New temperature scanners have been installed in various locations throughout McCarrons buildings and at Vadnais station. This scanner is in the administration building lobby under the staircase, another is located at the employee entrance under the staircase. Two were placed in the warehouse: one en route to meter ops, one in the office. At the plant, there is one in the McCarrons room near the exterior door and one in the pump room under the staircase. There is one at Vadnais near the entrance. Please use the scanners to check your temperature. Allow your body to reach room temperature before using the new scanners to get an accurate reading.
