The Council reconvened for Public Hearings at 5:31 p.m.

Council President Brendmoen welcomed those present and explained the procedure for public testimony.

Councilmember Noecker requested a staff report.

Staff was not present.

In opposition:

Bill Thurmes, regional manager of Timberland Partners, owner and operator of 333 on the Park, said they were asking to secure their building 24 hours a day. He read the six items considered on applications for exceptions, and stated their responses: Closing their doors would not hinder access to any other buildings. Metal detectors and photo IDs did not apply to their type of building. There was no contract or legal document preventing them doing this. Their building was entirely residential; if retail came in they would comply. There was very little traffic. Their residents had asked for another level of security; there were a great number of security camera in the building and they took security very seriously. The skyway access was not a financial hardship for their residents, but being a secured building helped them lease units. When the ordinance was adopted, two other residential buildings - City Walk and Central Towers - were granted exceptions for the very same reasons they were asking. Sibley Square made the request in 2008 before Timberland Partners bought the building, and the Skyway Advisory Committee recommended its approval and the City Council approved the exception. Their application was received by DSI on September 9, and the ordinance requires that the Skyway Governance and Advisory Committee forward their recommendation to the City Council within 30 days. Mr. Thurmes said he and the applicant Ms. Smith attended Skyway Governance and Advisory Committee meetings in September and October, and at the end pf the second meeting the committee was divided and couldn't make a recommendation. A motion was made to approve the request, but it didn't receive a second. No one came out to oppose the request. In December, the City Attorney asked the Skyway Governance to take a position. The Skyway Governance and Advisory Committee agenda for December 20 included an item to formalize the rejection of their request, without there having been a motion. Mr. Thurmes said their (the applicant's) position was that this was a reasonable request.

Councilmember Noecker ask for a description of existing security. Mr. Thurmes said the only access to their building was through the two skyway access points. There was an agreement with 180 E 5th Street that their security group also monitored and patrolled 333 on the Park. They had dozens upon dozens of cameras. They were a market rate, high end apartment building and took security very seriously.

Ms. Yang asked Mr. Thurmes to share specific examples of what made residents feel unsafe. Mr. Thurmes said a National Night Out event brought out concerns about people asking for money, panhandling, threatening residents. Residents said they paid a lot of money to live in the building and asked for more control of access. From that meeting, they decided to start this process. He said they'd had people breaking into their community rooms and having access to their coffee machines. They were not huge quality of life issues crimes, but they'd had some issues.

Councilmember Noecker moved to close the public hearing. Yeas - 7 Nays - 0

Councilmember Noecker said she believed strongly in protecting the integrity of the

skyway system, and respected the process of the Skyway Governance Committee. She said the process for granting exemptions was there for a reason, and she believed the appellant has made a convincing case that they were warranted an exception based on the six findings. She said she disagreed with the recommendation before the Council, and her understanding was that they had to lay the matter over in order to memorialize the findings.

Deputy City Attorney Rachel Tierney said her recommendation was that Councilmember Noecker make her motion of intent, vote on it, and next week there would be a resolution for the Council to consider. City Clerk Shari Moore said the Legistar system was not set up to accommodate a motion of intent for this type of legislative file.

Following further discussion, Council President Brendmoen suggested tabling the item while Ms. Tierney drafted an amended resolution for the Council to vote on.

The item was taken up following agenda Item 75.

75 <u>APC 20-1</u> Public hearing to consider the appeal of Keith Hovland to a Planning Commission decision approving a nonconforming use permit with variance to change the angle of the east facing billboard face at 2516 Wabash Avenue (ZF#: 19-103405).

Anton Jerve, Planning and Economic Development, gave a staff report on the application and appeal. He reviewed the ordinance related to billboards. If the existing billboard were converted, the it would need to be rotated 5% would remove the visual field from residences. Rotating the billboard required relocation of the nonconforming use and a variance. The Zoning Committee held a public hearing on the application; the St. Anthony Park Community Council sent a letter of opposition citing impacts to future development and safety concerns. The zoning committee found the application met the standards for relocation of a non-conforming use and for the variance. The zoning committee approved the application 4 to 1, and the Planning Commission unanimously approved the zoning committee's recommendation. The Planning Commission decision was appealed primarily citing potential traffic safety issues and impact to the community character.

Appellant:

Dan Cornajo (1657 Saunders Avenue) professional city planner and former PED director spoke in support of the appeal. He said the Zoning Code sought to reduce the number of billboards in the city. This application would involve taking down some billboards, but they were not great billboards, in poor locations and were probably going to come down anyway. The Zoning Code also sought to promote traffic safety by reducing the distracting effect of signage. He read from the urban design focus area of the Comprehensive Plan, and said profit, not economic value, seemed to be the main motive behind Outfront Media's original application. He said the Land Use and Transportation chapters of the Comprehensive Plan both referred to lessening the negative impacts of interstate highways. He said he felt billboards represented visual pollution. He said another dynamic display billboard was not needed, especially at the intersection of two major highways.

Michael Russelle (2265 Luther Place) said he agreed with most of the points made in the letters received and the comments, with the addition that they were not just concerned about traffic on the highway but also local drivers and bicyclists. He expressed concerns about vehicle recognition technology. He read a letter from Robert Strong.

Jeanne Weigum (1647 Laurel) said the Planning Commission erred in finding this would not endanger public health or safety, that it would not negatively impact the neighborhood, and that this was done for anything other than economic benefit.

In opposition to the appeal:

John Bodger, Outfront Media, said they believed the Planning Commission was correct in approving their application. He said they submitted a study obtained from the Federal Highway Administration showing no increase in traffic accidents associated with digital signs. He said they just had to move the billboard 6 to 12 inches to get clear view down the freeway and eliminate any view to the residential. They were going to remove 38 billboards, including at least two in each ward.

Councilmember Jalali moved to close the public hearing. Yeas - 7 Nays - 0

Council members Jalali, Prince and Noecker and Council President Brendmoen asked

questions of Mr. Jerve.

Councilmember Jalali said reviewed the findings and said she believed the concerns were understandable but didn't feel she could justify overruling the decision made. She moved to deny the appeal.

Councilmember Noecker spoke in support of the motion.

Councilmember Prince spoke in opposition.

76 <u>RES PH 20-50</u> Approving a Five-Year Street Reconstruction Plan for the Fiscal Years 2020 through 2024 and granting preliminary approval to the issuance of certain General Obligation Street Reconstruction Bonds by the City.

Public Works Director Kathy Lantry gave a staff report. She said the Council was being asked to approve the five-year plan for Public Works reconstruction projects that would be paid for by street reconstruction bonds. She said the five-year plan was required because of the way they were paying for the projects, PUblic Works had had a five-year plan for the past five years and had developed it as a tool to help them be more plan-ful and transparent in their work. She reviewed the projects on the list, and said they were also proposing to use street reconstruction bonds to pay for Ayd Mill Road. She reviewed the portions of the resolution related to the Ayd Mill Road project ion related to Ayd Mill Road and that the project could come back before the Council for final approval, and said Public Works and the Administration had committed that the final design and financing for Ayd Mill would come before the Council for approval. She said the Mayor and Public Works had also agreed to include funds in the 2021 budget in case additional mitigation was needed after implementation. She answered questions from Council members.

Councilmember Thao moved an amended Version 2 to remove Ayd Mill Road from this 2020 proposal and deal with it at another time, and reduce the amount from \$20 million to \$13.8 million. He said he felt this whole process was a surprise, and it should e a public discussion.

There was additional discussion and questions among Council members, Director Lantry, and Interim Finance Director John McCarthy.

Council members Noecker and Prince spoke in support of the motion.

Council members Tolbert, Jalali, and Yang and Council President Brendmoen spoke in opposition to the amendment.

Vote on amendment Yeas - 3 Nays - 4 (Tolbert, Jalali, Yang, and Brendmoen)

Councilmember Thao moved a friendly amendment in Version 3 which strengthened the language related to the traffic modeling and the public engagement process spelled out under numbers 4, 5, and 6 in the Resolved section.

Council President Brendmoen asked for a friendly amendment of Councilmember Thao's amendment, at the request of bond counsel, that number 1 under the Resolved section have language added to cap the amount at \$20 million.

Following further discussion, there was a vote on the amendment. Yeas - 7 Nays - 0

No one was present to testify.

Councilmember Jalali moved to close the public hearing and approve the resolution as amended.
