B. SAINT PAUL PREFERENCE PRIORITIES

In accordance with Article VII (K) of this QAP, projects to be located in Saint Paul will be prioritized with the project receiving the most points being ranked first, the project receiving the second most points being ranked second and so on. If two or more projects have overall point totals which are within two (2) points of one another, the project shall be deemed to be of substantially equivalent, and the HRA Board will select the project which best meets the City's housing priorities.

Self-Scoring Worksheet - 4% HTC
