Sign up today to get in on SPRWS systems tours

Ever wondered what other divisions in the water utility do? How we get our water to our customers? Or where the water comes from in the first place?

Well, here's your chance to gain a better understanding about the water utility. This fall, there are several systems tours you can go on in August, September and October.

The first systems tour of the McCarrons center, including the plant, the warehouse, the meter shop, the garage, the dewatering building and the spent lime fields, will take place starting at 8:10 a.m. on Tuesday, August 8, with an overflow date of August 15.

The next systems tour in September will take you out into the field and show you the work of service crews, temp crews, UDF flushing and hydrant inspections, and restoration crews. It will also cover water quality actions taken in the field. The tour will be held on Wednesday, September 13, from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m.

Vadnais Lake site of open water rescue exercises July 30







Vadnais Lake was the site of open water rescue drills conducted interdepartmentally between the Saint Paul fire department, the Ramsey County Sheriff's office and the Minnesota State Patrol on Sunday, July 30. The three agencies worked together to practice rescuing people from the open water. Above left, two fire fighters jump into the water from a State Patrol helicopter, soon after, another helicopter with a basket then arrived to drop the basket down and

hoist the fire fighters up. Middle image, the fire fighters ride in the basket back to shore. Right, the pilot of the helicopter with the basket works to maneuver the basket onto shore on the parking lot of the Vadnais Lake park. Ramsey County Sheriff's boats were in the water to ensure everyone's safety. The exercises continued all day from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m., closing off the bike trail around the lake to the general public.
