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Managers' Water treatment plant upgrade work continues

Planning work continues on the largest project the utility has done in decades. Our water treatment plant project is well underway with a Request for Qualifications currently posted. Qualifications are due on May 22 and will be used to short list three firms. These three firms will provide proposals that will serve as the basis for selecting the designbuilder for our project. The design-builder will be selected on a best-value basis, meaning that each team's experience and expertise will be considered in addition to cost factors. We expect to have firm on board by November. With a design-build project, there will be a single entity carrying out both the design and construction for the project.

Much work has been in process over the last several months including: the preparation of contract documents, a financing request to the state, plant capacity discussion, staff education on ozone treatment, a historical review of the site, and the development of pilot testing protocols with the new plant processes.

Will Menkhaus, SPRWS project engineer, has been working closely with our owner advisor, Brown and Caldwell. Some of the work, such as the development of contract documents, isn't glamorous, but it is necessary for the project to succeed. If you are interested to learn about limits of liability or other legal issues, I'm sure Will would be delighted to chat!

Rice Street entrance to close

The entrance to the administration building and the parking lot from Rice Street using Water Works Road will be closed starting on May 18. The closure will continue through mid-July. The detour route is shown above, with employees to follow the blue route and deliveries to follow the red route.
