SUBJECT: Summary of the public process and comments received on the proposal for bicycle lanes on Forest Street.

This memorandum presents a summary of the public process and comments received on Saint Paul Public Works' proposal to install bicycle lanes on Forest Street between Maryland Avenue and Margaret Street. The full text of all written statements received is attached to the end of this memorandum.

Saint Paul Public Works staff began stakeholder outreach along Forest Street in June 2018. A website was created for the project, providing an overview of the planned improvements, data, project documents, visuals, timeline, and a project contact for questions and comments. City staff also presented the project to the Transportation Committee of the Planning Commission in June and July. The Transportation Committee recommended approval of the project as proposed.

Forest Street Project Meeting:

A project meeting was held on June 27, 2018 at the Phalen Recreation Center. Residents and property owners within 200 feet of the proposed project were sent notifications of the open house via mail, along with an overview of the project details and impacts. 479 flyers were sent out for the meeting. The flyers provided a map of the project, a link to the project website, contact information for project staff, and information about the project design.

Written Statements Received:

As of August 13, 2018, city staff received a total of 24 written statements specific to proposed bicycle facilities on Forest Street from the following sources:

- Comment forms from the project meeting (8 statements)
- Comments sent or forwarded to city staff via email (10 statements)
- Comments sent or forwarded to city staff via mail/in-person delivery (6 statements)

It should be noted that the total number of statements received may include multiple statements from some individuals, as well as some duplicate statements (e.g. an individual may have provided written feedback at an Open House and provided feedback via email).

Major Themes:

All statements received were reviewed by project staff. Major themes identified in the feedback are summarized below:

- The proposed bike facilities will improve safety and /or connectivity (8 comments)
- Concern about the proposed parking removal along the corridor (7 comments)



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- General support for the proposed bike facilities (4 comments)
- Bike lanes proposed for Forest Street would be more appropriate on another street (3 comments)
- Need for more bike facilities on the East Side (3 comments)

My name is John Ellman and I own a 12 unit apartment at 890 Forest Street. This is a follow up letter to a voice mail I left with you about a week or so ago.

The reasons I see that the east side of the street would not be a good choice are:

It will impact more people than if it were on the west side of the street.

There are more houses and apartments and a church on the east side of the street. The only houses on the west side are a block of houses just south of Maryland and then none until across the street from my apartment and south to wells street. However there is a no parking sign at the corner of wells and forest so there usually is no parking from the alley to wells.

On the west side there is only one apartment, a seven unit across the street from the school yard, and seldom are there any cars parked there. Otherwise ALL the houses face the side streets, not forest, including the big church.

Also forest is an emergency route and fire trucks and ambulances are using it every day.

If you drive from Maryland south to 7th at 11 pm you will see how many more cars are on the east side of the street. In front of my apartment there will be 4 to 8 cars.

I have been told by someone who knows the neighborhood, that Earl Street would be a better selection. I don't know why he said that except maybe the houses there all face the side streets and none or few face Earl.

Dear Mr. Hanson,

My name is Elissa Lindwall, and I live off of Geranium Ave and Forest St. I am writing to express my opposition to eliminating parking on the east side of Forest in order to make room for a bikeway.

As a member of the neighborhood, I frequently ride my bike down Forest. I have never felt unsafe on this street, due to the low level of traffic. The street is very straight and bikers are easily visible. In addition, I rarely encounter other bicyclists on the street. Because of the low level of bike and car traffic, I do not believe it is necessary to add bike lanes to Forest. Until a greater need is demonstrated, it would seem to be sufficient to simply add "share the road" or bikeway signs.

Not only do I live in the neighborhood, I also attend Holy Trinity Orthodox Church, at the corner of Forest and Case. On-street parking is critical to our church, as we have no parking lot or other facilities. Eliminating the parking on the east side of Forest would force church members to park on side streets and possibly take up spots that are normally used by residents of those streets, resulting in frustration when residents cannot park in front of their houses. I have witnessed this occur firsthand when LIFE Academy has an event and my neighbors and I are forced to park far away from our homes. In regards to our church, parking on side streets would mainly be a conflict on Sunday mornings. However, our church also provides a much-needed service to the community by renting Archangel Michael Hall, on the other side of Forest and Case, to the community at very reduced rates. This hall is in such high demand that it is used almost 100% of weekends from 2 p.m. to 10 p.m., for celebrations such as birthdays, graduations, and receptions. If parking were eliminated on the east side of Forest, renters of this hall would also be forced to park on side streets, resulting in many people walking back to their cars late at night and disturbing people who are trying to sleep.

Additionally, winter would pose a much bigger problem. There is very little bike traffic during the winter, but parking would still be eliminated. During snow emergencies, residents of east-west streets--like me--move their cars to north-south streets--like Forest. Without parking on one whole side of this major road, it will be much more difficult to find a place for residents to move vehicles.

Finally, I would ask if the city council has truly assessed the needs and desires of the Payne-Phalen neighborhood, and especially of Forest Street residents, in proposing this bikeway. Has this proposal come from the community, or is it a decision of those who live outside of the neighborhood and do not truly know its needs and desires? I know that my home did not receive any sort of survey asking for opinions on a bikeway.

In short, as a resident of the Forest Street community, I strongly oppose eliminating parking to build a bike lane on Forest. Such a plan is unnecessary for safety purposes and will result in increased difficulties for neighbors without providing significant benefits.

What is Proposed?

Parking removal is being proposed for the east side of Forest St between E. 7th St and Maryland Ave. The school bus loading zone on the east side of Forest between Cook and Jessamine will be maintained. Parking surveys were performed along the street to measure parking demand. That information will be presented at the open house.




FOREST STREET EXISTING & PROPOSED TYPICAL SECTIONS

Dear Saint Paul Resident / Property Owner:

The City of Saint Paul is proposing to install bicycle facilities on Forest Street between Maryland Avenue and Margaret Street. This project will be presented to the Saint Paul City Council on Wednesday, August 15. **This will be a public hearing, and there will be an opportunity for public comment.** The City Council will be asked to approve a resolution authorizing Public Works to install the proposed bicycle facilities on Forest Street.

This hearing will be held at:

5:30 PM, Wednesday, August 15, 2018

City Council Chambers 300 City Hall 15 Kellogg Blvd, West Saint Paul, MN 55102

Project Details:

Saint Paul Public Works is planning to resurface Forest Street between Maryland Avenue and East 7th Street in 2018. Adding bike lanes on Forest Street between Maryland Avenue and Margaret Street is proposed.

To install bike lanes, parking removal is proposed for the east side of Forest between Maryland Avenue and East 7th Street. A small amount of parking (100 feet) would also be removed on the west side of Forest directly north of East 7th Street. Creating new parking is proposed on the south side of Case Avenue between Duchess and Russell streets.

Project Updates:

A community meeting was held on June 27th at the Phalen Recreation Center to present information and receive feedback on the project. If you have not submitted a comment already or cannot attend the public hearing, you may email project staff or your Councilmember to have your comments entered into the public record.


