



Utility seeks to hire an operator Utility hires civil engineer I

We are hiring a night shift water treatment operator who will:

- Control the flow of water into and through the treatment process
- Monitor and adjust the appropriate application of treatment chemicals during the process.
- Perform appropriate chemical analyses and monitor the chlorine residual, turbidity, alkalinity, and temperature levels.
- Evaluate water treatment control parameters to track plant operations and makes necessary adjustments.

This position operates on a rotating schedule, with night shifts from 6:00 p.m. to 6:00 a.m., four days one week and three days the following week. Training to be conducted during day shifts.

Position Requirements

Must possess a Class D Water Operators Certificate from the Minnesota Department of Health by start date.

AND must meet ONE of the following requirements:

Two years of experience as a water plant worker or equivalent experience

OR

Completion of a post-secondary water or wastewater treatment program as specified by the department.

OR

Two years of post-secondary education which must include courses in mathematics or chemistry.

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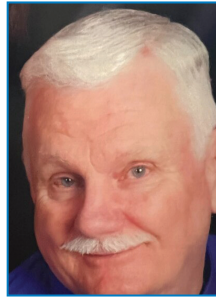
Retiree Darrell Audett, father of Herman, passes away

He became a driver operator in 1984 and a watershed foreman I in 1985. A change in title made him a watershed supervisor in 1989. He was promoted to watershed supervisor II in 1997. This is the position from which he retired in 2006.

Services were held August 18, with interment at the Ft. Snelling National Cemetery.

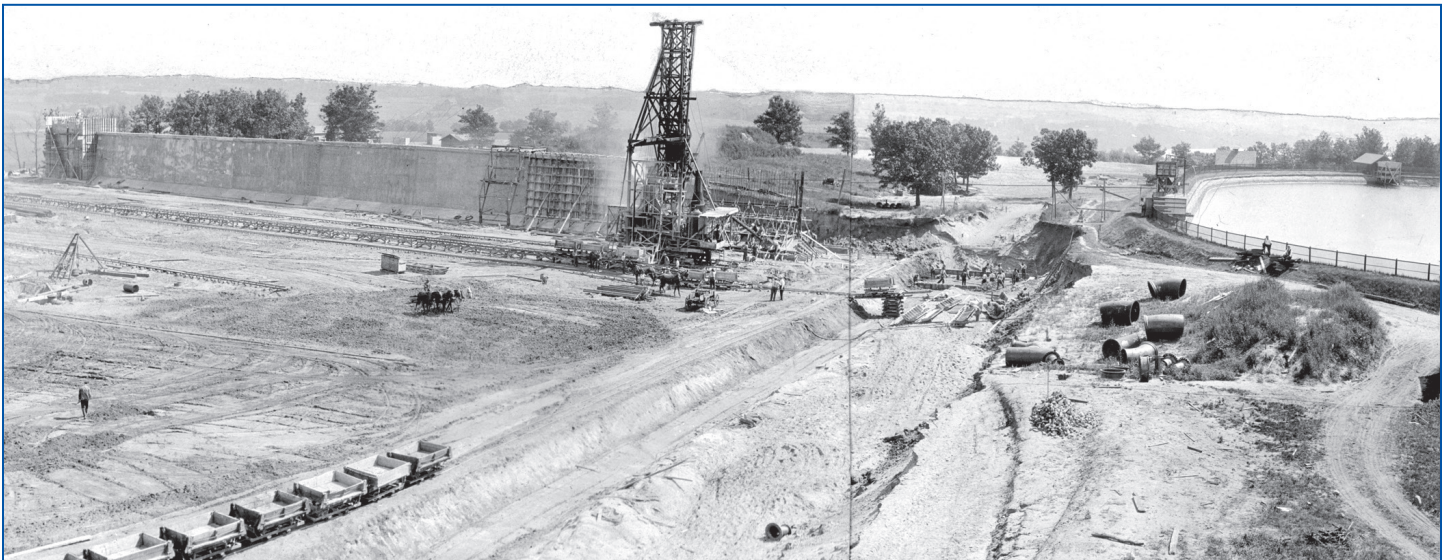
