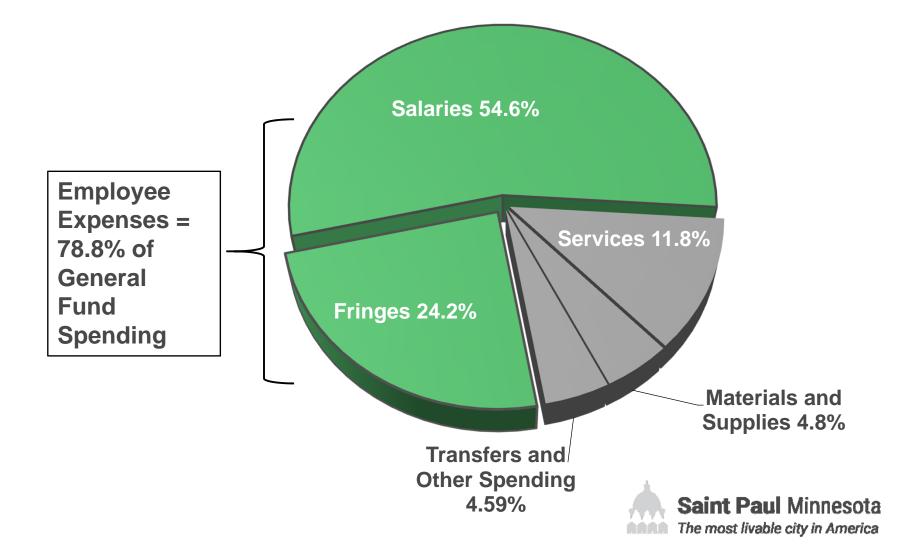

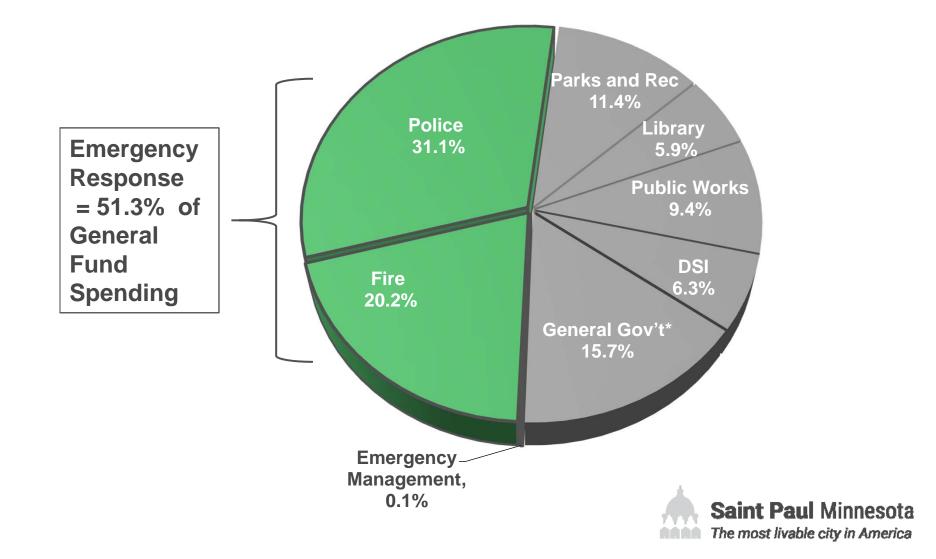

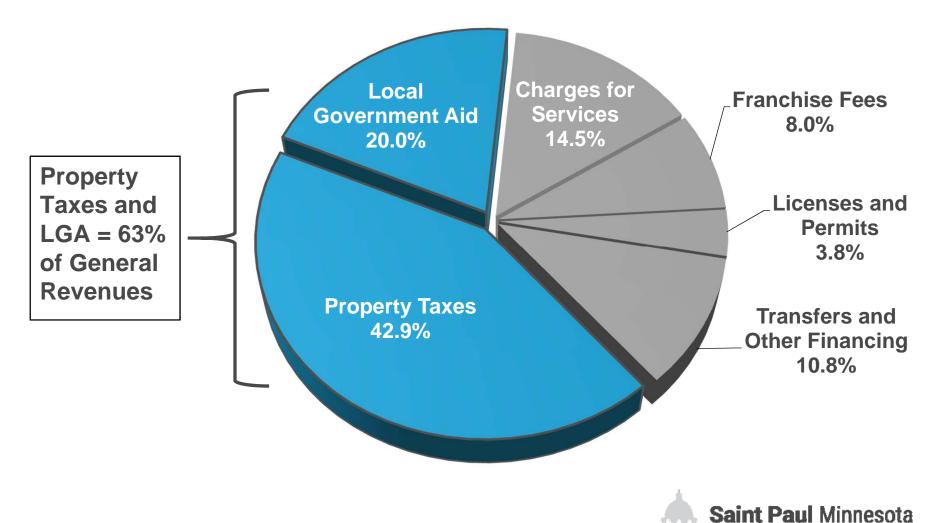
#### General Fund Budget 2019 Proposed Spending by Category



#### General Fund Budget 2019 Proposed Spending by Department

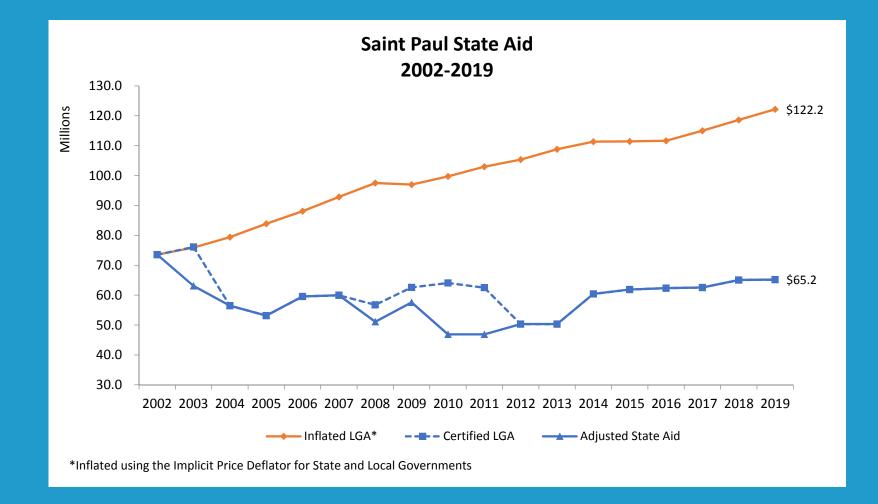


#### General Fund Budget 2019 Proposed Revenue by Source



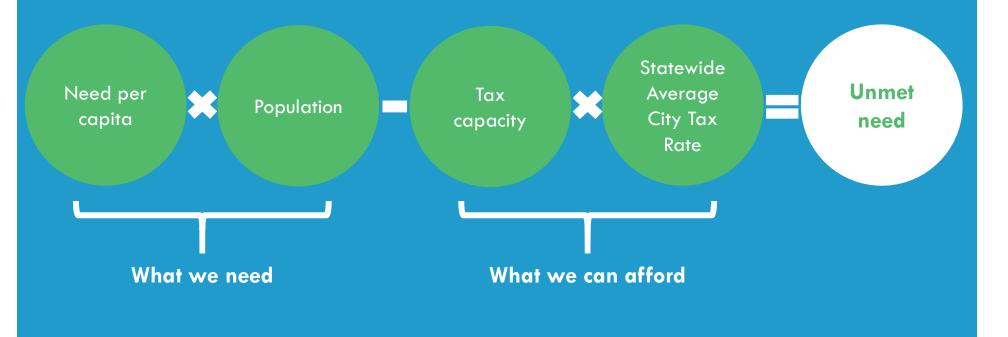

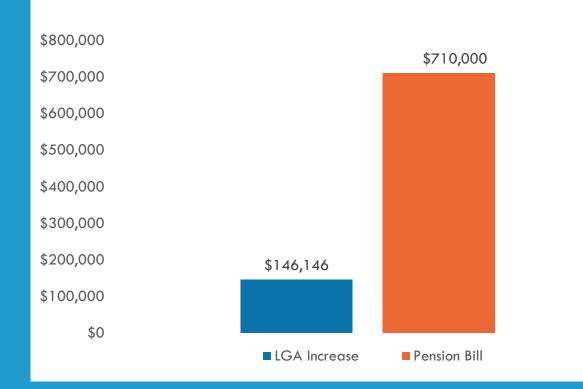

Saint Paul has the biggest gap (\$40.7M) between unmet need and certified LGA



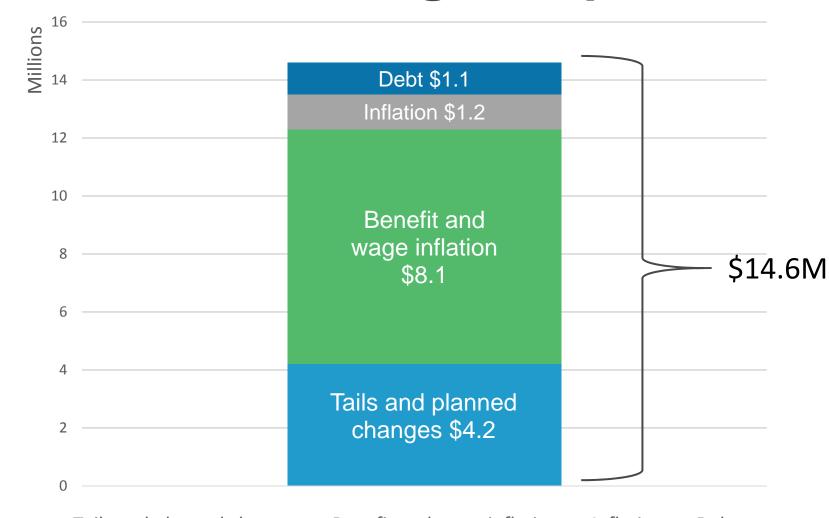

# Streets, Sidewalks, and Bikeways

**\$7.0 million** investment to maintain our streets



<b>\$2.5 million</b> Neighborhood Streets	Doubles the City's annual investment in resurfacing neighborhood arterial streets (\$1.25 million General Fund)
<b>\$3.0 million</b> Downtown Mill and Overlay	New three-year program to resurface all downtown streets (\$500,000 General Fund)
<b>\$1.0 million</b> Sidewalks	Expands sidewalk maintenance program and moves the entire program to General Fund in 2019
<b>\$500,000</b> Bikeways	First ever dedicated funding to create and maintain bikeways



# Children and Families

**\$1.9 million** investment in spaces for youth, financial empowerment, and support for immigrants



<b>\$1.4 million</b> Recreation Programming	<ul> <li>\$500,000 - Rice Recreation Center Design</li> <li>\$284,000 - Frogtown Community Center</li> <li>\$200,000 - Reopening Highwood Hills</li> <li>\$200,000 - Free recreation programming</li> <li>\$50,000 - Expanded facility hours (500 total)</li> <li>\$66,000 - Dedicated transportation for youth</li> <li>\$81,000 - Youth Programming Quality Specialist</li> </ul>	
<b>\$333,000</b> Office of Financial Empowerment	The OFE will provide financial navigation tools to Saint Paul residents and will facilitate the design and implementation of a future College Savings Account program	
<b>\$140,000</b> Legal Support for Immigrants	New attorney focused on providing outreach, advocacy, and services to immigrant and refugee communities in Saint Paul	



# Workers, Businesses, and Innovators

**\$2.8 million** investment in Saint Paul's workforce and businesses



<b>\$367,000</b> Permits and Plan Review	Two additional trades inspectors and a Plan Review Examiner to review Sewer Availability Charges (SAC) for construction projects
<b>\$250,000</b> Virtual One Shop	Redesign DSI office space to improve the customer experience, including self-service areas with kiosks
<b>\$115,000</b> Minimum Wage	One-time and ongoing funding to support minimum wage implementation, enforcement, and outreach
<b>\$300,000</b> Full Stack	Implementation of the Full Stack initiative, including funds for marketing and scholarships through the MSP TechHire program
<b>\$1,800,000</b> Cultural Corridors	Investment directed towards cultural destinations throughout Saint Paul to grow local businesses and build infrastructure

# Emergency Response

**\$2.5 million** investment in emergency services and first responders



<b>\$500,000</b> Mental Health	SPPD Mental Health Unit will partner with community health providers to embed more social workers with officers during mental health calls
<b>\$112,000</b> Commanders and Investigators	Six promotions of sworn officers to expand SPPD's command structure and investigative capacity
<b>\$523,000</b> BLS Unit	The BLS unit will relieve fire suppression assets and provide assistance for people with lower medical priority calls
<b>\$230,000</b> Military Leave Overtime	Covers overtime costs as Fire Department personnel who are active service members take leave



<b>\$130,000</b> EMS Supplies	Aligns budget with increased EMS run volume and cost of supplies
<b>\$30,000</b> Firefighter Health Study	Study to provide data on effective preventative treatment for cancer in firefighters
<b>\$960,000</b> Public Safety Fleet	Additional resources for Police and Fire's vehicle replacement program

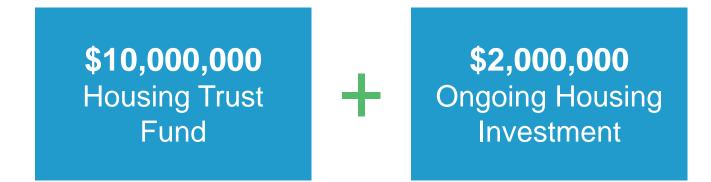


# Affordable Housing

#### **\$12.0 million** Investment in housing production, preservation, and

protection

Saint Paul Minnesota



- Housing Trust Fund is funded through onetime City and HRA sources
- Ongoing funding is through STAR and HRA sources made available by shifting a portion of PED admin to the General Fund
- Combined with additional city and federal sources, will total over \$71 million in housing investments to be deployed over a 3-year period
