters), and
- 3) we could opt-out of the system if it did not meet our needs, and take our trash to a dump or other facility.

None of that seems to be in the City's current proposal.

I've been a St. Paul homeowner for 18 years. For at least half that time, my next-door neighbor and I (both living alone, both with disabilities) have shared a trash can. We each pay about \$140 a year for this weekly service. On your proposed system, we'd each pay over \$300 a year. That is just not doable on Social Security, as I'm sure many of St. Paul's retired homeowners will also tell you. And if we can't pay, the cost then...goes on our taxes? And if we can't pay our taxes, we lose our homes, don't we? We want an affordable and effective trash hauling system; not to become homeless.

Please consider:

- 1. Residents who can provide evidence of their long-standing, minimal (yet responsible) use of hauling services should be allowed to share cans or opt out of the system.
- 2. Most homeowners will not have 3 large items to dispose of each year. I haven't had any in 18 years. I think that service is more suitable for the rental properties whose tenants dump an astonishing amount of their belongings in our alleys and on our properties as they're moving out. The rest of us shouldn't have to subsidize that in OTC any more than we should have to pay to have it removed from our property. Maybe it's better to have a voucher or additional fee for those with large items, rather than all of us shouldering that.
- 3. Christmas tree recycling is a perk only for those with a modicum of affluence and a particular religious persuasion. The rest of us shouldn't have to subsidize that either. Instead, open the

Ramsey County Compost Sites a few weekends in January to allow folks to bring in their trees. Clearly, if people are able to get trees into their homes, they can take them out and compost them.

4. It's nice that OTC drivers are guaranteed a minimum wage of \$20/hr, but it's also a slap in the face to the many residents (paying for OTC) who don't earn that much.

Please re-examine the options and costs for OTC, and see if we can't create a program that really works for everyone.

Subject: Organized trash hauling feedback.

I will not be able to attend the upcoming meeting regarding organized trash pickup, so I wanted to share my thoughts.

I have been incredibly happy with my trash hauler (Petes) since I bought my house 4 years ago. They were recommended by a neighbor, and compared to a half dozen other haulers; they had a better price (by about \$120/yr) and a more convenient collection day than others. Recently the hauler increased prices and changed the collection day, so I decided to look for a new hauler, after another round of research, I found that they still provided better service than their competitors. The fact that I could look for another provider and weigh my options allowed me to choose to stick with my provider and appreciate the value they still provide. If these changes were forced upon me with no choice I would still be resentful.

I have been extremely disappointed by the new recycling system, and I would hate to see trash service go the same way. It took 6 weeks for the city to pick up my recycling, and a month from my request to get a smaller cart. While the previous system allowed me to recycle as many items as I needed, provided that boxes were flattened appropriately. A month ago I needed to rip a large box into 3 pieces and dispose of it over the course of two weeks because the new "convenient" system won't accept anything bigger than the cart. The truck now circles our small neighborhood for an entire afternoon, going down my alley twice and the street once. I find it difficult to see how this has reduced street traffic or noise. The additional mess of having carts all over the place makes the alley nearly impassable. As a conscientious recycler I have been forced into an inconvenient system that caters to the least involved recyclers.

While I understand the cost of illegal dumping to the city, I question how much we will be charged so that every resident in the city can dispose of 3 large items; this cost certainly must exceed the \$300,000 the city currently spends. In addition, this reduces the likelihood that people will participate in more environmentally friendly options for large items, like free-share sites or recycling drop-off locations. Again, as a conscientious consumer I am being penalized because others throw out 3 or more large items that may be otherwise useable.

I can see that the city wants to improve the trash collection system, but I feel that the elimination of choice and the addition of a forced "3 large item" fee goes too far. I haven't been able to find the city's proposed "reduced rate" but I can't imagine it'll beat what I currently pay, especially if I have to pay for 3 large items that a careless neighbor decides to leave in front of my house. If the city recycling system is any indication of the trash plan, it will create extra mess and more careless dumping.

- I strongly disapprove of the City establishing a wage standard for drivers (let alone for any job) the marketplace has done & will continue to do a fine job in this regard! By imposing this standard, the City will force virtually every home/property owner to see an increase in their trash collection cost

Although it appears the die is cast on this matter in general, I urge Council President Stark (and his fellow Council members) in the strongest terms to support a co-op feature for those who choose to do so. This will reduce billing costs, reduce operational/pickup costs, eliminate the need for two containers (when one will suffice) thus further reducing cost...plus I/we don't have room for yet another container now that we have two new containers in the alley for the new city-wide recycling program.

Thank you for your excellent proposal on coordinated trash collection.

Our block tried to agree on one trash hauler some years ago, after our alley had been seriously renovated and we realized that the current four or five trash haulers visiting us each week were not only providing trash pickup, but also noise, pollution, and collateral wear on the alley. All but two households agreed to use the same trash hauler, but two did not, so we still have more than one trash hauler per week. Better, but not as good as one.

I write to encourage Councilman Stark to support the proposal for a single trash hauler to serve each neighborhood.

This would have several advantages for residents. Principal among these are reduction of noise from the collection trucks (they are very noisy) and reduction of wear and tear on roads and particularly alleys (which I believe are constructed to lower standards of durability than regular roads). It can also permit the city to negotiate uniform services and rates for neighborhoods.

I understand that some haulers object to the proposal. I assume that their objection is because the proposed system would limit the ability of some haulers to try to increase their number of customers. It seems likely that by serving distinct areas, they can save money spent on fuel and additional equipment.

In the early '80s, if I recall correctly, haulers agreed among themselves to limit the areas each served. Customers complained that this resulted in artificially inflated prices due to lack of competition. If the City manages the system, it should be possible to control costs and have the benefits of less truck traffic and uniform service.

I support the notion being considered by the Council to assign areas to haulers.

Greetings Mr. Stark,

I plan to attend the next City Council Public Hearing next Wed 07/19 at 5:30. however, 45 seconds is not enough time to express my opion, concerns, and suggestions reguarding the city-wide garbage collection. I would like to briefly share those thoughts with you in this email

My Hauler:

- I've lived (owned) in St. Paul for 20 years & I have had the same provider, 'Pete's Rubbish', the entire time.
- 'Pete's' is a husband & wife, 1 truck operation; they took over the family business from Jen's father when he retired a few years ago.
- 'Pete's' has always provided a great weekly service at a resonable price \$30/mo for a 90 gallon can.
- Whenever we need something extra picked up, we call them & they pick it up; depending on the load, they may charge an extra fee.
- I realizes that owing your own (garbage) business may not be everyone's american dream, but it's someone's dream, of owning their own business & being their own boss.

On the issues of removing large items:

- First of all, in our neighborhood (& throughout the city) there are scrappers that roam the alleys every week every 'metal' item we've set out in the alley, has been picked up by scrappers within 3 days.
- There are at least a couple of towns in southern Minnesota, that organize seasonal curbside or alley pick up of large items 2 or 3 times a year.
- Would it be feasable for St. Paul to impliment such program/contact with garbage companies?
- The plan could map out the different neighborhoods/streets for curbside or alley collection 2 or 3 times a year.
- Yes, it may not be pretty sight to see in your neighborhood for a day or two during the seasonal pickup, however, it's no secret that we all genereate garbage.
- Service may have to be provided at a minimal cost of less than \$5/mo on our property taxes
- If someone cannot wait for their scheduled seasonal pick up & their own provider cannot pick it up, then give the option to allow an 'out of schedule' pick up once or twice per year (per household) for an additional out of pocket cost.

Too Many Trucks In Alley?

- The garbage collectors (& scrappers) know our neighborhoods & alleys - it's some of those service people that provide some sense of civil protection & security while everyone is at work or school during the day.

Recycling Program:

- I'm not sure if you figured out all the glitches with the recycling program this is what played out in our neighborhood we use to place our recycles curbside on recycle day. Now we have 60 gallon blue carts in the alley.
- I use to set out my recycle bins when they were full, every 2-3 weeks.
- Now everyones 60 gallon blue cart sits in the alley (like the majority of St. Paul residents) & the recycle crew has to check & empty every recycle bin in our alley, creating more (but less physical?) work.

There it is in a 'nutshell'. I will see you at the meeting.

What provisions will be made for seniors? I'm handicapped, live alone, and on a fixed income. I have the smallest size trash can available, for which I'm obviously charged less. I don't mind having a 64 gallon recycling bin or discovering the fee on my property tax statement, which was of course the case when we had blue boxes. Though it's big, I can roll this behemoth out every third week. I have an in-home O.T. person who spent half an hour with me, teaching me to handle it safely. That every-third-week certainly wouldn't work for trash and this larger one-size-fits-all trash can would obviously be harder to maneuver by myself.

At present, because we have no alley and my small one-car garage is close to the sidewalk, I keep my trash can behind a gated fence and on a concrete slab more or less adjacent to my garage door, which my hauler willingly pulls open and easily handles, because I rarely have more than 2 relatively light plastic 13-gallon bags. I worry that any new hauler will insist I roll this larger trash can out each week to my driveway apron next to the street curb, which I probably couldn't do by myself. Mind you, I'm not looking for a handout. I just don't want to subsidize a household 4 times the size of mine. That seems unfair.

What about customer service? Who will be responsible for resolving problems? The city? The hauler? I recently had a recycling problem. Because there seemed no city number anywhere in either introductory pamphlet, I called the recycler's number. They told me the city had recently sent out a clarification letter. He offered to send me a copy which a week later I have yet to receive. He also had suggested I call the city office, though he had no specific idea who to contact.

After 2 tries in the phone book blue pages, I called the Mayor's office. They couldn't help me, but left a message for the Public Works contact to call me back. After 48 hours, when no one had called me back, I called the Mayor's office again, got the name Kris and her direct number so I could myself call. I got through. When I politely asked if she'd received my call, she was clearly annoyed that I'd failed to realize I was one of perhaps dozens or more whose concerns had ended up in her voice mail.

When I tried to explain my problem, that I hadn't understood the wording in the initial pamphlet sent out, she was dismissive and somewhat patronizing, brusquely pointing out that I just hadn't read the pamphlet correctly. That led to an argument which I handled poorly. Maybe she was having a bad day, but I keep thinking, if I have concerns about trash pickup, am I going to have to get a higher dosage of blood pressure meds? If I hadn't called the city after 48 hours, would I still be waiting by my phone? I understand Kris may be the city contact for trash pickup as well. She seems already overwhelmed, so will that work?

Like every other citizen, retired or working, my time is valuable. The thought of having made 4 calls to resolve a simple problem made me wish I could instead, come 2018, myself haul my trash to Hugo where I feel confident my mom and pop family hauler would at once know what to do. Remove the trash from my car with a smile and send me home. Small means you'll always be my favorite customer,

or so it will feel. Big means I've got a good sales pitch for you, one which may lead me to think for all of 5 minutes that they truly have an investment in my overall well-being.

Thanks for reading this. I tried not to be crabby, but frankly I still haven't forgiven all of you for the disgraceful Grand Avenue parking meter debacle plus the forgiven property tax for the soccer stadium, the latter of which will surely look good on the Mayor's resume for Governor. No matter that the parking issue hasn't been properly addressed and the spillover of rowdy patrons will likely fill up the nearby residential neighborhood, such that many residents will now have to decide between selling the house and building an addition onto their garage. Opting for the garage would of course require a variance from the city. Good luck with that.

St Paul City Council Member Stark,

I strongly oppose organized trash collection.

I have enjoyed high quality and fairly priced trash collection services from Berquist and Son Haulers for 14 plus years and believe the new city monopoly being created in the trash business is bad for my family and bad for St. Paul.

Lets just look at a few of the goals presented as the rationale of this effort and compare how this will directly impact my family in St. Paul.

Consistent, and high quality customer service throughout city: I have this today and the city is taking away my preference for garbage hauler and will be "matching" me to a vendor based on current market share. Does the city council believe it can choose a better garbage hauler than I have? In 14 years I have had nothing but good service, is the city council uniquely qualified in customer service or choosing open market garbage hauling vendors?

Stable, uniform rates and reasonable, low cost: I pay \$23.33 per month including taxes for 65 gallon service today. Based on the latest Pioneer Press report, my new service will be \$29.76 per month PLUS annual fees starting at \$52 in year one. So let me get this straight, the city council wants stable, uniform, and low cost rates and as result on a go forward annual basis my bill is going up to \$409.12 vs. the \$279.96 for year one or a huge 46% increase as a result?

Reduction in illegal dumping: Illegal dumping is a problem today, and will be a problem after this monopoly is implemented. What direct amount of illegal dumping should I expect in reduction after this

monopoly is implemented? People who don't pay for garbage today will now be paying (>40% more than today apparently) for garbage service so we can expect this to go away?. If the city council believes that, lets raise the price of metered parking to reduce the amount of illegal parking! So assuming this can't be quantified, lets use the \$300K number provided as a baseline for expected cost. With 115K households in St Paul, thats roughly \$2.61 per household of "illegal dumping" cost paid by the city. I will take that amount and pay my \$2.61 city cost in illegal dumping over 12 months, or \$0.22 per month (hey lets round up to \$0.25 per month) and I will still save over \$10 per month versus this city council fix to this issue. If prices go up (cost is the cause for dumping), does the amount of illegal dumping go up?

Less truck traffic. No arguments here (lets just ignore the rights to public use of streets and the fact haulers pay taxes the same as every other person and business with transportation). Please detail out the cost savings for my annual right of way maintenance. My costs are going up by 46% for garbage hauling, as a result my right of way taxes should decrease as the replacement wear and tear would be less. Unless the wear and tear or replacement costs are not being adjusted, then I guess I just want to keep the current system.

Reduction in garbage burning. Illegal burning activity today is going to be reduced tomorrow because a monopoly garbage contract that costs >40% than current services is implemented? This is simply not plausible, in fact we should expect MORE burning if significant cost increases are implemented. Unless a higher garbage hauling cost equal less burning?

Easy access for all residents. I don't see how someone who could navigate the process to purchase/rent in St Paul, is suddenly incapable of getting basic services such as garbage collection. These companies are competing for the business, provide a high level of service to get the business, and have every incentive to win each and every household of St. Paul. Could the city of St. Paul help connect citizens? Sure, but how does reducing my choice for garbage collection further that endeavor?

Monopoly or "coordinated collection" is bad for my family and St. Paul.

Dear City Council Member Russ Stark

I am writing to you in regards to the Pioneer Press article on the St. Paul City Wide Trash Service contract. As community member I have not been a big supporter of having single source pickup, as I really like my current trash provider (Pete's Rubbish), and am a big believer in completive free enterprise. But I understand how reducing truck traffic has its benefits. I also hope that trash pickup day and recycling pickup day are coordinated. We have been continuously told through the media that our quality will go up and our price will go down. However, after reading highlights of the contract via the newspaper article, I have decided my trash service rates will significantly increase, if I use the closes can size to what I currently have (38 gallon), which happens to be slightly smaller (35 gallon), I will pay \$103.60 more than I have been paying.

Per the article; I will secure a 35 gallon can for 24.40/mth plus an annual fee of \$52/yr = \$344.80

My Rubbish fee from Pete's Rubbish is \$60.30/qtr = \$241.20/year

Under the proposed contract I will incur a price increase of \$103.60/year. Over the 5 year contract term this will cost me and my family an additional \$518.

The article also stated they each house hold will be able to dispose of three bulking items, and a Christmas tree each year. I do not know what the City considers a bulky item. For me, this is not an issue. I do not use a live Christmas tree. This service will be a waste. When I have bulky items, I strip it down, recycle what I can, and slowly dispose of the item, over a couple weeks, in my trash can.

I do not know about you, but I do not have a money tree growing in my yard. Secondly I have been extremely happy with the quality of service provide by Pete's Rubbish. With the new system I have no options, and if they do not meet expectations, I cannot change providers. I am stuck with whatever, who ever does the job.

Lastly why do we have to pay an annual administrative fee of approximately \$52. I am already paying \$16.53 in trash tax. I am not sure how many homes will benefit from this service, but I would estimate 100K properties. This will provide an estimated \$5.2M dollars to the city per year. If these funds are used solely for managing this service, there is an extreme fleecing of our community, through government inefficiency.

I encourage you to not to except the current contract propo	sal.

I was unable to attend the meeting on Wednesday evening. I'd like to share my opposition to coordinated collection, primarily because it takes away my right to choose my provider, but also because of the significant increase in pricing.

I'm pleased the City is working with the consortium of independent trash haulers. I am a big advocate of small business! I currently have excellent service from Ken Berquist & Son, Inc. They never miss a pick-up, they always return my trash bin to the same spot near my garage, and they are friendly and helpful with I need to call them or talk with the drivers.

I am unhappy that the proposed pricing means the cost of my trash collection will increase 44%, an additional \$100+, per year for the same services I have today.

I am diligent about recycling and faithful to take organic waste to the waste sites rather than placing it in the trash. I currently have the smallest trash bin available and generally fill it only half way each week. Under the proposed pricing, even if I choose to have my trash picked up every other week, I'll still incur an increase of over \$70 per year.

I believe that having a choice among haulers keeps them competitive both in pricing and in service. A good example of what happens when there is not competition is the low quality service we get from Eureka for our recycling.

I'd like the City Council to drop their plans for coordinated collection completely.

I'm very concerned about this garbage hauling system. Although I do agree that reducing the number of garbage trucks going down streets and alleys is a good thing, the costs outweigh the benefits. In particular, the pricing structure disproportionately affects those who can least afford it. I'm a college writing tutor who bought a house in the Midway five years ago (I've lived in the area since attending Hamline in '05-08); I make about \$22,000/year, and the cheapest option under this plan will increase my rates while providing me with less frequent pick-ups than I currently have (not to mention that my current hauler, Pete's, has fantastic customer service, something I am concerned I will lose if I am assigned a different hauler). And I know there are many in this city for whom money is much tighter than it is for me. Although there are likely

good ways to reduce street wear, Saint Paul should stick to options that do not penalize low-income residents with higher rates.

A lesser but still valid issue for me is that it also penalizes households that strive to reduce their waste.

And third, although it is not at all clear to me how this will play out, I am concerned that it will impede small businesses, such as my current garbage hauler, Pete's, more than larger businesses; I initially had Aspen, but when my rates continually went up I did research and switched to Pete's. Now I will not have that option. Although I am not entirely opposed to reducing citizen choice for good cause, I am not convinced that this system is a good cause.

Subject: Organized garbage hauling

Russ and Samantha:

Kirk and I were talking about the organized trash hauling plan last night and would like to add our comments to the discussion underway.

We see a rationale for organized trash hauling, so long as the small haulers we support, like Pete's Rubbish, have a seat at the table and can continue to provide services to St. Paul residents. But we question the currently proposed cost structure because from our perspective, it will increase costs for (therefore penalize) the very people you want to incentivize and reward: the folks who avidly recycle, compost and generally try to make less trash. Sharon Digby's comments in today's Strib article resonated with us.

<u>Our choices</u>: We recycle. A lot. Beyond alley pick up of recyclables, we put used Kleenex and paper towels, cotton balls, tissue paper, dryer lint and all manner of other recyclables in a compostable bag and when filled, we take it up to the drop off site at Macalester. We carry our own bags to the grocery store and when we do use paper and plastic from stores, every bag gets a second (and typically third and fourth and fifth) use. We have a 35 gallon trash can from Pete's, the smallest we can get. We pay about \$60 every three months for Pete's to pick up our trash once a week.

<u>Under the proposed plan</u>: If we want the same level of service, we will pay \$24.40 per month (\$73.20 every three months) plus a \$52 administrative fee. So our garbage costs will go up \$65 per year.

We would appreciate it if you could come up with a cost structure that doesn't increase costs for the folks who are already trying to do the right thing by reducing their contributions to the waste stream. We also ask you to redesign the cost structure to provide an option for people currently sharing services, particularly if it helps folks on a fixed or reduced income.

After heated hearing, St. Paul City Council delays vote on trash plan

The St. Paul City Council will spend the next week mulling over the latest proposal for organized residential trash collection, which has received mixed reaction from residents and haulers.

Following a heavily attended public hearing, the council chose Wednesday to hold off on voting on whether to enter into final negotiations for <u>a five-year or seven-year contract with the city's 15 private haulers</u>, a proposal hammered out across nearly 11 months of difficult negotiations.

The hearing drew 23 speakers in opposition and 18 in support. A council vote likely will take place July 26.

The proposal — which has yet to be finalized — would charge all St. Paul homeowners rates of \$21 to \$32 per month, depending upon barrel size, on top of an annual administrative fee of \$52 that has drawn many questions. Residents may not opt out of trash service.

City officials say the plan would save the typical homeowner \$35 to \$52 a year off their existing trash bills, but several residents said they pay far less than that or share services with neighbors, which would no longer save them money.

"The thing that is ... missing from this agreement is the shared-services option," said Council Member Amy Brendmoen.

"To those who only create a very small amount of trash, to me that's probably the biggest issue that we have to keep grappling with," said Council President Russ Stark.

But the negative environmental impact of having multiple haulers per day service a single alley is undeniable, Stark added. "A large majority of my constituents that I have heard from want to see this happen," he said.

Some residents said for both aesthetic and environmental reasons, they look forward to seeing one garbage truck serve their alley, instead of as many as 10 or 11 different haulers. "It is the absolutely most inefficient system there is," said Debbie Prokopf, a resident of South Como.

Proponents said the proposal — which covers the collection of three bulk items such as refrigerators and televisions per year at no extra charge — could cut down on illegal dumping, an eyesore and safety hazard.

"Once a month at least, I am physically removing mattresses, chairs, bags of trash," said Patricia Ohmans, director of the Frogtown Green program, which advocates for green spaces in the Thomas-Dale neighborhood.

Highland Park resident Andrew Krchik said he represented 17 neighbors opposed to the plan, including seven who share carts, some of them seniors. "This is going to be a snafu," he said.

Hamline-Midway resident Stephanie Digby said she sells online any bulk items she doesn't need, and the proposal effectively asks her to pay higher rates to subsidize large item collection for homeowners who do not.

"Why should I support people who are wasteful?" Digby said. "Why should I pay to support people who are environmentally irresponsible?"

In an interview, Patrick Connolly, who is part of a four-unit condo association that shares three carts, questioned why the city needs such a large administrative fee to buy new carts when most residences already have their own.

"It's \$52 more per unit for the administrative fee, plus our (monthly rates) go up 25 percent," said Connolly, who works for a public affairs group that has advocated against organized trash collection on behalf of the larger haulers.

Council Member Dan Bostrom noted that monthly rates are at least \$15 lower in Maplewood, which began coordinated trash collection in 2012. Republic services the entire city, charging homeowners \$6.61 to \$13.07 per month after taxes and fees. There is no annual administrative fee, though bulk items cost extra. The Maplewood contract does not mandate a labor peace agreement.

"Now I've got a real problem here," said Bostrom, who said he was otherwise not opposed to the general goal of a unified system. "We do have more work to do on this."

Chris Swanson, Maplewood's environmental and city code specialist, responded to a reporter's inquiry by noting, however, that all the single-family homes in the suburb of just over 40,000 residents can be serviced with three trucks.

"St. Paul is a larger city with significantly more collection challenges than Maplewood," said Swanson, in an email. "Just the act of picking up in alleys adds time and costs to the route, not even mentioning the number of winding old neighborhood streets or homes that cannot be collected in the alley and would take a separate pickup."

I commend the city in their effort to provide city-wide organized trash collection. I appreciate that organized collection will reduce illegal dumping, reduce truck traffic and reduce air pollution.

However, I firmly believe the new system should provide a stronger incentive to reduce waste by offering a smaller-sized trash container.

Since our two-person household composts or recycles most of our waste, we never fill our 35-gallon container; on most weeks, it's less than a quarter full. Certainly, there are many others in the city who are also in this situation and would like to save on their monthly trash bill by using a smaller container.

The "every-other-week" option is a good start, but I don't think it goes far enough. The estimated cost of this option is almost exactly the same as what we're paying now: \$76.99 for 3 months with Ken Berquist and Son vs. \$76.47 for 3 months of "every-other-week" service under the 5-year contract. I understand the new service will also offer bulk and tree pick-up, which we wouldn't use. So, from my perspective, my family is paying the same for half the service.

I urge you to include in the agreement with trash haulers a requirement to offer a trash container that is smaller than 32-35 gallons in size.

I read in the Pioneer Press that you have heard from more supporters than non-supporters of City managed garbage collection. Please register my non-support of this proposal. In the attached photo you can see the garbage bin I currently use. It is smaller than the 35 gal city-issued recycling bin that I put out half-full every two or three weeks. My garbage, collected weekly, consists of a half-full kitchen garbage bag per week and I pay no more than \$15/month. Twice in the twelve plus years I have contracted with my current hauler I have had items too big to fit in the bin. Both times I called ahead and the items were collected as requested. I have never had a Christmas tree and have no plans to have one in the future. I have a good relationship with my family-owned hauler and I wish to remain their customer. They drive a small truck and have run up to the house to collect on the handful of times I have forgotten to put out the bin. If I am forced into the proposed city-managed operation, I will be paying more for less service than I currently have, assuming I choose the every-two-week option. Since I discard cat litter every week, I would rather have every week pick up, which would cost me even more.

I have been to the meetings hosted by MacGroveland and I understand some the arguments stated for moving to organized collection, but I believe that city-managed collection is not the best way. If people are concerned about lots big noisy trucks they can organize with their neighbors so they contract with just one or two haulers with smaller trucks. (Residents with alleys already coordinate snowplowing.) I resent the fact that a couple of district councils have the power to impose their will on the rest of the city. District councils would do a better service, I believe, if they held vendor fairs where their residents

could gather information from the haulers and network with neighbors to choose the solution that best fits their neighborhood circumstances. I also think that district councils and the City could put more effort into informing residents that they currently must contract with haulers and use acceptable ways of disposing of garbage and bulky items. I find it interesting that one of the problems organized collection is supposed to solve is illegal dumping. If people don't contract with garbage haulers now because it costs too much, how will charging more for pickup help them?

If the City is committed to managing organized garbage collection, then it should do a better job providing lower cost options and incentives to reduce consumer waste overall. Personally, I think there are bigger problems on which the City should spend its resources than organized trash collection.

Council Member Stark,

It was good to see you Wednesday night. It's hard to comprehend that it has been almost a year since the council met to start the process to organize trash collection in St. Paul. I wanted to weigh in on the coordinated collection agreement. As you know, I have been against Organized Collection from the beginning, I made that clear in our meetings. I also think that the time for that conversation ended on July 21, 2016 when the council passed the resolution to begin the OC process.

The last 10 months of negotiations have been grueling. Despite what the Waste Management attorney said about city staff, I feel the process was well managed. There were more than a few times when I would have liked to throw Kris and Ann out the window, but I know there were times they felt the same about me. That's how negotiating goes. The agreement represents multiple compromises on both sides, and was signed by all fifteen haulers. I believe it is a solid program that will serve the vast majority of St. Paul residents well.

The issue of rates was brought up with a comparison to Maplewood. Maplewood was taken away from the independents on a low ball bid by a national company (the lowest rate in the state). The same company has the contract for North St. Paul and charges 76% HIGHER for their 35 gallon cart than they do in Maplewood. For a real comparison, North St. Paul has bulkie collection included in their program. Their 35 gallon cart rate with taxes and bulkies is \$22.48 for 2017. Our proposal is actually for a 2019 rate so adjust NSP by 2.5% a year for CPI and their 2019 rate would be \$23.62. Our hauler proposal for a 35 gallon cart is \$23.77. For \$.15/month we are going to carrying bad debt for up to a year, provide walk up service to handicapped residents, take Holiday Trees for free, provide a free cart size change every year, and do the billing. Keep in mind NSP doesn't have a Frog Town or a North End or a Payne/Phalen area like St. Paul and its mostly street pick up which is conducive to fully automated collection. The city spent \$300K on consultants who know the industry and the market. I must assume they approve of the agreement.

I hope the council approves the resolution so that we can begin the ominous task of implementing the program.

I also had a chance to study the proposed rates and fees for potential city managed system. Given **my current cost per month is \$9.68** (as I have co-op'd with my neighbor since 1988), this policy will result in a huge increase in cost for me **and** my neighbor.

Please count me in as one person very opposed to how the coordinated trash pick-up system has been proposed. I have reviewed the proposal carefully and find that the following will be very disadvantageous:

- 1. My cost will go up significantly. I live in a 2 unit condo (duplex) and my neighbor and I share a trash container that is more than adequate for out needs. We do not need 2 containers and find multiple containers to be an eyesore. WE NOW PAY MUCH LESS THAN WHAT IS BEING PROPOSED!
- 2. I currently pay for a yard waste pick-up which is very convenient for me. I see no mention of this being an option under the new system.

That said, I think some level of coordination is needed, but there are much better solutions. For a start, why not require haulers within a district to all pick up on the same day of the week. That would eliminate trash trucks and containers being on the road 5 days/week. That is a beginning. Then maybe we could move to a system where a specific hauler is assigned to a district to eliminate multiple trucks. When and if that is done, the services people desire should be offered and the costs should not increase based upon wage requirements and other things imposed by the city that citizens do not care about.

I have a friend who lives in Maplewood and is VERY happy with her service. I think they converted to a much better system than what St. Paul is proposing.

I really don't think citizen wants and needs have been considered enough. If an unpopular system is imposed, we will have to indicate our displeasure at the voting booth.

Cost - our fees would go up with your current plan Every other week pick up - unacceptable City owned trash cans - we already have a trash can. You can't be serious that all these cans would be tossed and we get new ones. Put a sticker on them to identify who the hauler is.

\$52 yearly fee- for what. The article I read stated that the haulers will continue to do there own billing. That amount per household would likely be well over a million dollars yearly - depending on what is counted as households.
