

Per Minneapolis Code of Ordinances Title 7 Section 183.01 (passed May 1, 2025):


"Justice-impacted status: The state of having a criminal record or history, including any arrest, charge, conviction, period of incarceration, or past or current probationary status."

 City housing inspectors, etc.)








Protecting a vulnerable population

- 65% of formerly incarcerated individuals are unemployed at 4 years post-release (Prison Policy Initiative, 2022)
- Formerly incarcerated individuals are 10 times more likely to be homeless (ibid, 2018)
- Barriers to employment, housing, education & more are often a hidden "second sentence" for Justice-Impacted individuals
- Haphazardly applied, discrimination against Justice-Impacted individuals severely limits reintegration and worsens recidivism (Othering & Belonging Institute, 2019)
