2019 look back: Water production as orner low as in the 1950s; quality exceptional

The numbers are in for 2019 and our water production was similar to the previous few years. The plant pumped 14.315 billion gallons of water into the distribution system, which is an average of 39.7 million gallons per day. There was a time when "Back to the Fifties" themes would pop up at parties and dances. In terms of water production, we really are back to the fifties! The years 1955 to 1958 were the last time we produced this little water on an annual basis. In case you are wondering, our peak production years were in 1987 and 1988, when we averaged 55.1 and 58 million gallons per day respectively.

The smaller volumes of water produced do not diminish the fact that our water quality continues to be excellent and our customers are happy with our product. We officially logged only eight taste and odor complaints in 2019. That is a number that, I am guessing, our predecessors from the 1950s would not have thought possible. That excellent water quality is a product of diligent work and operational expertise from current and previous utility employees (I'll put a personal plug in for our production employees especially).

We cannot rest in our current excellent position. There will be new challenges coming in the future. We are seeing more attention and worry about emerging contaminants, such as the 3M PFAS pollutants in the eastern suburbs. State health authorities are becoming active in new rule-setting for pollutants all across the state. We will be looking

They perform routine labor/grounds maintenance on utility maintained land, such as land near water reservoirs/tanks, supply lakes, and conduits; and perform related duties as assigned.

Must possess and maintain a valid Minnesota class D driver's license or equivalent out-of-state driver's license. A provisional driver's license (without restrictions) will be accepted.

Rodney started his career with the city of Saint Paul as a car and truck serviceman in 1976 with the Board of Education. He transferred
