Consisting of 48 members appointed by the Mayor, the Commission will bring together community members with wide ranging experiences to explore how the City can build upon its current strategy.

Through a process led by the Citizens League, they will examine a wide range of policy ideas for alternative response models to priority-4 and priority-5 (non-emergency) calls for service.

The Commission will be Co-Chaired by Accoa Ellis of Greater Twin Cities United Way and John Marshall of Xcel Energy. Citizens League Executive Director Kate Cimino and Director of Public Policy Amanda Koonjbeharry will serve as project leads.

- Develop alternative first response options to priority 4 and priority 5 calls for service.
- Recommend approaches for ongoing community involvement in the City's community-first public safety framework.
- Consideration of the creation of a city staffed office to drive and integrate community-first public safety initiatives and strategies.
- Make recommendations based on these findings and conclusions.

What are Priority 4 and 5 calls?

Ramsey County ECC

RCECC Call Priorities

- Priority 1: a responder is down
- Priority 2: in-progress crimes that endanger life or property
- · Priority 2A: higher-risk officer-initiated events
- **Priority 3**: crimes that occurred <20 minutes ago
- Priority 4: crimes that occurred >20 minutes ago
- Priority 5: quality-of-life calls, administrative activities
- Priority 6: test calls
- Priority 7: off duty

Default Priority 4-5 situation types

Categories suggested: for discussion

- Persons in crisis / in need (certain situations)
- Theft, burglary, damage, and illegal activities
- Noise, disturbances, and animals
- · Traffic, parking, and accidents
- Administrative and follow-up
- Proactive outreach

- Presentations from Emergency Communications Center and Saint Paul Police Department
- Presentations from Ramsey County Mental Health, Mobile Crisis Teams, St. Paul Police Department Community Outreach and Stabilization Unit, East Metro Crisis Alliance, and St. Paul Fire BLS unit
- Presentation/deep dive into call priority/response types in 4s & 5s with Robina Institute
- Presentation from Mpls Office of Violence Prevention on existing city departments stewarding this work
- Presentations from community partners leading domestic abuse prevention & response work
- Presentation from St. Paul Fire BLS unit
- Presentation from community partners supporting individuals directly impacted by police violence like MN Freedom Fund & Families Supporting Families Against Police Violence

- Additional support from partners includes Harvard Kennedy School Government Performance Lab, providing surveying capacity & best practices research to the commission on key charge topics
- Integrating research in successful and/or emerging models around the country into commission work i.e. CAHOOTS program and other offices of violence prevention

Some emerging central themes so far:

People felt most safe when they had a deep connection to the people and organizations in their neighborhoods - strong social & civic infrastructure of community organizations & city resources

Police presence in neighborhoods especially if combined with overpolicing/harmful or inappropriate responses to situations made them feel less safe
