The Pipeline Express

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400 lead service line replacements scheduled

Construction on 10.6 miles of water main slated for this year

Our crews will be busy this season with construction work planned on 10.6 miles of water main throughout our system.

Several projects, about 4.4 miles of main replacement, will be done in conjunction with city and county street reconstruction projects.

For work done in these street construction areas, we will be working to replace main where the streets are already under construction by the cities and counties within our service area.

The utility will be doing an additional 3.9 miles of main replacement work outside of these construction projects.

About half of the projects will use pipe bursting, a method that pulls high-density polyethylene (HDPE) pipe through existing water main, bursting through the old main to leave the new main in place.

This type of construction is typically selected where there are long spans between water service connections and few tie-ins to the water main. Crews will excavate holes in the street approximately 500 feet apart to allow access for pulling the underground pipe. After the pipe is installed, utility crews will excavate and complete pipework for the few service connections, hydrants, and other connections to the distribution system. This can be much less disruptive to the streets than traditional open cut trenching.

Where service connection taps occur every 50 - 100 feet, open trench excavation is used for main replacement. Open cut trenches will be used in about half our project areas.

We will also be cleaning and lining the water main with a cement mortar on an additional 2.3 miles of main.

In addition, we plan to replace 400 lead service lines in the right-of-way with copper pipe throughout Saint Paul this year.

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Minnesota Urban Search and Rescue Task Force 1 uses plant for training



A member of the Minnesota Urban Search and Rescue Task Force 1 uses a series of ropes and pulleys to traverse across the open floc 2 chamber with her K-9. The exercise allowed the rescue workers to practice getting across a wide expanse, like a river or gorge, where they would need to drop down to assist with a rescue or recovery. The K-9s are trained in rescue of survivors as well as the recovery of bodies after an incident. The K-9s like to have solid footing, so the rescue teams try to keep the dog's feet planted on the rescuer's lap as they move across the expanse. Not an easy task with a large dog.



The task force also used the plant to practice confined-space rescues, dropping down into the floc and providing medical assistance as needed prior to hauling wounded mannequins out on stretchers and other apparatus. The training was set up Feb. 14-15, and took place Feb. 16 and 19 - 20, involving a half dozen chiefs and captains, 150 team members, and several K-9s.
