Four water utility employees with a combined 90 years of experience retire Wagner retires after 32 years Flohr retires after 30 years

Jeff Wagner retired after 32 years with the city. Wagner started off with the public works department as a driver operator in 1988. He worked as a sewer systems worker from 1989 until his hire at the water utility in 1990 as a water system worker I. In 1997, he moved to the plant to become a water plant aide. In 1999, he became a water plant operator, and in 2001, a maintenance worker. In 2005 Wagner took on the title of chemical feed system repairer, the title from which he retired on Nov. 30.

Steve Lorbach started with the city in the office of technology and communications in 2002 as a GIS systems developer. In 2007, he transferred to water as an IS consultant III. Lorbach served as the acting IS manager in 2009 during

Andrea Flohr retired after working for a combination of schools, the city, and water for 30 years.

Flohr started her career with schools as a food service aide in 1990. She became a food service supervisor in 1992 and worked as refectory attendant for parks and recreation for a while in 1993 before returning to schools as a food service supervisor in 1994. She became a stores clerk with parks - labor in 1998 and a stores clerk assistant in 2009, moving to the forestry division of parks that year.

She moved to the water utility in 2013 as a stores assistant and became a storekeeper in 2014. In 2018, she worked out of title as a storeroom supervisor, keeping both titles but working primarily as a storekeeper until her retirement on Nov. 30.
