




# Exurban growth plummeted in the 2000s; gained equilibrium in the 2010s



## Growth Rochester and St. Cloud regions slowed; then stabilized




#### Suburban Twin Cities Counties similarly slowed; stabilized


#### Urban counties reversed a decades-long trend of little-to-no growth




Majority of the growth (88%) occurred in 7-county metro


- MN grew by 179,000
- Hennepin and Ramsey added 98,000 jointly (55% of the states growth)




#### Steady growth from St. Paul's beginning; until ~1950









## Hennepin and Ramsey county poised to outpace growth in all other areas of the state





### Population by age and sex Minnesota, 2015






#### Residents in their 20s are the largest cohort in St. Paul




# More older adults than school-age children in MN by 2020










# ~132,00 People of Color live in St. Paul (41% of all St. Paul residents) > 1 in 10 MNs of Color live in St. Paul


#### Nearly 1 in 5 St. Paul residents are foreign-born




