- Give interns valuable experience in leadership and outreach





Methods

- N = 164
- Questionnaire (physical survey)
- Measuring teen:
 - Social habits
 - Library/rec center usage
 - Hopes and stressors
 - Demographic data
- Incentivized with goodies












Significant Findings



Demographics

N = 164

- 40% boys, 55% girls, 4% non-binary
- Age ranges: 15-17 (62%), 18-19 (26%), 13-14 (12%)

- 55116




What keeps teens from visiting libraries and recreation centers?



Libraries


 I don't know what it offers 	23

Recreation Centers

I don't know what it offers	18
It's not for me	23
I don't have a way to get there	16
I'm too busy	68
My friends don't go	38
I/My parents have safety conc	11
Nothing	49
Other	2





Implications

- Teens are busy people!
- They are likely be being served by their school's library, after school programs, and open gyms
 - Matter of convenience
- Most teens find libraries (64%) and rec centers (70%) to be welcoming environments


