






Population Growth, 2010-2018




2010-2017




International and domestic migration

All Ages: Net in-migration to Minnesota has increased in the past two years




This decade and next: Unprecedented increases in MN's 65+ population

Population by age and sex Minnesota, 2015







Minnesota Baby Boomers Plans for their Own Long Term Care, 2010




The transition to an older Minnesota has just begun



Minnesota's labor force growth is projected to slow further over the next 10 years






Poverty rates in St. Paul have fallen since recession

St. Paul reached "majority-of color" in 2017




St. Paul is among the state's most diverse cities


- 29% of Minnesota's populations of Color live in Minneapolis and St. Paul

Populations of Color now jointly total more than 1 million in MN, 20% of the population




Minnesota is more racially diverse at younger ages Minnesota 2017





The 2020 Census is right around the corner


Census counts guide the distribution of dollars


- 15 billion federal dollars
 distributed to Minnesota each
 year on the basis of census data
- \$2,796 per person is allocated by the federal government to Minnesota each year (that's about \$27,960 per person over the decade)



An undercount would disproportionally impact our communities.

An undercount results in the misallocation of funds, depriving our community of the resources they deserve.
