

 - \$8.169M CIB investment



What we have heard

In 2018, we talked with our community about their wants, needs, and dreams – libraries and beyond. We heard:

- People want libraries to focus on young people and families.
- People want libraries to hold space for both quiet and loud activities.
- People face structural, cultural, and financial barriers to using libraries.
- People seek an environment that fosters safety and belonging.
- People seek programming beyond books and buildings.

STRATEGIC GOAL: Invest in spaces that are safe, inviting, affirming, and comfortable for people of all cultures, abilities, and communities.

What we have learned

In 2019 and early 2020, we talked with our community about our facilities. We assessed the condition & function of our buildings. We learned:

- Across demographic and age groups, the library is viewed as a place for exposure to new things and people and as a place to have connections with other people.
- Community members feel pride for their neighborhood library.
- Saint Paul Public Library facilities are falling behind their peers.
- Outdated buildings struggle to support high use.

Libraries in Saint Paul are well loved, well used, and well worn.

Facilities Vision

Imagine gathering spaces in our communities for neighbors to meet and connect, for job seekers to access WiFi and resume help, for children to discover and learn through play, and for community members to work, study, and access services. These free, accessible spaces that welcome everyone exist in our public libraries. They are neighborhood resilience centers.

Investment needs:

- Transform three neighborhood locations that are outdated, in poor condition, struggle to support high use, and have not been renovated in more than 30 years.
- Improve technology and play and learn space at all locations.



Hamline Midway Library

- 91-year-old building in very poor condition
 - Only library in city closed to patrons for more than one year during pandemic due to its ventilation system
 - Moisture, air quality issues
 - Structural issues that need further examination
- Significant accessibility challenges
- Lack of flexible community meeting space limits resources and uses of this location

The Opportunity

Co-create with neighbors a Hamline Midway Library that is safe, inviting, affirming, and comfortable for people of all cultures, abilities, and communities.

- Improve accessibility
- Add community meeting/program space and study rooms
- Acoustic separation between quiet & loud spaces
- Enhanced play & learn space and technology-rich space
- Catalyze investment in citywide vision

Two Options

Additional community process and design consultation later this year will explore **two options** for the Hamline Midway Library site:

- "Radical renovation" that maintains elements of existing structure while adding space.
- New, larger, fully accessible building.

Both options emerged from community input, and both could address vision and goals outlined in SPPL's community-informed Strategic Direction and Facilities Direction.

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2022 and beyond

- Complete schematic and development design for all three priority locations.
- To the extent possible, seek State and/or Federal funds to support location-based and systemwide priorities laid out in the case statement for capital investment.
- The Friends of SPPL complete feasibility study for future capital campaign.
- If budget proposal adopted, complete construction documents and break ground on Hamline Midway Library construction while fundraising for the other projects.
