Please clarify what will occur in two weeks. Is a similar hearing occurring with a 7th board member present? If so I would like to add comments on findings 3 and 6. Finding 3 should be met as parking on the T intersection during winter is dangerous and not practical. In addition, this intersection is a common school bus stop. Many parents pick up their children on this corner. Other properties do not have these unique circumstances to content with.
Regarding number 6, each house in this neighborhood is unique, shape, size, style. The parking 'characteristic' of this neighborhood is unique to each home. For example, some properties have drive ways out the side, others have the garage exiting to a different street, and still other homes sit behind two garages.
